'GERS OUT TO BOOST SCOTS!

ABOUT this time next week most football folk will have their mind on Bratislava and Scotland's last World Cup qualifying tie, but Rangers General Manager Willie Waddell and team manager Jock Wallace will be the odd men out.

They will have their attention very definitely on **BORUSSIA MOENCHENGLADBACH**.

Yes, the Ibrox bosses have decided that with no fixtures at home to worry about and with some of their stars in the Scotland party, next Wednesday is an ideal time to assess their Cup-Winners Cup opponents, especially as this remarkable German side have a home fixture with Kaiserslautern.

Waddell and Wallace know already, of course, that Moenchengladbach are a good side, a very good side, but before the second round tie later this month they must find out how good and what makes them tick. **THE GERMANS THEMSELVES ARE PLEASED WITH THEIR CURRENT FORM AND BELIEVE THEY HAVE NOW FILLED THE GAP LEFT BY THE TRANSFER TO REAL MADRID OF THE GREAT NETZER.**

Major test

Already Borussia and Rangers have built up a great mutual respect for each other, and General Manager Waddell reports that when he was in Zurich for the European Cup draws last week, the murmur which went around the room when this particular tie was drawn showed that most of the hundred different club officials present recognised it as the tie of the round in all three competitions.

Everyone at Ibrox is treating it as a major test and a charter flight is already being planned to take the Ibrox squad from Glasgow to the little north German town of Moenchengladbach.

Moenchengladbach, who were a tremendously impressive side when they played at Pittodrie last year, are now a well-know side in Europe, yet their rise to fame over the past eight years has been one of the great romances of West German football.

After all, before the team's successful run began, who had heard of Moenchengladbach? Yet this small-town team have managed to equal and overshadow the clubs from big cities like Berlin, Cologne, Munich and Frankfurt.

Netzer is by no means the only player they have given to the West German national side either and they have the countries leading scorer in Heyn-

WITH typical Teutonic thoroughness, **BORUSSIA MOENCHENGLADBACH** Rangers' next opponents in the European Cup Winners' Cup — had three "spies" at Gayfield to watch the Ibrox team on Saturday.

Considering the draw was only made in Switzerland on Friday at midday, it shows just how quickly the Germans moved. All of which, of course, is a compliment to Rangers.

The Germans at Gayfield were internationalists Bertie Vogts and Rainer Bonhof, along with their club's Press officer Wa Hurtmanns.

And, without giving much away, they did praise the Rangers' performance and, more particularly, young Alex O'Hara.

Said the 45-times capped Vogts: "He is very good for

one so young and took his goals well. But I was impressed with other Rangers players too."

While these three were in Scotland, incidentally, their team retained their Bundesliga lead by beating MSV Duisburg 2-1 away from home.

Rangers could hardly have got a tougher draw for Borussia are THE team in Germany at the moment and, although they transferred the brilliant Gunter Netzer recently, they can still call on players like Vogts, Bonhof, outstanding goalkeeper, Wolfgang Kleff, midfield men Dietmar Danner and Herbert Wimmer, strikers Henning Jensen, a Danish international, Rupp, and young goal ace Heynkess.

These should be two outstanding matches with the first leg to be played in Germany on October 24 and the return at Ibrox on November 7.

THERE wasn't a Rangers player on the park last Wednesday who was sorry when referee Rolf Nypus of Norway blew his whistle for the 100th — and last — time.

For the players were subjected to a new low level of gamesmanship and outrageous tackling which, even by certain European standards, had sunk lower than normal.

It really was a disgraceful display from the Ankaragucu players and one which certainly didn't enhance their reputation in any way.

The first Turk to get into bother was Coskun after he clashed with Ibrox captain John Greig and was involved in a melee which involved a number of players.

Next was Rangers' only black mark of the night when

Alfie Conn was booked for retaliating on Metin.

But all that, unfortunately, was just the start for the Turks by this time had realised all was lost as far as saving the tie was concerned.

So they set about a policy of deliberate antagonisation. Shortly after the interval, Ismail's name went into the book and then Coskun, booked previously remember, was sent off for a particularly vicious kick at Tom Forsyth.

