So watch out for more news of the Hamburg jaunt after Ne'erday ... and spare a thought for the "News" postman who looks like having a very busy January.

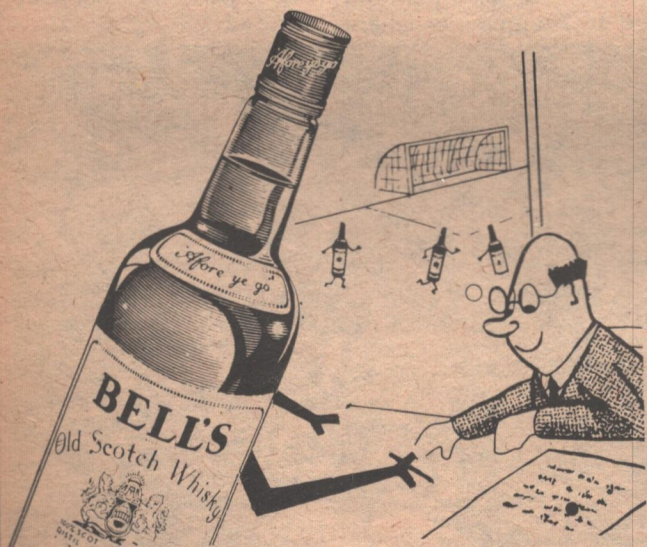

So without any further ado Andrew dropped into the "News" offices and ordered a year's subscription to be sent out to Hong Kong!

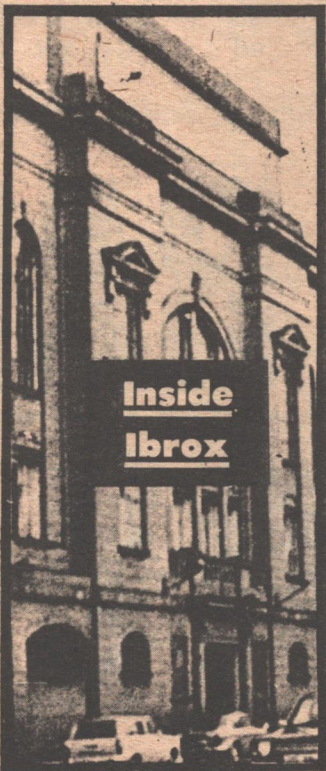
One of the ironic parts of this story, incidentally, is that brother John is Celtic-daft!

THERE were a few ears ringing in one of the Hampden dressing rooms last Wednesday night . . . and the man who was doing all the talking was disappointed team manager Jock Wallace.

### MATCH SLANT

The Ibrox boss had seen his men play well in a good first half during which they lost a soft goal to Celtic, fought back and scored a glorious equaliser through Alex McDonald.

But, with everything going to the Light Blues in the second half, they faded completely and allowed the Parkhead team to score twice more, have one "goal" disallowed and generally dictate play for the 45 minutes.

At the start of the game Rangers looked in the mood

for they were playing controlled football against a fierce wind and driving rain. The first of Hood's goals momentarily stunned them but they recovered and were holding their own until the interval.

What astonished everyone was that second half fade . . . for no apparent reason. But Jock let the players know in no uncertain terms he was far from happy with that second-half performance.

It was a disappointing end to Rangers' excellent

run in the tournament and a match they will want to forget very quickly.

# Captain John promises real League race

"So much could happen between now and the end of May, the picture could change entirely."

ELSEWHERE in this week's News we've told you how disappointed Ibrox manager Jock Wallace was after that League Cup defeat last Wednesday.

But in case you, the fans, had any doubts about how disappointed the players were too . . . we can tell you right now that they were as sick as anyone else — in fact, more so.

They know they didn't play as well in that dismal second half but now, equally, they're right in the mood to atone for the defeat.

## Best chances

Captain John Greig spoke for them all when he told the "News": "Sure, the League Cup was one of our best chances to win a trophy. But, remember, there are two other big ones still open to us and, anyway, we still would have had a final to play in the League Cup. "We were very disappointed at going out of that competition in the way we did but right now our main concern is to pull back points in the League Championship.

