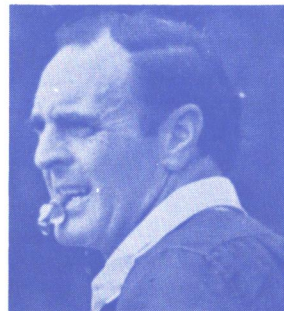

IN FOCUS

FALKIRK

Today's Scottish Cup clash with Falkirk is the 10th tie to be played between the clubs. And if it lives up to the standard of play and excitement of some of the previous nine ties — two of which involved replays — then the fans will get value for money.

VISITING CAPTAIN



GEORGE MILLER

George Miller uses all the experience he has picked up as a player with Dunfermline, Wolves and Hearts to make his vital job as Falkirk sweeper seem easy. One of the best match-readers in the business . . . and not averse to deserting his defensive duties long enough to sneak upfield and bang in a goal.

Statistically, the advantage lies heavily with Rangers having won seven of the nine earlier ties (including one of the replays).

The first Cup clash between the teams was 'way back in season 1883-84 when Rangers won 5-2 at Kinning Park. They didn't meet again until 1906-07 where again Rangers came out on top winning 2-1 at Brockville in a First Round tie.

The next year paired the clubs again in the first round of the competition. This time it needed two games to bring Rangers victory — a 4-2 win at Ibrox following a 2-2 away draw.

Rangers edged the Bairns out 1-0 in the semi-final of the trophy the next season, but in 1912-13 it was Falkirk's turn to come out on top, coming to Ibrox to win 3-1 in the third round.

Another 2-0 win for Rangers came in the third round in 1925-26 at Brockville and the following season the draw landed the clubs together again. Rangers got a 2-2 draw away from home, and confidently expected to win through the replay.

But this was the time of Rangers' famous run of ill luck in the tournament, and in the replay the hoodoo struck again. Just before the end of 90 minutes, full back Billy McCandless was hurt and went to outside left for the extra time, with Andy Cunningham at left back.

And in the extra 30 minutes, the immortal ex-Celt Patsy Gallacher laid on a chance near the end for Falkirk to get a 1-0 win.

The two meetings since then — both at Brockville — have gone to Rangers,

with a 2-1 fourth round win in 1937-38 and same-score victory in the first round in 1961-62 . . . which turned out to be the only time Rangers beat the Bairns then went on to win the trophy. They defeated St. Mirren 2-0 at Hampden.

So the Cup rivalry between the clubs is long and tense. And as it is only a few weeks since Falkirk defeated Rangers — who were without five regulars — 3-1 at Brockville, the Bairns won't be lacking in confidence about today's meeting.

One of the scorers that day was former Rangers **Alex Ferguson**, who is playing a vital role in the Brockville success story. Alex has been battling to beat injury to make it for today.

Another ex-Ranger in the Falkirk line-up is **Denis Setterington** at outside left. The fair-haired Denis, sold last year, has established himself as a regular in the set-up.

Goalkeeper **Stewart Rennie** another player who has established himself as first-team man this term.

Right back **Gregor Abel** joined the club three years ago from junior side Bo'ness. His partner, **John McLaughlin**, is the club's second longest serving player, having arrived via minor football in 1965.

Right half **John Markie** is the senior man at Brockville, joining the club from Newcastle United in 1964.

Left half **George Gibson** was once fancied by Rangers. He's a skilful player, with a knack for creating openings.

DANGER MAN

Falkirk got striker Andy Roxburgh on a free transfer from Partick Thistle two years ago — and he has proved to be a bargain. Struck up a devastating partnership with Alex Ferguson last season to help Falkirk win promotion.

Right winger **Henry Hoggan** has just finished a week's suspension. He is a former Linlithgow Rose player, joining Falkirk in 1967.

There are few harder working forwards in the country than the fair-haired **Jim Shirra**, who went to Falkirk in 1967 from Gardoch United.

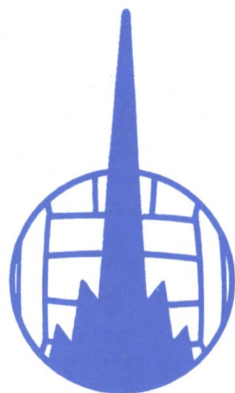

Falkirk were founded at Brockville Park in 1876, starting off as a Second Division team. They won promotion in 1905 and three years later were First Division runners-up, a feat they repeated in 1910.

They were relegated in 1935, but came back up the next season as champions. They lost First Division status in 1951 and came back up in a season only to go down again in 1959.

It took them two years to regain their First Division place, which they lost once more two seasons ago. Returned once again this season as Division Two champions.

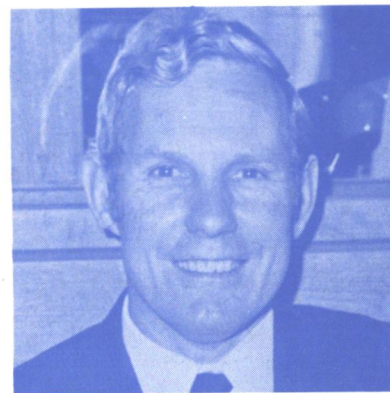

RESERVE REVIEW

Rangers Reserves, already in the final of the Reserve League Cup — they are to meet Celtic on a date still to be fixed — have now won through to the semi-finals of the Second Eleven Cup.

They did so by beating Ayr United 4-3 in a tense, tough quarter-final game at Somerset on Tuesday night. Now they will meet either Motherwell or Falkirk in the semis.

But to win through at Somerset, the reserves had to show real fighting qualities. They were down 2-0 at half-time, but staged a great second half revival and got 3-2 ahead. Ayr, however, didn't give up fighting and after missing a penalty, levelled the game at 3-3.

That set the scene for an exciting finish and young Derek Renton, brought on as a second half substitute, grabbed the winner for Rangers.

SLOW START

It was Andy Penman who started the Ibrox fight back after the interval, and then Willie Johnston — playing his first game after a six-week suspension — kept it going to make the score 2-2. Left back Alex Miller edged Rangers in front with a great third goal and at this point Johnston was taken off to make sure he was ready for his return to the first team today against Falkirk.