Next, everybody except the referee and his linesmen saw why Alex MacDonald collapsed in a heap after clashing with Mehmet. Still they were not content, however, and after 70 minutes, the Turks were reduced to nine men when Erman was ordered off for a bad tackle on Doug Houston.

The goals are almost incidental amongst all this, yet the first — after 10 minutes

— was a beauty. Tommy McLean and Alex O'Hara set it up and John Greig finished it off with a tremendous 22-yard shot.

Then, as Rangers played all the football there was in that bitter second half, they added further goals through Alex O'Hara — he deserved it after hitting the bar previously — John Greig again and, in the last minute, Derek Johnstone.

'This is a great chance'

— SAYS JOE MASON

IT was fully two days — last Wednesday in fact — after the announcement had been made, that Joe Mason fully realised his playing days were over and that he is now Rangers' assistant trainer.

He's delighted with the move but, until Wednesday lunchtime, it hadn't really sunk in. Then, the Rangers party at Largs went down to their hotel dining room and, while Joe sat down with manager Jock Wallace and physiotherapist Tommy Craig, the players sat at another table.

It was a small point but it wasn't lost on Joe and when various players called across to ask if "Coach" was alright, he realised the full significance of the switch.

"Of course it's a wrench giving up the playing side of the game. After all, I've been involved as a player for 13 years now.

"I joined Kilmarnock in 1960 and stayed there until 1966. During that time Willie Waddell was manager and then I moved on to Morton before signing for Rangers almost a year ago to the day that this appointment came through.

"Let me say it was a complete surprise when the Boss called me into tell me. And I can add quite definitely that I wouldn't have stopped playing at the moment for any other team but Rangers. I'm only 32 after all.

"I've really enjoyed my year as a player here and I have learned a lot from general manager Willie Waddell and manager Jock Wallace.

"But now I must start devoting my energies to the training and coaching of the young players here . . . and there are some exciting prospects.

"My work will be almost entirely with the youngsters and the reserves who, of course, do the same training as the first team. It will be very interesting and I will be doing everything I can to make a go of it."

Joe's wife, Veronica, was equally pleased about her husband's move to the "behind-the-scenes" post. "We didn't know a thing about it until Mr. Wallace phoned Joe saying he wanted to see him. And as soon as Joe knew he phoned to tell me.

"I'm delighted for him. I know he's going to find it a wrench not playing but this is a great chance and he's looking forward to working with the youngsters."

"It was a straight replacement in the pool — Hammy for Joe. Johnny's been doing alright in the reserves, and he's part of the first team squad anyway."

And being called down to Largs might just be the boost Hammy needed. For, after a bright start when he scored a goal against Montrose in the Drybrough Cup, he faded

out of the scene a bit. Mind you, since then he's knocked in a few goals for the Reserves and generally, played well in the second string's fine start to the season.

So we might well see Johnny coming back now and there's no doubt that a player with as much skill as the former Hib has, is an asset to Jock Wallace's plans.

Tough 'debut' — But Alex's all for Europe

One Turk(ey) with no bite!

It was all good fun in their Largs hotel. . . before Rangers travelled to Ibrox for the gruelling second leg against Ankaragucu.

ONE of the few good things — apart from the victory and the four goals — to come out of the European Cup Winners Cup tie against Ankaragucu was the display of young Alex O'Hara.

The 16-year-old could hardly have had a tougher introduction to football at European level . . . but he revelled in it.

Certainly, the fiery baptism and the tough tackling Turks didn't diminish his appetite for more in any way!

"What an experience that was," said Alex.

"I had heard about games like that and I had watched the occasional game in Argentina on the television but that was the first time I've been involved in anything like it.

"Some of the tackling was outrageous but fortunately I was never too heavily involved in the worst of it.

"At one point, mind you, it was brought home to me just what was going on. That was when the Turkish number eight walked past and nipped my cheek. I couldn't believe it and at that point I was mad but you have to accept it. At other times I just laughed because there's no point in doing anything else."

That is the kind of professional attitude which makes Alex such a valuable player. It shows the lad has the right temperament to go with his undoubted ability.

On a night of bitter feuding the youngster could have been forgiven for wondering what it was all about and perhaps even getting himself needlessly involved but he didn't . . . and that's to his credit.

