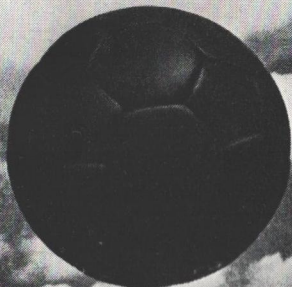

SUPER SAINTS

Together, they're worth over half a million pounds

SOUTHAMPTON fans can count themselves lucky—they are privileged to watch two of the BIG (in every sense) star strikers of English football in Mike Channon and Peter Osgood.

OSGOOD, 6ft 2in, 12st 12lbs, cost Southampton a staggering £225,000 last year from Chelsea after making more than 300 appearances for the London club during which time he won six Under-23 caps, three full honours, an F.A. Cup winners medal and a European Cup Winners' Cup Badge.

Ossie, 27, would have won more international recognition but for the fact that his fiery temperament met with the disapproval of the English selectors. Graceful and skilful despite his size, he played against Rangers at Stamford Bridge three years ago when the Light Blues went south for a testimonial match for Ron Harris.

Runs his own building

company as a side-line to football.

Mike (or Mick) Channon is not quite as big physically as Osgood—standing a mere 6ft $\frac{1}{2}$ in and weighing 12st 4lbs. But his scoring record in the past few years for Saints has been outstanding and has made him a target for bigger clubs.

They would be willing to pay up to £300,000 for him—but Saints are not willing to part with the Wiltshire-born Channon and have taken steps to ensure that he feels his financial future is safe enough at The Dell.

Mike joined Southampton in 1964 after leaving school and has now made more than 300 first team appearances and scored more than 120 goals. He has been the club's top scorer for the past five years.

Channon has made eight Under-23 appearances, including two against Scotland, and since winning his full cap in 1972 has been chosen 19 times so far for England. He has scored enough goals against Scotland at all levels to emphasise how dangerous he can be.

Away from football, Channon likes to relax on his farm outside Southampton.

THE SOUTHAMPTON team, apart from Osgood and Channon, will come from the following pool:

★ Goalkeeper **ERIC MARTIN**. 5ft 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ in, 12st 11lb. Perth-born Eric was transferred south from Dunfermline in March 1967 and has been a first-team regular ever since with

more than 280 first team appearances so far. Former Scotland Under-23 cap candidate.

★ Defender **PAUL BENNETT**. 6ft, 12st 12lbs. A local boy he joined the club as an apprentice before turning pro. In 1969. Made his debut in October 1972 and had had nearly 80 first team games.

★ Defender **MIKE EARLS**. 6ft $\frac{3}{4}$ in, 11st 13lbs. Former Eire youth cap who was signed as an apprentice in 1970 and as a full pro two years later. Made his first team debut last season.

★ Defender **BOB MCCARTHY**. 5ft 11in, 11st 11lb. Another local lad who joined the club on leaving school and has made more than 100 appearances.

★ Defender **STEVE MILLS**. 5ft 10in, 11st. Born in Portsmouth and signed when he left school in 1969. Under-23 cap with Wales, he has made more than 40 first team appearances.

★ Defender **JIM STEELE**. 6ft $\frac{3}{4}$ in, 12st 7lbs. Edinburgh-born red-head who was a Scotland Under-23 cap when he went south from Dundee for a £70,000 fee more than two years ago. Now played in more than 100 first team games.

★ Midfield man **TONY BYRNE**. 5ft 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in, 10st. Eire-born, he joined Southampton from Millwall in 1964. Has 14 international caps and played in more than 100 games for Saints.

★ Midfield man **LOU CHATTERLEY**. 6ft $\frac{1}{2}$ in, 12st 4 lbs. Joined Saints from Grimsby (manager McMenemy's old club) in March, 1964. From Birmingham, he was previously with Aston Villa and Northampton.

★ Midfield man **HUGH FISHER**. 5ft 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in, 10st 5lbs. From Glasgow, he was signed from Blackpool in 1967 and has more than 250 first team games behind him. Broke a leg a couple of seasons back, but was an ever-present last term.