## Determined

"And that's a race that's far from finished. I can't accept at this stage that any one team are certainties to take the flag. "We haven't even reached Christmas yet although people are saying it's all over. So much can happen between now and May which could change the position entirely.

"There are the possibili-

ties of difficult grounds, of a team being badly hit by injuries, of the top teams beating each other and leaving the way open for us. A lot could happen.

"We have no control over that, but what we can do is make sure we keep on winning. IT'S OUR AIM NOW TO KEEP ON PICKING UP FULL POINTS. If we do well . . ."

That puts you all in exactly the picture on how determined the players are to make up for their League Cup exist.

## 'KEEPER KENNEDY JUST BEATEN BY SNOW-AGAIN

STEWART KENNEDY looked out of Ibrox last Friday afternoon as the snow fell . . . and wondered briefly if it really was possible for lightning to strike twice!

"Dave has been very patient in waiting for his chance to come."



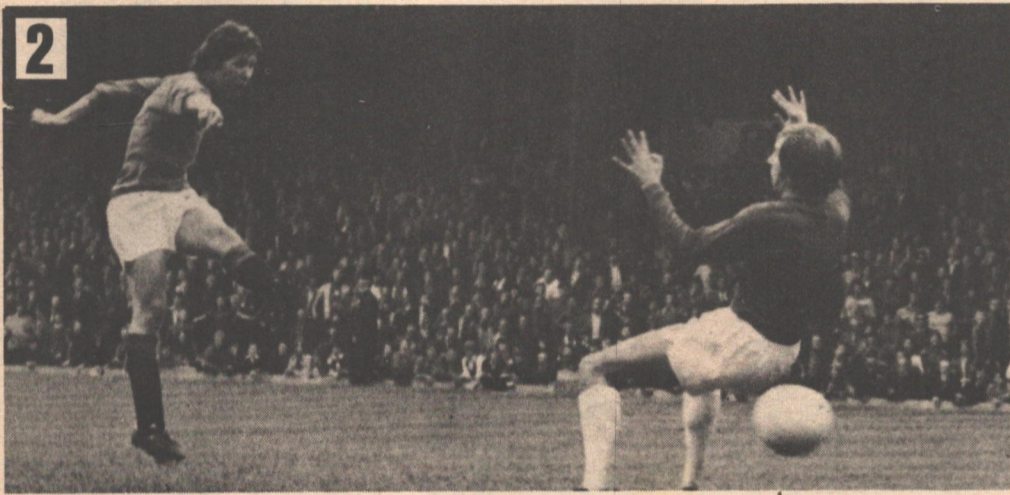

"Growing with Glory."

Mr White also paid glowing tribute to Rangers' history during the formal opening speeches and Mr Taylor, on the Club's behalf, replied to both.

But after the formal opening councillors, Rangers players past and present, Ibrox officials, representatives of many other clubs, newspaper executives, and all the guests relaxed and enjoyed the evening's entertainment.

There was something for everyone, with those who enjoy singing at its very best being able to adjourn to the Council Hall where the Glasgow Youth Choir, conducted by Agnes Hoey and accompanied by Nancy Hutcheson, were in magnificent form.

Others stayed where they were for dancing to the George McCulloch Orchestra while still more mixed with friends and acquaintances in the comfortable lounges.

During the evening guests were given an excellent buffet meal. The Corporation certainly did Rangers proud on what, after all, is a magnificent achievement.

No other club in the world can boast a history like Rangers. It was fittingly commemorated by Glasgow . . . a footballing city.