"Alex isn't interested in feuding or anything like that," said manager Jock Wallace. "His primary concern is playing football regardless of what else is going on. I thought he did well in his first game of this sort."

Hit the bar

He certainly did for he led the line with skill and bravery and scored the third goal into the bargain. But that was no more than he was due for he had previously seen the keeper make a marvellous save from a good header and had also hit the bar with a raging shot.

"I was delighted to get that goal but I got so much help from the rest of the boys, before, during and after the game. They made it much easier for me."

Despite Alex's modesty, we reckon he came through a difficult game with a lot of credit.

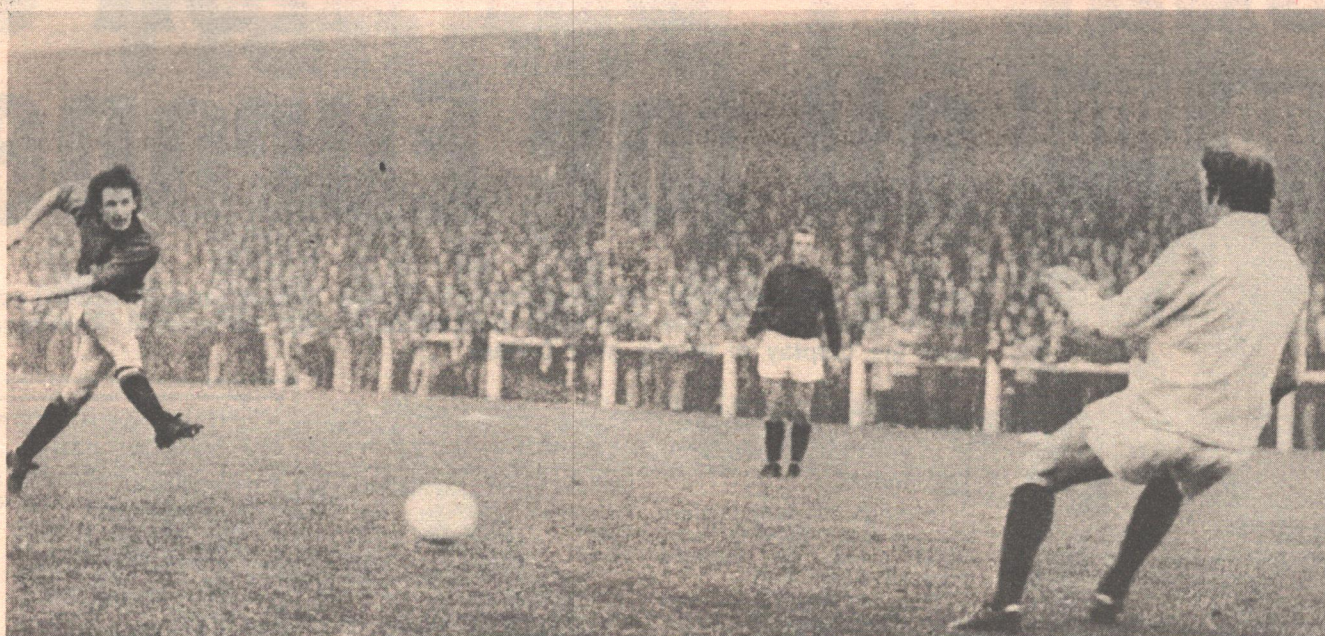

SIXTEEN-YEAR-OLD Alex O'Hara firmly established himself as a favourite with the Rangers fans when he turned on a great display against Arbroath at Gayfield on Saturday.

