FIFERS' UNIQUE CUP DOUBLE

EAST FIFE and Cups . . . at one time the two were inseparably linked, although in recent years the Fifers have not enjoyed quite such a reputation.

Back in 1938 the Fifers put the club into the history books with an astonishing Scottish Cup success.

They beat Kilmarnock 4-2 at Hampden in the Final replay after a 1-1 draw. **AND THEY WERE A SECOND DIVISION TEAM AT THAT TIME, IT WAS A SENSATIONAL WIN.**

After the war they picked up the winning trend again, but unfortunately for them kept running into Rangers in the Scottish Cup . . . losing to the Light Blues in the quarter-finals in '47-'48, the semi-final at Hampden in '48-'49 and finally in '49-'50 went down 3-0 to the Brox men in the Final at Hampden.

They had considerably more success in the League Cup, winning the trophy three times inside seven years.

Their first victory came in 1947-48 when they defeated Falkirk 4-1 in the Final at Hampden in a replay after a goal-less first game. **AND AGAIN THIS WAS ACHIEVED AS A SECOND DIVISION TEAM, GIVING THE FIFERS A CUP DOUBLE UNIQUE IN SCOTTISH SOCCER.**

In 1949-50 the Fifers did it again, beating another team from the 'Kingdom'—Dunfermline—3-0 in the Final, after having disposed of Rangers 2-1 in the semi-final in extra time.

Their third win was in 1953-54 when a last-minute Frank Christie goal gave them a 3-2 win over Partick Thistle at Hampden.

Two Fife players, Sammy Stewart and Willie Finlay, collected three medals each from that great run.

The Fifers were founded in 1903, and apart from their Cup successes have been Second Division champions in '47-'48, and runners-up in '29-'30 and '70-'71.

They were relegated in 1957-58 and didn't regain First Division status until 1970-71.

They finished comfortably in the middle of the table last season, and qualified for a Texaco Cup place.

This season they have struggled a bit, but their reputation as fighters remains and they will be a hard team to beat.

IT'S A FACT

STILL TO WIN AT IBROX

THE RECORD ATTENDANCE at Bayview is 22,515 for a Division One game against local rivals Raith Rovers on January 2, 1950.

East Fife's record win was 13-2 over Edinburgh City in the Second Division on December 11, 1937.

Their heaviest defeat was 9-0 by Hearts at Tynecastle on October 5, 1957 in a First Division match.

Record individual score for the club is seven goals by centre Joe Cowan in the 9-1 win over Dumbarton in a home Second Division match in September 1934.

Highest number of goals in a season was 54 by centre Henry Morris in 1947-48.

Record aggregate scorer for the club is George Dewar, who hit 195 goals between 1960-61 and 1969-70.

They have had eight players capped by Scotland.

Today will be the 27th League meeting between the clubs.

Rangers have won 19 of the previous 26 games; three have been drawn and East Fife have won four times . . . but never at Ibrox.

The three draws were all at Ibrox—2-2 in 1949-50; 1-1 in '51-'52 and 3-3 in '57-'58.

Rangers have scored 72 goals in the 26 games and conceded 20.

★ Goalkeeper **ERNIE MCGARR**. 6ft, 11st 4lbs. Former Aberdeen and Dunfermline keeper who was signed in 1972. Played in 17 League matches last season.

★ Goalkeeper **DAVE GORMAN**. 5ft 8in 11st 12lbs. Also played in 17 League matches last season, which shows just how closely he challenges McGarr for the first-team spot.

★ Full back **BOBBY DUNCAN**. 5ft 10in 11st. Big powerful defender who joined the Fifers in 1971 from Hibs where he was a first-team regular until he broke his leg. A 28-year-old, he works with a security firm.

★ Full back **IAN PRINTY**. 5ft 9in, 10st 7lbs. Signed from Newtongrange Star in 1972 and played 22 League games last season. Only missed once this term.

★ Defender **WALTER BORTHWICK**. 5ft 9½in, 11st 10lbs. Former Youth internationalist with Morton, he joined East Fife in 1967. Now 25 and works as a civil servant.

