RANGERS AIM FOR FOUR IN A ROW...

INCREDIBLE as it may seem, since Airdrie and Rangers have been meeting in the League for 50 years now, today is only the **FOURTH** Scottish Cup battle between the clubs.

And, indeed, the meetings have all come inside the past 10 years.

The teams first met in the Cup in the second round at Broomfield in season 1962-63 — and Rangers cruised through with a 6-0 victory. The goals that day came from Davy Wilson (3) Willie Henderson, Ralph Brand and an own goal.

The next meeting was at Ibrox in the first round in season 1965-66 — and again it was a big win for Rangers . . . 5-1 this time. Again the game produced a hat-trick for an Ibrox player — George McLean hitting the treble on this occasion. Davy Wilson was again a scorer

with Willie Johnston getting the other and Davie Marshall netting for Airdrie.

In 1968-69 the clubs met at the same stage as they clash today — the quarter-finals. This time it was a much closer affair with only a John Greig penalty getting Rangers through 1-0.

So it has been victory every time for Rangers. And by coincidence each win over the Broomfielders has been followed by a Cup Final appearance . . . against Celtic!

In 62-63 the Old Firm met at Hampden and after a 1-1 draw Rangers won the replay 3-0.

It needed a replay again in 65-66 after a goal-less first game, and once more the Cup went to Ibrox thanks to a memorable score by right back Kai Johansen for the only goal of the Final.

In 1968-69 it was Celtic's turn to win — scoring a 4-0 victory at Hampden.

Airdrie have once been triumphant in the Scottish Cup — winning the 1924 Final when they beat Hibs 2-0.

At the moment, of course, the Broomfielders are fighting for their First Division existence and are anchored at the foot of the table.

But that doesn't make them any less formidable opponents today and when they visited Ibrox in the League back in November they only went down by 1-0.

By coincidence, if the clubs had not been drawn together in the Cup today they would have been meeting at Broomfield in a League match which would be carrying vital significance for both clubs.

Barring replays, this League match will probably be played next midweek.

Airdrie are, of course, part-time and their team will come from the following pool:

Goalkeeper **RODDY McKENZIE**. 6ft. 12½ stone. Signed from Drumchapel Amateurs in 1963, Roddy is Irish-born and has been capped by Northern Ireland — winning one full, two Under-23 and two 'B' honours. Away from football he is a time study engineer. Played in 36 matches for Airdrie this season.

Goalkeeper **MARSHALL POULTON**. 5ft. 9in., 10st. 2lbs. Youngster who only joined up at Broomfield this year from the local Airdrie Academy and has deputised for McKenzie three times.



Full back **PAUL JONQUIN**. 5ft. 10in., 10st. 5lbs. Longest serving player on the Broomfield books, having signed from Edinburgh Athletic in 1960. A photographer, Paul has made 38 appearances for his club this season.

Full back **GEORGE CALDWELL**. 5ft. 10in., 11st. 5lbs. Signed from Glenafton Athletic in 1963 this tall defender has proved to be a good club man for Airdrie in his 10 years at Broomfield. An engineer. 29 appearances this season.

Full back **WALTER CLARKE**. Only 5ft. 7in., and 10st. 4lbs., but a really fast enthusiastic player. A local lad, he joined the club as an S form player in 1967 and signed the following year.



DREW BUSBY

Won schools caps at all levels. Currently at Jordanhill College training to be a teacher after graduating from Glasgow University this year as an M.A., with honours in Economics and Modern History. 18 appearances this term.

Wing half JOHN MENZIES. 5ft. 9in., 11st. 8lbs. This former Partick Thistle player — he joined Airdrie from Jags in 1966 — is a versatile, hard-working professional, the kind who can do a job in any position. John works in advertising. Played in 35 games this season.

Centre half COLUMB MCKINLAY. This big, powerful defender — he stands 6ft. 1in., and weighs in nearly 13 stone — joined Airdrie from junior club Vale of Leven in 1970.

Wing half JIM FRASER. Tops the 6ft. mark, and weighs around 11½ stone. Recently signed by Airdrie from Dunfermline where he spent 10 years with the Fife club. Broke his leg a couple of seasons back, but has fought back to full fitness again. 21 games so far this term.

Wing half DEREK WHITEFORD. The Broomfield skipper, and an inspiring example to the men around him. The former Hibs man is 6ft., and weighs 12½ stone. A teacher of physical education at local schools, he made 52 appearances for Airdrie last season and scored 17 goals, which made him the club's third top marksman. This season he has netted seven times. A former Youth internationalist, his cousin John is an Airdrie player while another cousin David is with Motherwell. Played 37 games this season.

Wing half TOMMY WALKER. 5ft. 11in., 12st. 4lbs. Cost £15,000 from Arbroath at the start of last season. Talented midfielder player, he is a former schools internationalist. Lives in Arbroath and is a student at Dundee University. 30 appearances this season.

Winger WILLIE WILSON. 5ft. 6in., 10st. 13lbs. Signed from junior club Kilsyth Rangers in 1967. Fast and direct he is a maker of goals rather than a marksman. A bricklayer to trade he has played 25 times this season and scored 3 goals.

Forward JOHN FURY. 5ft. 7in.,

11st. Signed from Mount Ellen in 1971, he made four first-team appearances last season and was a regular at the start of this term although he has now lost his place. Stocky, aggressive attacker he has netted six times this term.

