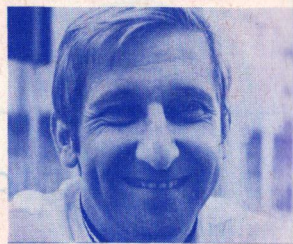

## Ayr forward holds British goal record

**AYR UNITED** were formed only 63 years ago, when two clubs—Ayr and Ayr Parkhouse—amalgamated after long negotiations between the two teams.

They have never won the First Division title, the Scottish Cup or the League Cup.

But they are in the record book for a couple of distinguished reasons—they have won the Second Division Championship a record six times and in 1927-28 their famous striker Jimmy Smith cracked in a British record tally of 66 League goals.

And certainly last season will be marked down as one of the most successful in the club's history for they reached the semi final of the Scottish Cup before going out to Rangers at Hampden and finished in sixth place in the League table.

Only a couple of times before have they finished higher up the table—in 1914 they finished fifth and a year later fourth, their best-ever performance.

They won the Second Division crown for the first time in 1912, two years after being founded. They won it again the following year and were voted into the First Division.

In 1920 the club bought Somerset Park for £2,500 and four years later the

Ayr full back partnership of Smith and McCloy was chosen for the first Wembley international against England.

In 1950 Ayr reached the semi-finals of the League Cup and were within seven minutes of a final place when they led Motherwell 3-2. But 'Well, tournament favourites, hit back to win 4-3 and went on to beat Hibs 3-0 in the Final.

There are arguments about which is the club's most famous victory—some people say it was in 1923 when Ayr played against a Celtic side in which every player was an international and included the legendary Patsy Gallagher. Ayr were 2-0 down at one stage but fought back and scored four times.

Others prefer to recall the 3-0 victory over Rangers at Ibrox in 1959 at a time when the Light Blues were heading for the Championship.

The club's Second Division championship successes have been in 1912, 1913, 1928, 1937, 1959 and 1966.

The record attendance at Somerset is 25,225, set when Rangers visited the ground in 1969-70 for a League match.

### IT'S A FACT

AYR'S biggest-ever win was against Clackmannan in the first round of the Scottish Cup in January 1931 . . . with an 11-2 victory. Their heaviest defeat has been at the hands of Rangers, when the Light Blues won 9-0 at Ibrox in 1929-30. Rangers also won 9-1 at Ibrox in 1933-34.

Today will be the 61st League meeting between the clubs since 1913-14. Rangers have won 40 of the games, lost 10 and drawn 10. They have scored 168 goals and conceded 68 in the process.

Only twice in 30 visits have Ayr managed to leave Ibrox with full League points—in 1914-15 when they won 3-1 and 1959-60 when they won 3-0.

Only twice have Rangers-Ayr League meetings at Ibrox failed to produce a goal—in 1917-18 and 1928-29 when the matches finished 0-0.

There have been only two Scottish Cup meetings between the clubs—in 1922-23 Ayr won 2-0 at Somerset in the second round, and of course last season when Rangers reversed that score in the semi-final at Hampden.



Under the direction of manager Ally McLeod, a super enthusiast who is as much a character off the field as he was in his playing days with Third Lanark, St. Mirren, Blackburn and Hibs, the wee Somerset club have become established as a hard team to beat in recent years.

There is no reason to suspect it will be any different today.

★ Goalkeeper **DAVIE STEWART**. Former Under-23 cap. Signed from Kil-syth in 1967. Big but agile, works as an upholsterer in big Glasgow hotel. Played in 30 League matches last season.

★ Full back **DAVIE WELLS**. In his third year with Ayr, signing from junior club Auchinleck Talbot. Big fair-haired defender with a powerful shot and has been watched by English clubs. A miner.

★ Full back **JOHN MURPHY**. Club's senior service player, joining from Darvel Juniors as a 21-year-old 12 years ago. First team regular for 10 years, never missed a League match last season. Engineer in Kilmarnock.

★ Defender **RIKKI FLEMING**. Tall ex-Rangers player who joined Ayr in 1968 after being freed from Ibrox. Can play attacking wing-half or pivot. Plans to set up as a scrap dealer. Played in all but one League match last season.

★ Defender **ALEX McANESPIE**. Big, strong defender who is a very solid tackler. Signed from Ayrshire junior club Craigmark in 1964 and works with a Kilmarnock whisky firm. Only missed one League match last term.

★ Defender **JOE FILIPPI**. Versatile big youngster who can play in defence or attack. Had a spell with Coventry City before returning to his home town team Ayr. Former Youth internationalist.

★ Winger **JOHNNY DOYLE**. Young man with a big future in football—possibly over the border—for several English clubs are interested in this Under-23 cap. Never missed a League game last season. From Lanarkshire, he was signed from Boys Guild football four years ago. Stock clerk.

★ Forward **JOHNNY GRAHAM**. Experienced ex-Hibs and Falkirk man who scored 10 goals last season as well as laying on many more. Quick moving and thinking raider. Runs his own engineering business just outside Glasgow.

★ Forward **ALEX INGRAM**. Not big—5ft 9in—but very effective in the air and strong on the ground. In his second spell with Ayr, having returned two years ago after a spell in England with Notts Forest. Dashing leader who takes a lot of knocks willingly.

