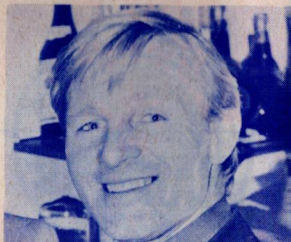

Big John foiled Sons brave bid

Tonight's second round first leg clash is only the second time Rangers and Dumbarton have been drawn together in the League Cup.

The only other time they have met was back in season 1962-63 when they fought out a home and away quarter final battle.

Victory went to Rangers by a 4-2 aggregate. But if history repeats itself tonight, then Sons will not be displeased.

FOR THEY DREW 1-1 WHEN THEY CAME TO IBROX ON SEPTEMBER 19, 1962 IN THE SECOND LEG.

Unfortunately for them, they had already gone down 3-1 in the first leg at Boghead a couple of weeks earlier so their brave battle was all in vain. However, they did get a lot of satisfaction from that draw.

Skipper John Greig was the man who did most of the damage to Dumbarton in that 1962 affair. John grabbed a goal in the 3-1 victory at Boghead, and it was another goal from him which brought Rangers the draw at Ibrox.

Another man who scored for Rangers at Boghead in the first game was outside left Davie Wilson . . . who comes back to Ibrox tonight as assistant manager to Alex Wright at Dumbarton.

1872-1973

IT'S A FACT

DUMBARTON are among Scotland's oldest clubs—indeed they celebrated their Centenary a year before Rangers, being founded in 1872.

In the early days they were a formidable force—winning the Scottish Cup in 1883 after having appeared in the Final for the two previous years. They were also beaten Finalists in 1887, 1891 and 1897.

They were among the original 11 clubs who formed the Scottish League, and indeed made an immediate impact by becoming joint title holders of the very first championship in 1891 . . . along with Rangers.

The clubs finished level with 29 points from 18 games and played a decider which ended in a 2-2 draw and by the casting vote of the chairman the committee declared the clubs joint champions.

However, the next year Dumbarton went one better and took the Championship outright.

Since those glory days, however, the Dumbarton story has not been so spectacular. They were relegated in 1922 and stayed down for half a century before they fittingly won back First Division status in their Centenary Year.

They had to fight hard to retain their place last season, only beating the drop by a point thanks to a superb 4-1 victory over Dundee United at Boghead in the very last match of the season.

But fighting qualities abound at Boghead—as shown in their League Cup section where after a bad start they pulled away powerfully to finish up by beating Hibs and Ayr United to gain second place and a meeting with Rangers tonight.

★ Full back **DONALD WATT**. 5ft 11in, 11st. Fair-haired defender who was freed by Sons, who are convinced he is going to be a top-class full back.

★ Full back **PETER McQUADE**. 5ft 10in, 10st 12 lbs. Signed at the end of last season from East Fife. Solid tackler and strong in the air.

★ Defender **GORDON MENZIES**. 5ft 10in, 11st. Signed two years ago from Kilsyth St. Pat's. 21, and a student at Strathclyde University.

★ Defender **JOHN CUSHLEY**. 5ft 10in, 11st. Rugged, no-nonsense pivot who has seen service with Celtic, West Ham in England and then Dunfermline. Joined Sons in 1972. University graduate who is now a teacher.

★ Defender **JOHNNY GRAHAM**. 5ft, 10 st 3 lbs. Skilful attacking wing-half who missed only one League match for Sons last season. Signed from junior club Arthurlie in 1968. Works with a whisky firm in his home town of Paisley.

★ Forward **KENNY JENKINS**. 5ft 7in, 10st 6 lbs. Versatile performer who has turned up in every department for Sons. Son of former Rangers goalkeeper George Jenkins. Electrician to trade.

★ Forward **WILLIE WALLACE**. 5ft 9in, 11st 8lbs. Stocky former Scotland striker who has served with Crystal Palace, Celtic, Hearts, Stenhousemuir and Raith

Rovers. Playing deeper now, where his strength and experience are invaluable for Sons. Signed from Crystal Palace last year.

