RANGERS GET IT TOUGH — TWICE

Twice in the past few days Rangers have been landed with really tough draws in Cup competition — a meeting with Torino in the European Cup Winners' competition and a clash with Falkirk at Brockville in the third round of the Scottish Cup.

Both promise to be highly exciting encounters — games which will test Rangers to the limit. But it is also a double challenge the Light Blues are happy to accept.

Manager Willie Waddell watched Italian aces Torino in action last weekend, and although they lost 3-1 in an away match to Roma, the Ibrox boss saw enough to be convinced that Rangers will have to be at their best to get through the quarter-final meetings with the Italians.

"They played very well in the first half, and were impressive going forward. They will be very difficult opposition" says manager Waddell.

Torino are in the upper half of the Italian League. They are mainly a young side, since the club concentrate on rearing their own stars.

But although there are no big names, they have fine players in midfield men Sala and Ferrini and winger Toschi.

Torino's coach, Gustavo Giagnoni has been voted Italy's Coach of the Year and he is expected to bring the young Torino team through to be one of the top outfits over the next few years.

A 65,000 crowd is expected at the Comunale Stadium in Turin, which Torino share with City rivals Juventus. It is this joint venture which caused the dates disputes

with Torino for the two quarter-final legs.

Rangers' meeting with Falkirk will be the 11th time the clubs have clashed in the Scottish Cup. Indeed, it was in the corresponding round of the tournament last season, the Bairns came to Ibrox and were beaten 3-0.

Altogether, Rangers have won eight of the previous Cup ties with Falkirk. They have never lost at Brockville — having gone there six times, won outright on four occasions and drawn twice.

RESERVE REVIEW

Rangers Reserves hit their best form in a 4-0 win over Aberdeen at Ibrox last week. It was the kind of form which delighted coach Stan Anderson, who has felt time and again during the season that the team has not played to full potential.

"This was a very good, convincing win. The team played really well."

"We started well, and Graham Fyfe put us ahead after 15 minutes. I felt a few more goals would come — but we still led by that one goal at the interval."

"We sorted out a couple of minor problems in the dressing room at the break, and in the second half the goals came."

The big trialist outside left got the second, then came two great goals from 16-year-old Billy McNichol, Dunoon Grammar schoolboy making his debut for the Ibrox colts.

"He had a fine game against the experienced Tommy McMillan of Aberdeen" says coach Anderson.

Billy, who plays for Port Glasgow Juveniles, is an Ibrox 'S' form player — and clearly his career couldn't have got off to a better start.

The Ibrox line-up — a very young team — was: Watson; Alexander, Struthers; Donaldson, McCallum, Bonnyman; Semple, Conn, McNichol, Fyfe, A.N. Other. Neil Pirrie came on as substitute for Graham Fyfe during the second half.

A fortnight ago, the Reserves were not so impressive — losing 2-0 to Falkirk at Brockville. However, goalkeeper Gerry Neef had to play from the first minute with a broken finger, then early in the first half the experienced Andy Penman had to be taken off

because of an injury. George Struthers substituted.

Rangers Football Club ask all fans to co-operate and make sure that everyone leaves the ground with the maximum of comfort and safety by following this procedure at the end of the game:

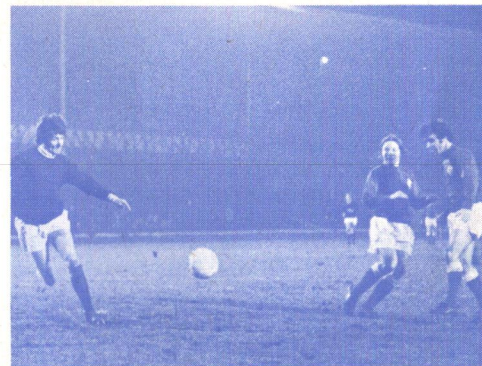
1. Take your time leaving the Stadium.

Spotlight on...

HEARTS

It was a defeat by Hearts — 2-1 at Tynecastle on October 2 — which sparked Rangers off to a great run in the League which has brought 13 wins and a draw in the past 16 games.

At Tynecastle that day, Rangers turned on their poorest display for a long time — and they knew it. There was only one way to go after that — up.

And up Rangers went — from second bottom place to their position now of third top. So they should be thankful to Hearts in a way. But that won't stop the Light Blues from going all out to repay the kind Hearts by handing out a beating today. There's a big matter of pride and a touch of revenge.

Of course, they know it won't be easy. That shock 5-2 defeat at home by Dundee last week will have angered Hearts. And they will be ready to make Rangers suffer.

However, the records show that Rangers have a tremendous victory edge over the Edinburgh men. Today will be the 150th meeting between the clubs in the League — and Rangers have won 85 times, lost 35 and drawn 29.