★ Midfield man **GERRY O'BRIEN**. 5ft 6in, 9st 7lbs. Another Glasgow man, he was bought from Clydebank for £35,000 in 1970 and has made nearly 60 appearances.

★ Midfield man **BRIAN O'NEIL**. 5ft 7in, 11st 7lbs. Cost £75,000 from Bury in 1970 and has made more than 150 first team

appearances. Under-23 and League international cap.

★ Midfield man **DAVID PEACH**. 5ft 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in, 10st 13lbs. Bedford-born, he joined Gillingham as a youngster and was transferred to Southampton in January of this year, quickly becoming a first-team man.

★ Forward **PAUL GILCHRIST**. 5ft 11in, 11st 10lbs. From Dartford in Kent, he started his career with Charlton then moved on to Doncaster before signing for Saints in 1972. More than 70 first team games.

★ Forward **ALISDAIR MACLEOD**. 5ft 10in, 11st 3 lbs. Glasgow-born, he went south for £40,000 in May last year but has made only a handful of first team appearances although he is a regular scorer in the reserves. Two years ago he scored all four goals for Saints (the Paisley variety) when they won 4-1 in a League Cup tie at Ibrox.

★ Forward **BOBBY STOKES**. 5ft 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in, 10st 10lbs. Portsmouth-born, he has made more than 150 appearances for Saints since joining as a schoolboy. Ex-Youth cap.

Do you remember

★ **RANGERS** have, of course, played countless games against the top English clubs. Mostly in friendlies, as in the traditional series of games with Arsenal.

But there have been many competitive battles too, starting as far back as 1886-87 . . . IN THE ENGLISH CUP.

Rangers were allowed to enter the competition at this time (as were most Scottish teams) but played in it only once . . . reaching the semi-final.

★ **THE Light Blues** beat Everton 1-0 in England in the first round, then in a series of games at Kinning Park knocked out Church (2-1) Cowllairs (3-2), Lincoln City (3-0) Old Westminsters (5-1).

This got them to the semi and a meeting with Aston Villa, then emerging as the top side in England. Villa won 3-1 at Crewe and went on to win the Cup for the first time by beating West Brom 2-0.

According to stories told at the time, the Rangers goalkeeper, Willie Chalmers, handicapped his mobility with a virtuoso display with the knife and fork at lunch (he was a legendary huge eater) and didn't display his usual nimbleness in the semi!

★ Some 75 years later, Rangers met another great English club in a Cup semi-final . . . the mighty Wolverhampton Wanderers. It was in season 1960-61 in the European Cup Winners Cup semi-final.

In the first leg at Ibrox on March, 29, 1961 Rangers took an early blow when Harold Davis was injured in the 10th minute and had to limp out the game on the wing. However, a brilliant 35th minute goal from Alex Scott and another six minutes from the end gave the Light Blues a 2-0 win. English opinion was that this wasn't enough, but Rangers thought it was.

So did the thousands of fans who took over Wolverhampton for the second leg.

And despite the furious effort by Wolves, Rangers got a 1-1 draw to march on to the Final only to be beaten by Fiorentina of Italy.

★ Since then there have been other European clashes with English opposition—in 1962-63 old rivals Tottenham won a Cup Winners Cup second round meeting with an 8-4 aggregate (Rangers saddling themselves with an impossible task after losing 5-2 in the first leg in London).

Spurs also won the second game—the only English club to beat the Light Blues over two such matches.

In 1967-68 in the quarter-finals of the Fairs Cup Leeds came to Ibrox and got an 0-0 draw in the first leg, and won the return 2-0 then a year later in the semi-final of the same tournament Newcastle United gave exactly the same performance.

RANGERS again ask their supporters to protect the image of the club. Do nothing which will bring discredit on Rangers—whether in victory or defeat.

By following the Ibrox code of conduct printed below, the supporters can help tremendously towards a trouble-free day.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracing.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the road-side when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

RANGERS WILL COME AT US... AND THAT SUITS FINE!

"WE know Rangers will come at us tonight with everything. And we welcome this. It will be such a change from what we face in the English Second Division every week."

So says Southampton's big red-haired Under-23 Scottish international defender Jim Steele.

"The Second Division is so hard and defensive we have found it hard to get going" says the Edinburgh-born Steele, who went south from Dundee for a £70,000 fee in February, 1972.