★ Forward **ROY McCORMACK**. 6ft, 11st 8lbs. Rangy big striker—top scorer last season for Sons with 12 goals—who is tremendously effective in the air and deceptive on the ground. Works in printing industry in Glasgow.

★ Forward **TOM McADAM**. 6ft, 11st. This tall, elegant 19-year-old turned down a £50,000 move to Dundee because he wanted to stay with Sons. He made a sensational start to his career last year when he scored eight goals in his first seven games for Sons. A carpet fitter, he seems destined for a star career in football.

★ Forward **BRIAN HERON**. 5 ft 8in, 10st 7lbs. Ex-Rangers and Motherwell winger who joined Dumbarton to help them in their fight against relegation at the end of last season. A real flier, with a power-packed left foot.

★ Forward **ROSS MATHIE**. 5ft 10in, 11st 4lbs. Ex-Junior international striker who was signed from Kilmarnock at the same time as Brian Heron. When he has the scoring touch, he's a deadly leader. Ex-B.B. officer.

★ Forward **WILLIE BORLAND**. Small, speedy winger who was formerly with St. Mirren but was released after a troublesome injury spell. Signed recently by Sons boss Alex Wright and looks like being a fine addition to the player pool.

AN IBROX WARNING

CELTIC come to Ibrox on Saturday for the third Old Firm clash of the season. The match 'score' stands at 1-1 after the meetings in the League Cup section.

Naturally Rangers want to win. But they also want a victory on the terracing.

There must be no repeat of the disturbing scenes which came towards the climax of the last game at Ibrox only a few weeks ago when the actions of a minority of hooligans led to a terracing incident which spoiled what had been a tremendous sporting match, one of the best Old Firm meetings for a long time.

This must not happen again—no matter what the result. Again we draw the attention of all supporters to the 10-point Ibrox Code of Conduct which is printed on page 12.

PLAY IT SAFE!

Rangers Football Club ask all fans to co-operate and make sure that everyone leaves the ground with the maximum of comfort and safety by following this procedure at the end of the game:

1. Take your time leaving the Stadium.
2. If you see that passages or stairways are becoming jammed — hold back. You will only be delayed for a few moments.
3. Help any youngster, old person — anyone, in fact — if you think they are having difficulty.
4. Be particularly careful on the exit stairs, and avoid jostling as much as possible.
5. Abide by Stewards' and Police Instructions.

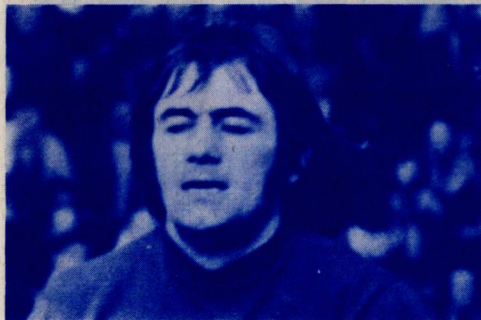

RANGERS beat Sons 3-1 at Ibrox and 2-1 at Boghead in last season's League matches.

In the first half of the Ibrox match on November 25, Dumbarton gave as good as they got and Peter McCloy had a couple of fine saves.

But once Quinton Young fastened onto a Dave Smith pass in the 41st minute and wheeled to shoot Rangers into the lead, the Light Blues got on top.

Even a 59th minute equaliser from Roy McCormack, who was on the spot to net after McCloy had blocked a Tom McAdam shot, couldn't halt the Ibrox men.

Derek Parlane had a shot kicked off the line in the 70th minute—the ball went straight to Alfie Conn and he cracked in goal No. 2. Then 10 minutes from time Parlane swept in the third after substitute Tommy McLean had slipped him a pass from a Young corner.

The match was marred slightly by the fact that referee Bert Padden took ill during the game and had to be taken to hospital where he was detained for many weeks to recover from a heart attack.

In the second game, at Boghead on March 31, a semi-gale made conditions very difficult.

And despite a great start—two goals inside the first 20 minutes—Rangers began to struggle after that and were happy to get away with the two points.