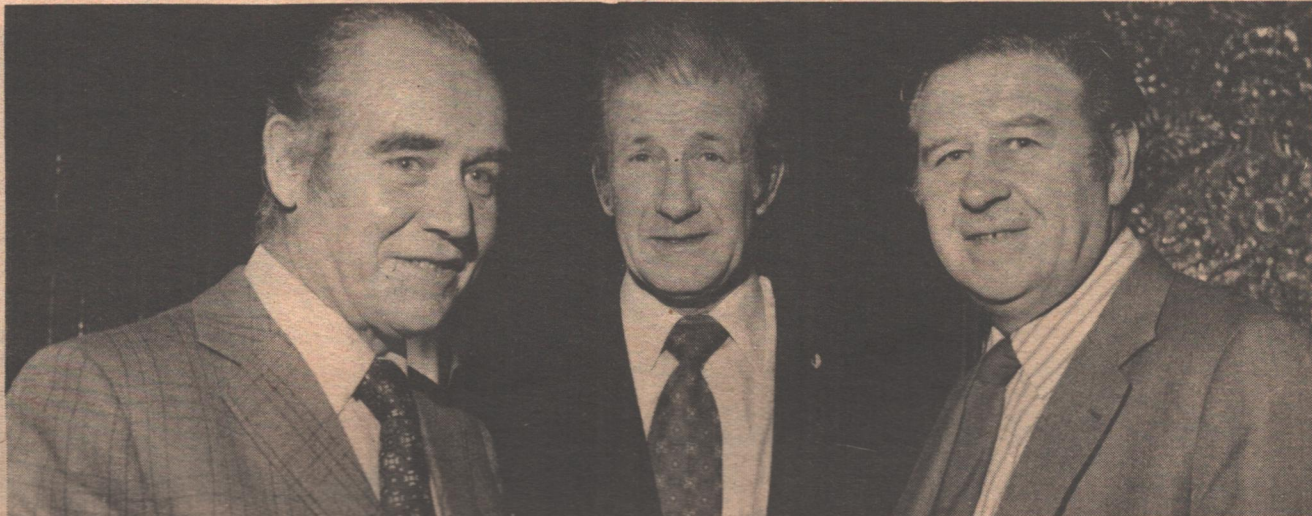

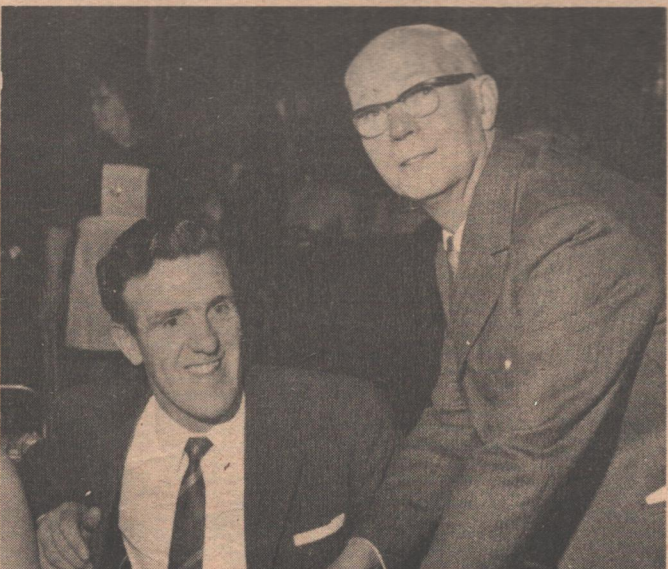

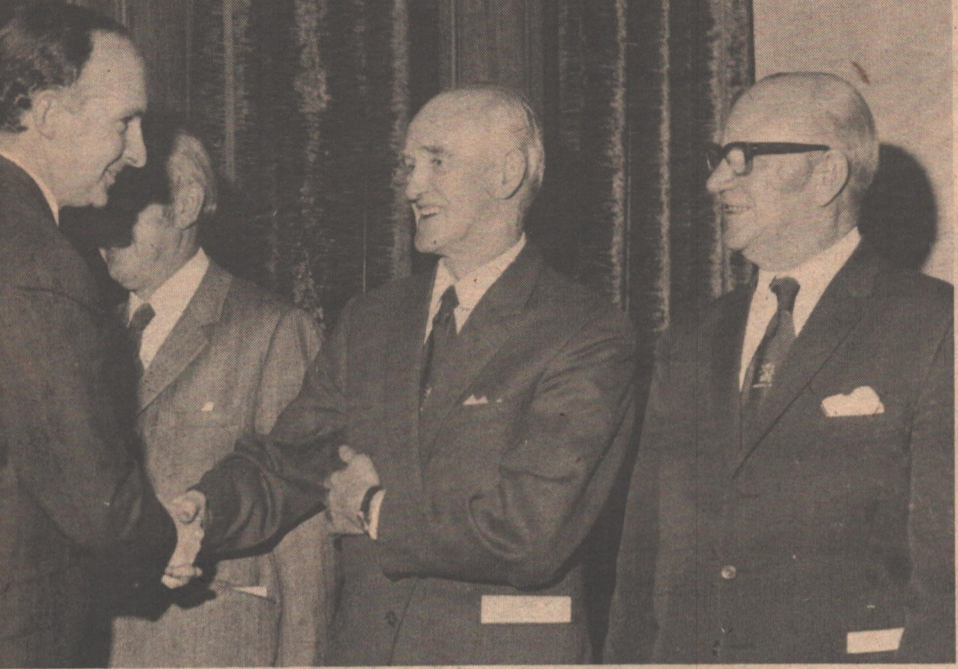

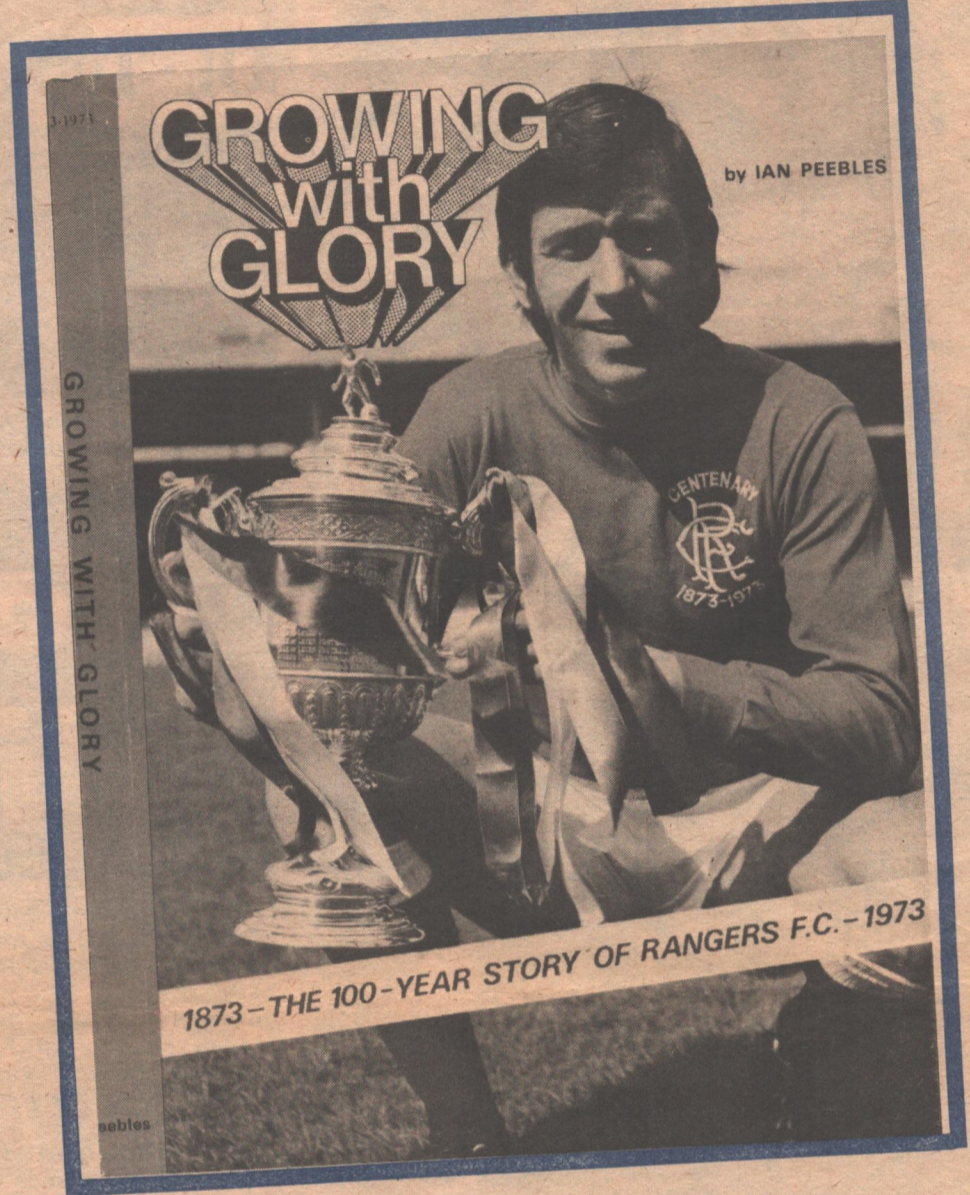

# No reward for slick 'saints'...

IT'S a constant source of amazement to many people in Scottish football circles that St. Johnstone, who have played such good football in recent years, haven't won any trophies.

The experts point to a solid, reliable defence and some very talented forwards and say: "Just why don't they do better?"

Lack of consistency is one reason why they never show particularly strongly in the League. In the last

few seasons that inconsistency may well have cost them dearly. For in each of the last three seasons they have shown enough — in flashes — to suggest great things.

In 1970-71 they managed third place in the Championship — their best-ever — and in the last two years have finished respectably.

Admittedly, a managerial change-over last season didn't help their cause. Certainly the new Boss has achieved some

excellent results, notably a high-scoring League Cup double over Partick Thistle and a 2-1 win over Celtic.

These results show what Saints can do.