"The marking is so tight—sometimes two and three men at a time on Mick Channon and Peter Osgood, even in away games.

"So we will be happy to let Rangers come at us. It will make more space for Mick and Peter, and they know how to use it.

"If Mick is left with just one or two defenders to take on, he'll beat them.

"We really think we can put one over on Rangers tonight, and in the return."

To illustrate his point about Saints' liking for Cup-tie football, Jim points out that they beat two First Division sides, West Ham and Luton, and the tough Second Division side Orient to win their section in the earlier Texaco competition in England at the start of the season.

Jim has settled into English football now after an unhappy start. But like all his mates he admits he misses First Division soccer.

"The atmosphere is so different. And that's another reason why we are looking forward to tonight's game. We know there will be a big crowd of Rangers fans out to give the game a 'lift'."

Jim admits he is going to take a bit of 'stick' from many of his old Edinburgh pals.

"There are plenty of Rangers fans among them" he says. "And they will all be at Ibrox. I expect they'll give me a hard time of it.

"Especially if, as I expect, we win. I've happy memories of Ibrox from my Dundee playing days. We used to do very well here and I can recall scoring a goal once—with my head, too, which is quite something for me."

Others in the Southampton 'Tartan Brigade' are goalkeeper Eric Martin, ex-Dunfermline; former St. Mirren forward Ally McLeod, midfielder Hugh Fisher and little Gerry O'Brien, the ex-Clydebank winger.

They might not all play—but each one would like a crack at toppling Rangers. However, they all admit one thing—that won't be easy.

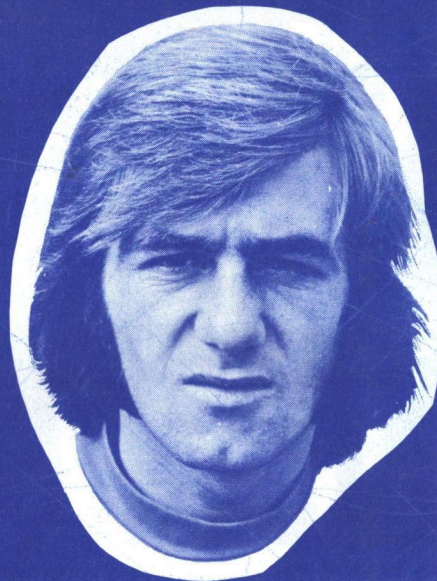

RANGERS forward Quinton Young has a special reason for looking for a good win over Southampton tonight—he wants victory as a birthday present.

Cutty celebrates his birthday tomorrow. "And there is nothing I'd like better than to get a few goals in a good win over Southampton," he says.

But the Ranger knows better than anyone at Ibrox just how hard it will be tonight. For he had an 18-month spell in English First Division football with Coventry and played against Southampton a couple of times.

"Like all English clubs they are very well organised, although at that time they seemed a bit slow in defence.

"But with forwards like Mike Channon and Peter Osgood in the attack, they must be dangerous.

"Channon is so strong on the ground, and Osgood tremendous in

the air. They will be a powerful partnership. But I'm still confident we can beat Southampton."

Quinton is playing more of a roving role in the Rangers attack at the moment—and playing it well. He enjoys the hard work, but is finding goals hard to come by.

"I think it's because everyone is so aware of the importance of finishing in the top 10 in the League this season because of the forthcoming Super League. It's going to be hard to get goals and points. I think this will be a really tough season in the championship race."

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SAINTS WON'T STAY DOWN...

SOUTHAMPTON'S drop into the Second Division last season was not only a disappointment for the club—it was a surprise to many people.

For few expected a side which carried such accomplished defenders as goalkeeper Eric Martin, sweeper Jim Steele and Hugh Fisher and two of England's top strikers in Mick Channon and Peter Osgood to fail to survive in the top League.