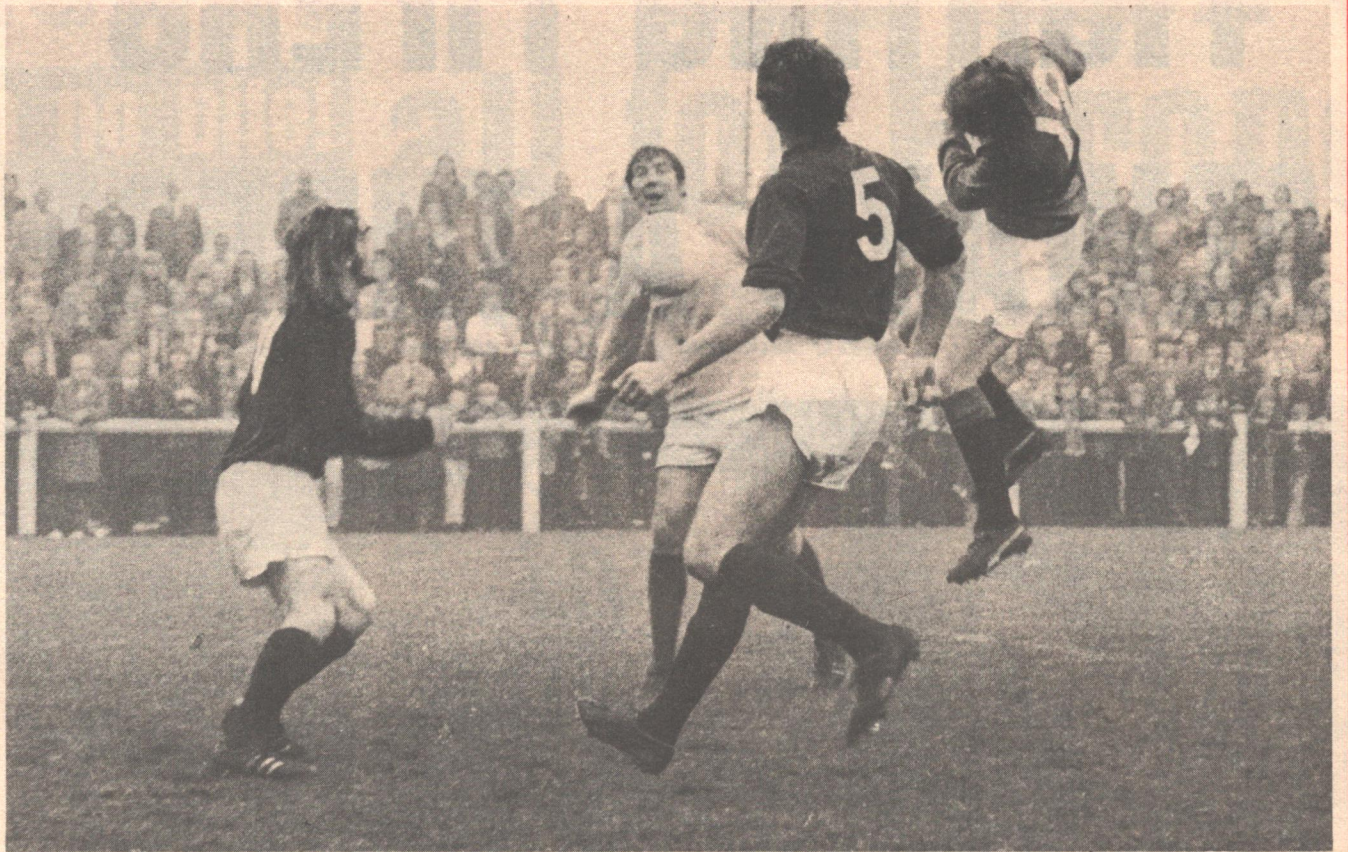

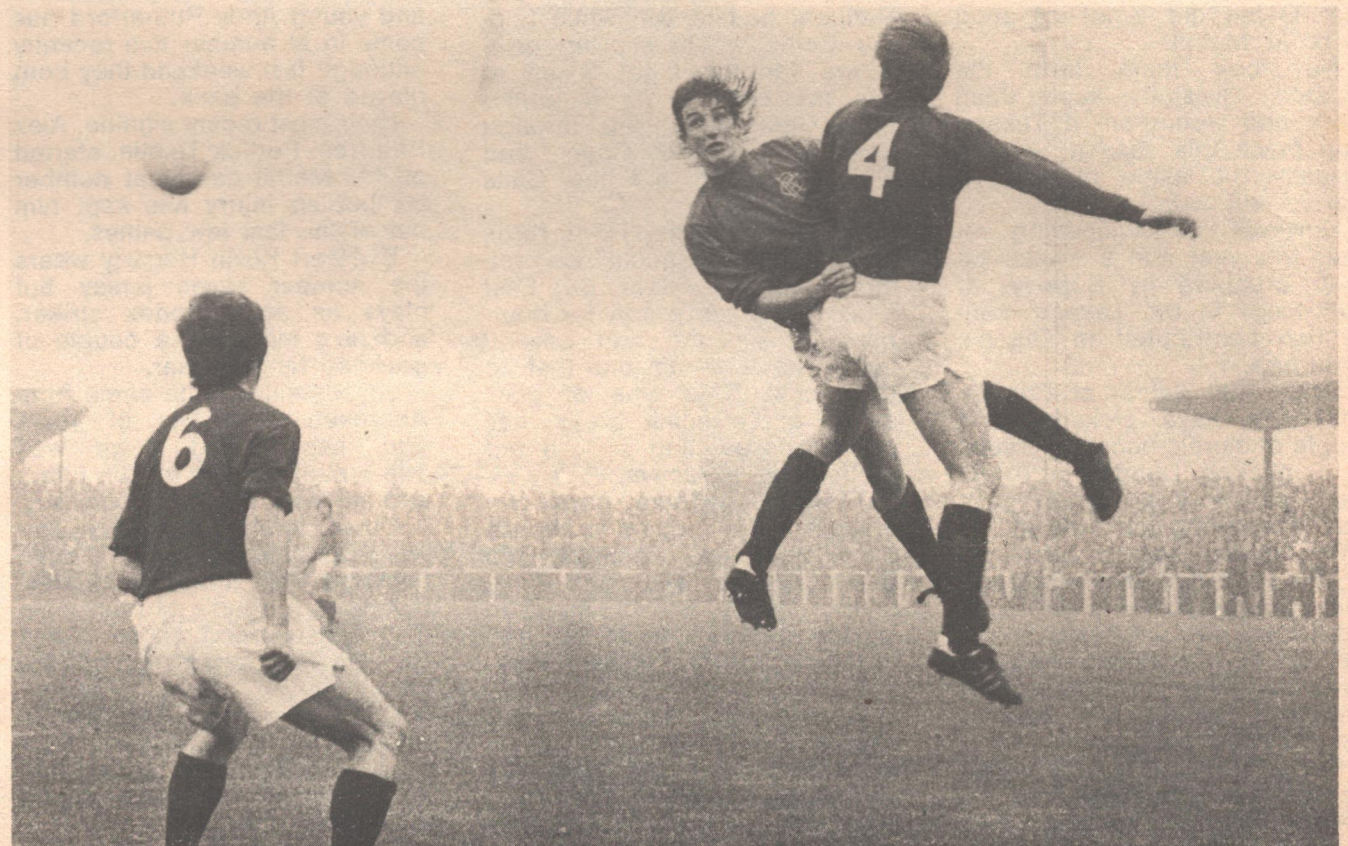

FIGHTING FIFERS ALWAYS A THREAT

EAST FIFE have hardly set the heather on fire with their performances so far this season . . . but the off-field activity in the club certainly set people talking a couple of weeks ago.

It was then that the Methil club and manager Pat Quinn parted company.

On the face of it, results hadn't been good for the Fifers but, equally, there is no doubt that Quinn did a lot of good work at Methil.

He took them from the Second Division, kept them there and won them a Texaco Cup place this season — with virtually the same players he started out with.

However, these opening results this year and a disastrous 7—0 drubbing by Burnley, at Turf Moor in the Texaco competition contributed to Quinn's departure.

Since that defeat at Burnley East Fife have picked up a couple of morale-boosting results . . . beating Dundee at Dens Park, which is never an easy feat, and losing narrowly in the return match against Burnley.

This is the first clash this season between Rangers and East Fife. In the two fixtures between the teams last year, Rangers gave the Fifers an unwelcome Christmas present by beating them 4—0 at Methil.

Rangers' scorers that day were Derek Johnstone, with a double, Derek Parlane and Quinton Young.

Perhaps the return game at Ibrox will be best remembered because it was the last League

match of the season . . . and Rangers had to win while hoping Celtic would slip up elsewhere for the Light Blues to win the League. As it turned out, 'Gers won 2—0 through goals by Alfie Conn and Quinton Young but the Celts won too.