Manager Stewart took over a fair quota of talent when he moved from Dumbarton to Perth and he has introduced a few youngsters himself who make the future look very rosy.

In goals, though, is Derek Robertson. He and Jim Donaldson have been battling it out between them for the number one jersey for years. Although Jim was in charge for the early part of the season Derek took over back in October and has been playing since.

## Ever-present

Exactly the same situation exists at right back where Ex-Bairn John Lambie was in possession up to the same time as Donaldson was playing. Since that day, however, his spot has been occupied by ex-Largs Thistle player Willie Ritchie.

The position on the other side of the park is more permanent with Jim Argue having played in almost every game for Saints this season.

The same applies at right half where fair-haired Alex Rennie is an ever-present. Since signing from Stirling Albion in 1967, Alex's proved his worth over and over again.

One of the 'finds' of the season in Scotland has

been centre half McDonald, brought Elgin City last year. A host of clubs which have shown interest in him already seem to have decided he's one for the future.

Left half seems to have been something of a blemish this season with Neil Smith, Ritchie Crammond all having appeared there. It's youngster Crammond though, who's in possession at the moment.

Up front, Saints have a bundle of talent starting with wingers Henry John Muir and Fred Allan. All have played a number of games this season.

Elsewhere in a Saints have the outstanding Jim Pearson — another regular target for the big-money boys, and don Smith who was signed up, incidentally, by Rangers Boys' club. Youngster John Hotson, end-of-last-season Scotland boy signing, McQuade.

Games between Saints and St. Johnstone are usually exciting encounters and the Perth men have won two of the last three when the teams meet at Muirton Park on Saturday.

In last season's League game at Muirton Park Rangers won 5-1 through goals by Alfie Conn (2), Derek Parlane (2) and Sandy Jardine. St. Johnstone, against Stirling Albion, countered with Muir.

In the return at Perth was Joe Mason and Alex Miller — neither of whom are playing for the team now — who scored while Benny Rooney, of Partick Thistle, got the goal for St. Johnstone.