★ Defender **JOHN MARTIS**. 5ft 11in, 12st 4lbs. Veteran pivot (he's 33) who joined the club in 1969 when he returned from a spell in South African football. Never missed a League match last season, but earlier this term lost his first-team place and only recently regained it. Won cap against Wales in 1961 in his Motherwell playing days. Still lives in Motherwell and is a maintenance plumber in a Lanarkshire steel works.

★ Defender **DAVE CLARKE**. 5ft 7½in, 10st 7lbs. Signed from Edinburgh youth football in 1968. Plays either full back or sweeper. Works as an electrician in Kirkcaldy colliery.

★ Midfield man **JIM HAMILTON**. 5ft 10in, 10st 12lbs. This 22-year-old was signed from Aberdeen in 1971 and has become a key midfield player for the club. Played in 33 League matches last season, wearing No. 10, 4, 8 and 6 jerseys. Works with a printing company.

★ Forward **JOHN LOVE**. 5ft 9in, 10st 11lbs. Signed from Penicuik Juniors in 1970. 21-year-old with an insurance firm.

★ Striker **KEVIN HEGARTY**. 5ft 10in, 10st. This ex-Hearts and Carlisle player was signed in '72. Now 23, he played in all 34 League matches last season in the No. 7, 8 and 10 jerseys. Works as a printer in Fife.

★ Striker **BILLY MCPHEE**. 5ft 8in, 11st 3lbs. Ex-Rangers winger who joined East Fife in 1970 after being released from Ibrox. Proved to be a fine signing, hitting 24 goals in his first season, 11 in the next and last term scored 19 in competitive matches. Played in all 34 League matches last season. Works as a civil servant.

★ Forward **GRAHAM RITCHIE**. 19-year-old winger who was signed in 1972 and farmed out to Arniston Rangers. This year he has made the breakthrough and played in seven matches.

★ Forward **GRAHAM HONEYMAN**. 5ft 11in, 10st 7lbs. Big strong 20-year-old who has attracted a lot of attention from down south. A civil servant in Dundee.

★ Forward **DOUG DAILEY**. 5ft 9½in, 11st 9lbs. Versatile 20-year-old (born on the Isle of Man) who signed in 1970 from a Glenrothes juvenile side. Played in 18 League matches last season. A motor mechanic.

★ Wing half **RON McIVOR**. 5ft 11in, 11st 7lbs. Signed in 1971 from Bonnyrigg Rose and played in five League matches last year.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the roadside when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

PLAY IT SAFE!

Rangers Football Club ask all fans to co-operate and make sure that everyone leaves the ground with the maximum of comfort and safety by following this procedure at the end of the game:

1. Take your time leaving the Stadium.
2. If you see that passages or stairways are becoming jammed — hold back. You will only be delayed for a few moments.
3. Help any youngster, old person — anyone, in fact — if you think they are having difficulty.
4. Be particularly careful on the exit stairs, and avoid jostling as much as possible.
5. Abide by Stewards' and Police Instructions.

Free kicks were Fifers' downfall

Double header from Derek ... and it was all over

RANGERS BANGED IN six goals against East Fife in two League matches last season without conceding one.

The first meeting was at Methil on December 23 and it produced four first-half goals for the Light Blues, who then coasted through the second half to a 4-0 win.

This match was just at the start of Rangers' determined run which took them back into a challenging place for the League Championship.

And it was big centre half Derek Johnstone who set the Ibrox men on the road to victory with two goals inside the first 20 minutes. He headed home the first in the fifth minute from a Quinton Young free kick and 15 minutes later got No. 2 with another brilliant header from a Sandy Jardine free this time.

Free-kicks were to be costly for the Fifers. For in the 41st minute wee Tommy McLean pushed yet another free to Joe Mason who crossed for Young to net with a diving header.