Saturday's game is at Ibrox and Rangers should be too strong for the Fifers. But East Fife have a reputation for dourness in defence and several teams have found out that to their cost. This type of play, allied to the quick break, has proved devastating . . . if not particularly attractive.

The Methil team have two first-class goalkeepers to choose from in Dave Gorman and Ernie McGarr. That pair have been chopped and changed all season with McGarr in the lead at the moment as far as appearances go.

Former Hibs Bobby Duncan has proved a great signing and his experience, as well as his undoubted ability at the back, seem to be typical of the defence.

Ian Printy, who signed from Newtongrange Star last year, is the regular full back partner

for Duncan and this youngster wasted no time at all in establishing himself in the team.

Another player who joined the Methil club straight from the junior scene is wing half John Love. He signed from Bonnyrigg Rose about the same time as Printy joined the Fifers squad.

The experienced John Martic is taking a back seat this term and young Andy Rutherford has come in at number five recently although last weekend they both played at the back.

Their most recent signing, Alex Rae from Partick Thistle, started off his Methil career at number six but an injury has kept him out of the last few games.

Ex-Heart Kevin Hegarty wears the number seven jersey but plays as an orthodox striker, and he's managed a couple of goals so far this year.

Jim Hamilton, who came from Aberdeen a couple of years ago, has settled down well into a midfield role for the Fifers and he was another good buy.

Other striker is centre forward Doug Dailey but he's been confined to the substitutes' bench on a couple of occasions this season and those times Graham Honeyman has led the line.

One player well known to Rangers fans is 'forward Billy McPhee who spent some time at Ibrox. He's also been among the goals this season.

That completes the line-up of East Fife. But without a Boss or not, you can guarantee the Fifers will put up a good show

Centre half is the experienced John Cushley, who was at one time a Parkhead stalwart but who is now doing a grand job at the back for the Sons. He is a

great influence on the youngsters around him and looks good for a few seasons yet.

Johnny Graham is one of the longest-serving Sons, having signed in 1968 from junior outfit Arthurlie.

Winger Peter Coleman, a signing from Albion Rovers in 1970, has proved to be a valuable member of Boghead squad with his fast raiding.

Another of the Sons' more experienced men is ex-Hearts and Celt, Willie Wallace. The striker turned midfielder man has gathered all his knowledge from the Scottish and English scenes — he was with Crystal Palace for a while — and is using it to good effect.

The principal Dumbarton strikers are usually big Roy McCormack and youngster Tom McAdam. Roy has proved his worth time and again since signing from Yoker in 1967 and is inevitably their top scorer at the end of every season. But one rival for that honour recently is McAdam. The fair-haired youngster is constantly under the eye of some bigger club but the strain of a possible transfer hasn't done him too much harm.

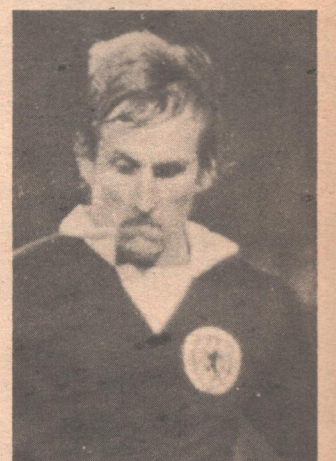

But even the Boss couldn't have realised just what was in store for his men. They were battered, bruised, kicked and crunched by the Turks as football took second place to feuding.

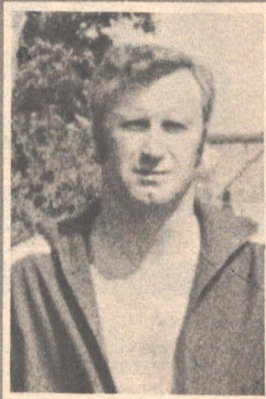

"I thought after the first leg that they might play it tough over here, but I didn't realise it would be that bad," admitted Jock.

"There were a couple of unpleasant incidents in Ankara which I — and the players — saw, so before the return match I told them to stay out of trouble . . . and

Only Alfie Conn and Tom Forsyth showed signs of wilting under the almost incessant attacks — and there's no other words for it — but they showed remarkable restraint as well.

Eventually that policy paid dividends as the team rattled in three late goals against the depleted Turks and calmly went through to the next round.