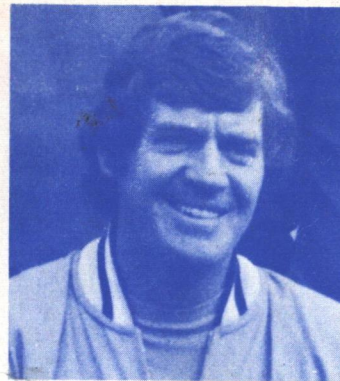
It was a blow to Saints, and although they have made a slow start to their promotion campaign, everyone at The Dell remains confident that the stay in the lower

division will be a short-term proposition.

Southampton are managed now by the amiable giant Lawrie McMenemy, who joined them last season after a successful spell with Grimsby.

He proved he meant Saints to be one of the best teams by paying up £225,000 when Chelsea put Peter Osgood up for sale. And he has held off the efforts of bigger English clubs to woo away Southampton's England international striker Mick Channon.

Saints were formed in 1885—originally as Southampton St. Mary's (hence the nickname

'Saints') and turned professional in 1894.

They played at two other stadiums—Antelope Ground and County Cricket Ground—before moving to The Dell in 1898.

They have never won any of the major trophies—although they were champions of Division 3 in 1959-60 and back in 1921-22 won the Division 3 (South) title with a record performance—losing only four matches and 21 goals.

In the First Division, their best finish has been 7th—in 1968-69 and again in 1970-71.

Saints have twice reached the English Cup final—both times inside the space of three years. They first made it in 1899-1900 but were beaten 4-0 by Bury. Then in 1901-02 they got through to meet Sheffield United and after a 1-1 draw Southampton went down 2-1 in the replay.

They have twice forayed into Europe. In the 1969-70 Fairs Cup they beat Rosenberg of Norway 2-1 on aggregate in the first round, followed this up with a smashing 8-4 aggregate win over Portuguese side Vitoria Guimaeres then were unlucky to go out on the away goals rule to Newcastle United in the third round, drawing 0-0 away from home and 1-1 at The Dell.

In 1971-72 in the U.E.F.A. Cup Saints took a first-round k.o. from Spanish club Athletic Bilbao—the side Rangers beat a couple of weeks ago in the international tournament in Barcelona.

So many chances... so few goals!

STILL too many chances being missed. That's the overall verdict from coach Joe Mason despite the continued success of the Rangers Reserves.

"We're creating chance after chance and only taking a small percentage of them," says Joe.

"That's just not good enough for me. And neither is the way the team tends to relax after getting a goal or two ahead.

"That should be just when they get going. The time to take it easy is when you've got six in the opposition net."

The goal-failing and the lackadaisical approach were in evidence in the Reserve League match at Firhill.

Although the Colts won 2-0, a result which brought their second League victory and kept them near the top of the table, coach Mason was far from pleased.

"The side played brilliantly for an hour, got two up then decided that was the job done.

"I thought that Thistle could easily have snatched a couple of goals in the last 20 minutes. It's just not good enough.

"There's a lot more work to be done, both in attack and defence."

Rangers took the lead just before half-time with a brilliant goal from Ally

Scott. The big striker took a Hamilton pass on the run, beat a defender and lashed a 20-yarder into the corner of the net.

The second goal came from Tommy McLean—like Scott he was getting a break from first-team football after a busy start to the season—after the break. Tommy shot home from 15 yards in a crowded goalmouth.

Big Peter McCloy, who has made a great recovery in double quick time from his cartilage operation was in tremendous form any time Thistle got through to have a go at goal.

A few days later, Rangers sent a strong team to Love Street for a challenge match—designed mainly to give players like John Greig and Willie Mathieson match practice after injury—and drew 0-0 with St. Mirren in a game which had plenty of goalmouth incident.

"But again it was a case of too many missed chances," says Joe Mason. "We even failed with a penalty."

This was in the second half when the Saints' keeper saved a Dave Smith spot kick. Several attempts were cleared off the line by Saints defenders, but there were a number of occasions when the Paisley men should have had no chance.

Not that promotion-chasing Saints were push-overs. They played with great enthusiasm and skill, clearly pulling out their best form in a grand game which let them test their ability against First Division material.

They did well enough to ensure that Peter McCloy was again in great form. The team was: McCloy; Denny, Mathieson; Greig, O'Hara, Smith; McLean, Scott, Henderson, Hamilton, Morris. Subs were Armour for McLean and Steele for Hamilton.