★ Forward **GEORGE McLEAN**. Controversial character who started his senior career with St. Mirren then moved on to Rangers, Dundee and Dunfermline. Big, rangy type and a prolific scorer. Netted 24 for Ayr last term, including seven from the penalty spot.

★ Forward **DAVIE McCULLOCH**. Skilful play-maker signed from Irvine Vics in 1968. Small, but sturdy and with great match-reading ability allied to skill. Maker of many of Ayr's goals.

★ Midfield man **DOUG MITCHELL**. Local player who had a spell in English football before coming back home. Signed from Crosshill in 1966 and a former Youth internationalist. Can double up as a defender as well.

★ Midfield man **JOHN TAYLOR**. Another local who had a spell with Leeds and has now returned home to sign for Ayr this year. Six-footer who was with the Ayr youth team before going south. Teenager, he will attend Technical College.

★ Forward **BRIAN BELL**. Former junior internationalist with Kello Rovers who is in his first season at Somerset. Not big, but strong and a hard worker.

2. If you see that passages or stairways are becoming jammed — hold back. You will only be delayed for a few moments.
3. Help any youngster, old person — anyone, in fact — if you think they are having difficulty.
4. Be particularly careful on the exit stairs, and avoid jostling as much as possible.
5. Abide by Stewards' and Police Instructions.

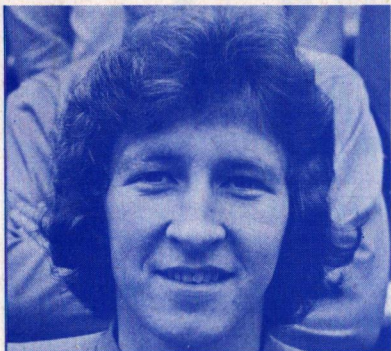

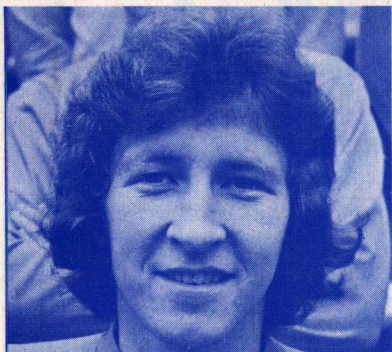

# THE GREAT RACE!

TODAY marks the start of the new League campaign—and it is, of course, Rangers' No. 1 aim to succeed this time in bringing the title to Ibrox after failing so narrowly last season.

There is a long, hard road to march before the flag is reached. And there may be disappointments as well as triumphs.

But the Ibrox fans can be assured of one thing—*everyone* will be giving *everything* in the victory effort.

Consistency is the key, and it is the Ibrox aim to avoid the kind of slow start which handicapped the side so heavily last term.

And by a twist of fate, the Light Blues get a chance today to prove this determination against the very team that provided the first setback last year—Ayr.

The Somerset men were the first League opponents last term as well, and won 2-1 at Ayr to set Rangers off to the wrong kind of start. Victory today would put the Light Blues 100 per cent ahead of the opening day last season.

But it won't be easy against Ally McLeod's fighters and the prospect is for a rousing beginning to the championship chase.

Indeed, the whole of this month promises the best of action for the fans—for sizzling September also brings another Old Firm meeting (at Ibrox a fortnight today), the first sortie into Europe with the meeting against Ankaragucu in Turkey on September 19 in the first leg of the Cup Winners' Cup first round tie, plus League visits to Firhill to face Partick Thistle (next Saturday), Pittodrie to meet Aberdeen (September 22) and the clash with Hearts at Ibrox on the 29th.

## RANGERS AIM FOR A 'FLIER'

And in between, just to make it a three-competition month, there is the first of the home and away ties in the second round of the League Cup on September 12.

Three tournaments—three opportunities for success. The strain of the challenge will be immense, but Rangers are ready for it... as they proved in that 3-1 victory over Celtic at Parkhead last week.

Celtic were favourites following their win at Ibrox the previous week, and played well to take the first half lead. They had other chances but missed, then in the second half the fighting qualities of the Light Blues came through and goals from Alex MacDonald, Derek Parlane and Alfie Conn did the trick.

"We took our chances this time, just as Celtic did to win the previous game at Ibrox" says manager Jock Wallace.

That win has boosted the Ibrox morale, and with players like the unlucky Doug Houston, Johnny Hamilton, Joe Mason and youngsters Alex O'Hara and Eric Morris standing by the first team pool has the depth of talent required for the testing time ahead.

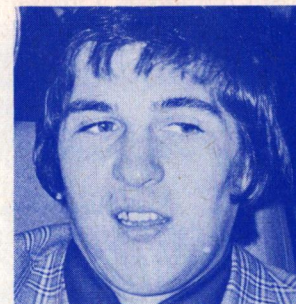

# The Colts run away with it...!

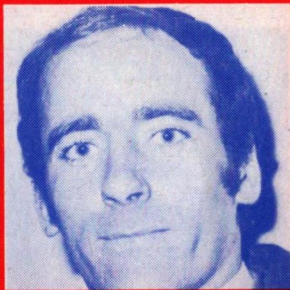
"We have had a lot of the ball in the games we have played, and although we have scored quite a few goals I'm looking for more."