It was Quinton Young who got the Light Blues away with a 13th minute goal, with a simple shot after fine work by McLean, Jardine and MacDonald.

Then Young and Jardine combined in the 20th minute to set up a chance for Tommy McLean to flight over a perfect cross which Derek Parlane headed in.

But two minutes later Dumbarton's Ross Mathie got one back with a low diving header, and the rest of the game was a hard fight for Rangers.

BEFORE the start of this season, Ibrox manager Jock Wallace made it plain there would be no such thing as a 'permanent' place for anyone in the first team.

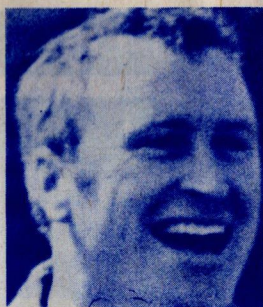
"Everyone is going to have to fight—and everyone will get a chance to show what he can do," declared the Rangers boss.

And the proof that he is living up to this promise is shown in the statistics.

FOR SO FAR NO FEWER THAN TWENTY-ONE PLAYERS HAVE BEEN USED IN THE TEN GAMES PLAYED SINCE THE START OF THE TERM.

Only full backs Sandy Jardine and Willie Mathieson, plus Tommy McLean, Tom Forsyth and Alex MacDonald have played in all the matches.

Youngsters like Alex O'Hara, George Donaldson and Eric Morris have been given a run, while Stewart Kennedy, Ally Scott, Johnny Hamilton, Joe Mason

and Davie Smith are standing by ready for use at any time (injury permitting, of course).

And once Doug Houston has fully shaken off the effects of the troublesome foot injury which has hampered the start to his Ibrox career the pool will be even stronger.

"This is just what we have always been aiming for," says manager Wallace. "We're equipped for a long, hard and we hope successful season."

ALEX O'HARA is only 16—but already he has been a Rangers player for three years. The Castlemilk youngster was only 13 when Rangers signed him on an 'S' form.

It is a move he never regretted—for Rangers were always the only club for him.

But even Alex admits he is surprised at the speed at which his career with Rangers has progressed.

"I certainly wasn't expecting to have played in the first team in my first full season," says Alex.

"I thought I would have to wait a couple of seasons working in the reserves. I expect I'll be going back to the reserves and making occasional first-team appearances if I'm playing well enough. I won't be disappointed, I'm prepared to wait and work for my real chance."

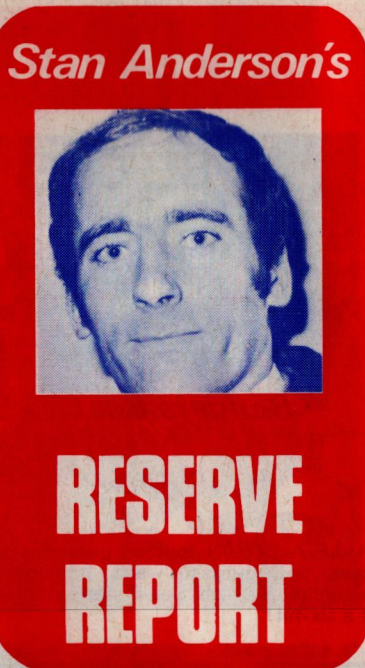
THE departure of Second team coach Stan Anderson from Ibrox to become the new manager of his former club Clyde was a disappointment for the young Rangers.

Victory No.8 as the Colts march on...

THE IBROX RESERVES followed up their super League Cup form—six wins, including a double over Celtic and 15 goals scored—with a great start to the Reserve League campaign and a stunning win in the Second Eleven Cup.

The 3-1 victory over Ayr at Somerset in the League followed by the 4-0 hammering of Partick Thistle at Ibrox in the Second XI Cup took the run of victories to eight in a row with a grand total of 24 goals scored.

That's some shooting. And everyone is convinced that there is better to come.

Top of the goal parade is 16-year-old Alex O'Hara whose outstanding ability has already earned him first team appearances.

Alex's double against Partick Thistle boosted his tally to seven in the eight games.