The Hearts team will come from the following pool of players:

Jim Cruickshank — Goalkeeper. The longest serving player with the club. Signed from Queen's Park in 1960 and he has made nearly 450 first team appearances. Capped by Scotland at full international, League, and Under-23 level. 5ft. 11in. 11st. 10lb.

Kenny Garland — Goalkeeper. Has not had many chances in the League side because of Cruickshank's consistency but still a fine player. Joined Hearts in 1966 from Newburgh Juniors. Is a printer to trade, is over 6ft, 12st.

Ian Sneddon — Full back. Signed as a wing half from Drumchapel Amateurs 1965. Member of first team pool for four seasons and now established and currently one of the best in the game. 5ft. 10in. 11st.

Dave Clunie — Full back. Was a schoolboy international outside left but now a first class defender. Signed from juvenile grade in 1964 and has already gained Scottish League and Under-23 honours. 5ft. 10½in. 10st. 10lb.

Peter Oliver — Full back. In the first team again after long spell out of action with injury. In running for honours last season. Came to Hearts from Fife junior club Lochore. 5ft. 10in. 11st. 7lb.

Roy Kay — Full back. Played over 60 consecutive games until losing his place to Oliver recently. Slim but strong and reads the game well. Signed in 1967 from Juvenile grade. 5ft. 10in. 9st. 12lb.

Jimmy Brown — Midfield. Strong, constructive player with an eye for a goal chance. Signed in 1965 from Juvenile grade when only 15. Was a Scottish Youth, Scottish Amateur, and Scottish Juvenile international. 5ft. 9in. 10st.

Alan Anderson — Centre half. Over 350 appearances since signing from Scunthorpe in 1963. Has had a spell as club captain. Very consistent player. Toured with Scottish F.A. in 1967. 6ft, 1in.

Tommy Veitch — Versatile defender. Strong tackler. Signed from junior Bonnyrigg Rose in 1966 and is regularly called on for first team duty. 5ft. 11in. 11st. 5lb.

Eddie Thomson — Club captain. Centre half or wing half. Capped by Scottish League and Under-23. A junior with Penicuik when signed in 1966. 5ft. 11in. 11st. 10lb.

Wilson Wood — Midfield. Formerly with Newcastle, Rangers and Dundee United. Clever player. Lost place following injury earlier this season. 5ft. 9in. 11st.

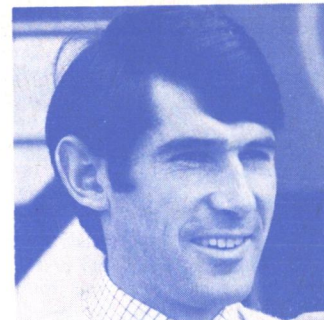
Jim Townsend — Vice-Captain. Signed from St. Johnstone in 1967 for big fee and toured with Scottish F.A. that summer. Experience with Middlesbrough. 5ft. 9in. 11st. 4lb.

Derek Renton — Forward. Former border schoolboy rugby representative player. Had experience with Rangers for short spell last season after signing from Arniston Rangers. Came to Tynecastle last close season. Good positional player. 5ft. 11in. 11st. 10lb.

Ernie Winchester — Midfield. Former Aberdeen centre forward who had spell in America before joining Hearts in 1969. Has developed into fine midfield player. Was schoolboy international centre half. 6ft. 12st. 7lb.

Tommy Murray — Came to Hearts from Carlisle this season. Small but clever and can snap goals. Formerly played with Airdrie where he gained a lot of respect. 5ft. 5in. 10st. 4lb.

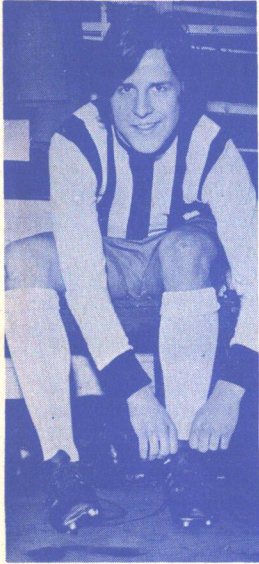

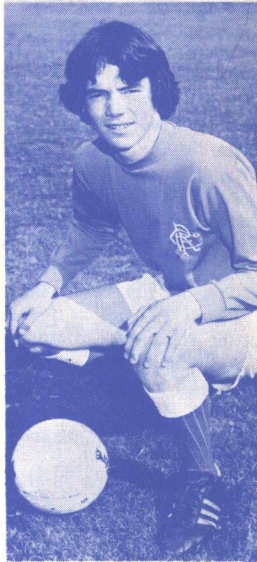

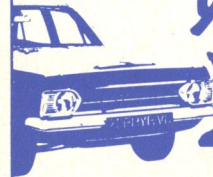
