HIGH-SCORING HEARTS TO HUSTLE 'GERS!

Hearts, like Rangers, next year celebrate 100 years of football . . . a century of soccer, filled with action great games, great stars and plenty of success.

Four times First Division champions, five times Scottish Cup Winners, four times League Cup Winners.

It's a proud record, achieved by some of the most famous names in Scottish football — Walker, Harkness, Massey, Conn, Bauld, Wardhaugh, Mackay.

The Tynecastle club have also played in Europe a number of times and two seasons ago reached the final of the Texaco Cup before losing to Wolves.

Although their last success was 10 years ago when they won the League Cup by beating Kilmarnock 1-0, Hearts also reached the Scottish Cup final in 67-68 only to lose to Dunfermline by 3-1.

Hearts were original members of the Scottish First Division when it was founded in 1890 and have never been relegated. Over the years they have had tremendous matches with Rangers in the 150 games between the clubs.

Indeed, apart from Celtic, the Tynecastle club have the best League record of success against Rangers — with 36 wins to their credit. There have been 29 drawn matches and the Light Blues have won the remaining 85.

Last season Hearts beat Rangers 2-1 at Tynecastle — a result which sparked

off a revival by Rangers who from that point — October 2 — found some of their best form and in the return match at Ibrox got revenge in emphatic fashion with a crushing 6-0 victory, with a hat-trick coming from Derek Johnstone.

Under the direction of former Rangers coach Bobby Seith, Hearts are trying to rebuild the side and return to the glory days of the past.

At the moment the Edinburgh side are in joint fourth place in the table with Aberdeen, only a point behind Rangers. They have found scoring form in the past half-dozen League matches, rattling in 15 goals.

They will come to Ibrox today looking for a victory, for it is their ambition to progress even further up the table and a win is the best way to ensure that.

The Hearts team will come from the following pool:

Goalkeeper **KENNY GARLAND**. It took this 6ft-plus 'keeper five years to break through to the first team because of the form of internationalist Jim Cruickshank. But now the big 'keeper, signed from Newburgh Juniors in 1966 has really established himself and has not missed a match. It's now Cruickshank's turn to wait on the sidelines.

Full back **IAN SNEDDON**. An unusual injury — he stood on a nail — kept this former Drumchapel Amateurs player (he was signed in 1965) out for a long spell this term but he has now won back his place. 5ft. 10in., 11st., he is a former Youth Internationalist from Glasgow.

Full back **DAVE CLUNIE**. 5ft. 10½in., 11st. A former schoolboy international outside left, but has now become one of the coolest, most talented defenders in the country. Joined the club from Salvessen Boys Club in 1964 and has won Scottish League and Under-23 honours. Was out of favour last season, but this term hasn't missed a game and also netted three goals.

Wing half **EDDIE THOMSON**. 5ft. 11in., 12st. Club captain, and a very powerful centre half or sweeper. Has even turned his talents to attacking this season for a spell, but has settled back in defence. Absent for a long time because of injury, but has fully recovered now. Signed from junior club Penicuik in 1966 and has won League and Under-23 caps. Lives in the Borders and travels daily to Edinburgh for training.

Centre half **ALAN ANDERSON**. This tall, imposing defender — 6ft. 1in. — has proved to be a tremendous servant to the club since he was brought back from English club Scunthorpe in 1963. Really consistent player, whose ability in the air makes him a most dangerous opponent when he comes up for corner kicks. Indeed, he netted his fourth goal of the season against Partick Thistle last week

in Hearts' 2-0 win. Toured in Australia and the Far East with Scotland in 1967.

Wing half JIM BROWN. 5ft. 9in., 10st. A very skilful, forcing midfield player who was signed from Salvesen Boys Club as a 15-year-old in 1965. Was a Scottish Youth, Amateur and Juvenile Internationalist. He has played in every game except one for Hearts this term — and even then he came on as substitute in the match he missed.

Winger DONALD PARK. A new hero with the Hearts fans — and this stocky teenager looks like becoming a big personality. He was bought from Highland League football during the pre-season and nursed along for a few months. But then Hearts put him into the attack — and he has repayed their faith with four goals in six games, including the second against Thistle last week. Gave up University a week or two ago to try full-time football, which should make him an even better player.

Inside forward BILLY MENMUIR. This youngster, former Bristol player has just broken into the Hearts first team as a midfield man. And today's game gives him a hat-trick of appearances against Glasgow clubs — he made his debut against Celtic and was in against Thistle last week.