A minute later, with the Fifers still reeling, Young hit the crossbar and Derek Parlane banged in the rebound—and that was that. The second half brought a couple of escapes for Rangers, but no real problems. The teams were:

East Fife: McGarr; Duncan, Printy; Borthwick, Martis, Clarke; Hegarty, Hamilton, Honeyman, McIvor, McPhee.

Rangers: McCloy; Jardine, Mathieson; MacDonald, Johnstone, Forsyth; McLean, Mason, Parlane, Greig, Young.

The second meeting of the clubs was the last League match of the season at Ibrox on April 28, a game climaxing the Rangers effort to overhaul Celtic. They won 2-0, but failed in the flag bid by a point when Celtic defeated Hibs at Easter Road. Of course, a week later came the Scottish Cup Final and a 3-2 win over Celts for the Light Blues to make up for that championship disappointment.

Again the Light Blues got away to a good start against the Fifers, going 2-0 up after 32 minutes.

ANOTHER Cup cracker! That was the verdict of everyone at Ibrox with the news that Rangers had been drawn to meet German aces Borussia Munchengladbach in the second round of the Cup-Winners' Cup.

"There wasn't an easy game in the lot. So we won't fear the Germans."

The first leg is in Germany on October 24, with the return at Ibrox on November 7.

Borussia are currently the hot-shots of the German First Division. The team is stacked with top-class players apart from Vogts—striker Wimmer, Danish star Jensen, Rupp, Heynckes and keeper Kleff. All world-class players, so the challenge to Rangers will be quite something.

Borussia, with typical German thoroughness have already spied on the Light Blues—sending injured players Berti Vogts, a World Cup star, and Rainer Bonhof to Gayfield on Saturday.

Last season Borussia beat Aberdeen 9-5 on aggregate—winning 3-2 at Pittodrie and 6-3 in Germany—on their way to the Final of the U.E.F.A. Cup.

No doubt they will be back again—and it is equally certain that Ibrox manager Jock Wallace will return the compliment within the next week or so.

They also beat Hvidovre Copenhagen 6-1 on aggregate, then drubbed two German teams Cologne (0-0 and 5-0) Kaiserslautern (2-1 and 7-1) before beating F.C. Twente of Holland 5-1 on aggregate in the semi-final.

"We couldn't have landed it much tougher," says the Rangers manager. "But you've got to start meeting the best teams some time—we know that from our Cup-Winners' triumph of two years ago when we had to dispose of Rennes of France, Sporting Lisbon of Portugal, Torino of Italy, Bayern Munich of Germany and finally Moscow Dynamo of Russia in the Final.

In the Final they went down 3-0 to Liverpool at Anfield in the first leg and although Heynckes got a double in the second leg they couldn't catch Bill Shankly's men.

"It was a fine start for me," says Joe. "The team played very well, and they certainly got the goals. But there is still room to smarten up a bit yet and this will be my target."

Johnny Hamilton was the main marksman in the victory—hitting a goal in each half. Graham Fyfe, Billy McNichol and Alex Miller from the penalty spot got the other goals.

"Graham Fyfe got the ball rolling with a fine goal early on," says coach Mason. "Then Arbroath equalised and this was followed by the first of Johnny Hamilton's double.

"We led 2-1 at the interval, then really got going after the break.

"Billy McNichol got the third, Hamilton the fourth and then came Alex Miller's penalty.

"Hamilton and Fyfe played really well and Donald Hunter did a good job in goal whenever he was needed."

That double by 'Hammy' takes the tally for the ex-Hibs man to five for the season—one ahead of Eric Morris but still two behind hot-shot Alex O'Hara.

And Alex Miller's penalty gives him a quartet of spot kicks so far.

The Rangers team was: Hunter; Denny, Miller; Hamilton, Jackson, McDougall; Morris, Donaldson, McNichol, Fyfe, Struthers. Billy Steel came on as substitute for Struthers.

On Tuesday night of this week the Reserves went north to Bayview for the first leg of the Reserve League Cup semi-final against East Fife and lost 3-1.

The return leg is at Ibrox next Tuesday.