Forward ANDY THOMSON. Slightly built teenager — 5ft. 6in., 9 stone — who was with Airdrie Boys Club before being called up last term. An apprentice motor mechanic, he is a talented midfield player who looks to have a great future ahead of him.

Forward ALISTAIR McROBERTS. Signed just after the start of this season from Bonkle Y.C. and has made the breakthrough to the first team very quickly following impressive displays in the reserves.

Striker DREW BUSBY. 5ft. 7in., 11 stone. Not big, but very strong and brave and a great chance-taker. He was signed from Vale of Leven two years ago after having had previous senior experience with the now defunct Third Lanark. Netted 18 goals in 48 games last season, and has scored 15 times this season including a hat-trick against Dumbarton last week.

Forward MARK COWAN. 5ft. 10in., 11st. 4lbs. The boy with the George Best looks. Went south from Larkhall Academy to join West Brom, but then returned to Airdrie in 1969. Played 34 times last season. A student at Jordanhill College where he is studying physical education. Made 35 appearances so far this term.

Inside forward BILLY HULSTON is a recent signing from Clyde. He was bought with the purpose of linking up with Busby as a twin scoring force and so far in six games he has netted three times. A joiner in Stirling, he was with East Stirling before going to Shawfield.

Winger KEVIN McCANN. 5ft. 7in., 10st. 6lbs. A tricky, talented youngster who was signed from Carlisle Rovers in 1972. Made his break-through only a couple of months ago and has now made nine first-team appearances. Has scored one goal, but a memorable one — the winner against Celtic in a 2-1 win at Broomfield recently.

MAN IN THE MIDDLE

26 years in charge

Making his fifth appearance of the season at Ibrox today — and his second game in succession — is Scotland's top referee Alastair MacKenzie of Larbert. Mr. MacKenzie was in charge of the match against Dundee last week. Just a few days previous to that he was in Yugoslavia for his FIFTH Continental refereeing assignment of the season. He was in control of the game between O.F.K. Belgrade and F.C. Twente of Holland in a tie which ended in a 3-2 win for the home side. "It was quite a good game — but a bit hectic," says Mr. MacKenzie, a company director in Whitburn, but lives in Larbert with his wife and three children. He has been a referee for 26 years, and has been a Grade One official for the past 15 years. Was in charge of this season's League Cup Final and last season's Scottish Cup Final.

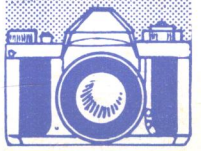

A FINE first-half goal by inside-left Graham Fyfe gave the Rangers Reserves a 1-0 victory over Dundee in a hard-fought match at Dens Park last week.

It was a welcome win for the Colts, whose League form this season has been disappointingly inconsistent.

They have also slipped a few matches behind because of postponements and are unable to clear up the back-log at the moment because the outstanding games are all at home . . . and currently the first team have also hit a run of home games.

Today's meeting with Airdrie also had to be put off because of the Cup clash at Ibrox, so that's another one added to the list.

"It's unfortunate, but it can't be helped," says coach Stan Anderson. "We've tried to fix up some away games but without success. It looks as though we'll have a crush nearer the end of the season."

Coach Anderson was naturally pleased with the Dens win, particularly since Dundee had out a strong team with a sprinkling of very experienced players.

"The team played really well — particularly in the second half," says the Ibrox coach.

"Graham Fyfe's goal was a cracker — he beat a couple of men before scoring."

That was in the first half, but after the break Graham missed a great chance

to get another goal when he failed to net from close range after a fine build-up.

But Graham's overall play, particularly his hard work throughout, earned him praise from coach Anderson.

Two of the team's more experienced men, defenders Ron McKinnon and Colin Jackson were also in top form and played a major part in the win.

And young Ian Thomson, at right back this time, turned in another solid performance.

"I would have no hesitation in putting Ian forward for a first team place if there was a vacancy," says coach Anderson.

"He does a great marking job, gives little away and is very pacy."

Back in the Ibrox team were youngsters George Donaldson and Billy McNicol, who had arrived home from France only 24 hours beforehand after helping the Scottish Professional Youth side to a 3-0 victory in Paris in the European Youth tournament.

Both earned praise from Scottish officials for their performance against the French — with young Billy netting one of the goals.

FIXTURE SNAG

The Ibrox boys are certain starters for the second leg against the French at Fir Park on March 28 — and also for a place in the Scottish squad which will play in the Final stages of this year's European Youth Tournament in Italy in May.

The Scots only need a point from the Fir Park meeting with France to clinch a Final place — and both Billy and George feel that this is well within the reach of the Youth squad after that showing in Paris.

Warning from Rangers

Rangers Football Club have urged all supporters clubs to follow their ten-point plan to curb hooliganism in the Stadium. Any supporter who does not adhere to these rules at Ibrox, or anywhere else for that matter, will be severely dealt with. So follow the Code . . . for the good name of the Club.

The ten golden rules are:

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracings.

4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the road-side when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.

10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

... AND PLAY IT SAFE!

Rangers Football Club ask all fans to co-operate and make sure that everyone leaves the ground with the maximum of comfort and safety by following this procedure at the end of the game:

1. Take your time leaving the Stadium.
2. If you see that passages or stairways are becoming jammed — hold back. You will only be delayed for a few moments.
3. Help any youngster, old person — anyone, in fact — if you think they are having difficulty.
4. Be particularly careful on the exit stairs, and avoid jostling as much as possible.
5. Abide by Stewards' and Police Instructions.