Centre forward DONALD FORD. Just 5ft. 7½in., and 10st., but one of the deadliest strikers in Scotland. Donald joined Hearts from Bo'ness in 1964 and

in the past few years has been one of the most popular players at Tynecastle. His speed and goal-grabbing talents earned him international recognition last season and he was in Brazil with Scotland during the summer. An ever-present this term and scorer of seven goals, including a double against Celtic a couple of weeks ago. Donald is also a County cricketer, a chartered accountant . . . and a town councillor in Linlithgow.

Inside forward ERIC CARRUTHERS. Rangers have recently had a substantial offer turned down by Hearts for this flaxen-haired Youth Internationalist who was signed from Salvesen Boys Club in 1970.

Winger TOMMY MURRAY. Just 5ft. 5in., and 10st. 4lbs., but a real danger man. The ex-Airdrie player went south to Carlisle for a couple of years before joining Hearts last season. Mainly a goal-maker using his experience, positional play and passing talents, but he can also take 'em and has four to his credit this season.

Forward ANDY LYNCH. This big winger, 5ft. 10in., and 11st., is up for sale at the moment at his own request. Fast raiding player with a powerful left foot shot, he was signed from Kirkintilloch in 1969.

Forward DEREK RENTON. 5ft. 11in., 12st. Has been out of the first team recently but a handy stand-by. Former schoolboy rugby player in the Borders, he was with Rangers for a season before going back junior to Arniston then joining Hearts a year ago.

MAN IN THE MIDDLE

Referee Jim McRoberts started refereeing in 1958, a year after giving up playing as a wing-half with Newarthill Hearts and Shotts Bon Accord (where he played alongside another top referee, Willie Anderson of East Kilbride). He has been a Grade One official for the past four seasons. Away from football the 40-year-old Wishaw man is a youth club leader in Motherwell where he coaches Badminton. He is married with two sons and a daughter. Mr. McRoberts is a charge-hand stone mason and works with the Department of the Environment in the Ancient Monuments department — which is not a joke. At the moment Mr. McRoberts is working at restoring and consolidating Craignethan Castle in Lanarkshire, a tourist attraction which has something like 9,000 visitors a year.

Warning from Rangers

The ten golden rules are:

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the road-side when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

RESERVE REVIEW

IBROX BABE YOUNG HITS GOAL TRAIL

A spanking 5-1 win away to Dumbarton in the Reserve League . . . and a 1-1 draw against Partick Thistle in difficult circumstances in a second XI Cup tie at Firhill. These are two results which have pepped up the Ibrox Colts.

The replay against Thistle, following the 1-1 draw at Firhill in which Rangers had to play for the full 90 minutes with outfield player Jim Denny in goal, was at Ibrox on Thursday night — too late for this edition of the match magazine. A report will be given in the next issue.

Goal scoring hero over the two games has been winger Davie Young, who hit a hat-trick against Sons (and also helped in the other two goals) then followed this up with a deflected shot which brought the only goal against Thistle.

Great work by the former Coatbridge schoolboy, particularly his performance at Boghead where he laid on the first goal for Ian McDougall, banged in the next brace himself was brought down in the penalty area to let Alex Miller score from the spot for the fourth and rounded off a great night by blasting a powerful shot in for the fifth.

At Firhill Davie gave the Light Blues a half-time lead with a shot which went into the net off a defender, then after Thistle equalised in the 60th minute the chance of a winner came to Rangers in the closing minutes.

And it came to winger Young . . . but this time he missed from close range. Still, you can't get them all.

Getting a draw at Firhill in the circumstances against table-topping Thistle was a fine performance — particularly since the pitch was very slippery

Jim Denny deserves great credit for his performance as a stand-in 'keeper, and the rest of the team pulled out a little bit extra.

Rangers Power to Third Top!

Another powerful finishing burst brought Rangers a 3-1 win over Dumbarton at Ibrox last week — and strengthened the challenge in the League.

With Aberdeen losing to Dundee United at Tannadice, the Light Blues are now in third place just a point behind second club Hibs. The aim is to keep on closing the gap over Hibs and table-topping Celtic before the meeting with the other half of the Old Firm on January 6.

Today's League position makes interesting comparison to a couple of months ago when Rangers were in sixth bottom place with four points from five matches.

Since the 1-1 home draw with Morton on October 7, the Light Blues have picked up 13 points in seven matches — which just proves what everyone at Ibrox has always maintained . . . never count Rangers out.
