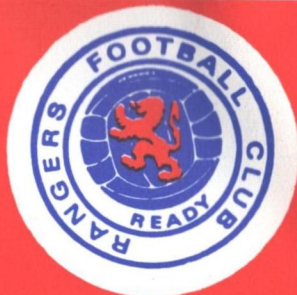

Jags have special place

THE JAGS. The Maryhill Magyars . . . these are nicknames which Partick Thistle have earned over the years and mark the unique place Thistle hold in Scottish football.

Everybody has a soft spot for the Firhill side. They are the fans' favourite second team, the club everyone would like to see doing well.

Which is why thousands of neutrals up and down the country celebrated alongside the die-hard Firhill support when Jags brought off their most stunning triumph of recent years—the 4-1 victory over Celtic in the 71-72 League Cup Final at Hampden.

Unfortunately, Jags have never been able to provide the follow up to that success which their fans were certain would come.

Indeed, four of the Cup winning team are no longer in the Firhill side—Jimmy Bone, Alex Rae and Alex Forsyth having been transferred and Hugh Strachan now concentrating on coaching.

So Thistle manager Davie McParland, a loyal and dedicated Firhill player for many years, has had to concentrate his efforts on a policy of rebuilding the side with the main emphasis on bringing on his own young players.

That League Cup triumph was probably overdue for Thistle. For three times in the 1950's they won through to the Final of the tournament only to lose—going down 3-2 to East Fife in 53-54; 3-0 to Celtic in 56-57 and 5-1 to Hearts in 58-59.

Thistle have also been Scottish Cup winners, taking the trophy in 1920-21 when they beat Rangers 1-0 at Celtic Park. They were beaten finalists in 29-30, Rangers gaining revenge with a 2-1 win at Hampden in a replay after a 0-0 draw.

The Firhill feat of winning the League Cup against Celtic was even more remarkable considering they had only come up from the Second Division that season after a one-year stint in the lower grade.

But that's the kind of thing which earned Jags the title of 'The Unpredictables.'

Jags were founded in 1876 and moved ground four times—and played their home games at Ibrox in season 1908-09—before finally settling in at Firhill in 1909.

IT'S A FACT

THE FIRHILL ground record is 49,838 set in a League game against Rangers in February 1922.

Thistle's biggest victory was 16-0 v. Royal Albert in the first round of the Scottish Cup in 1931.

Their biggest defeat was 10-1 by Dunfermline in a League match in season 1958-59.

Their highest individual total of League goals in a season was 41 by Alex Hair in 1926-27.

Today's game is the 134th League meeting between the clubs. Rangers have won 97 of the previous games, lost 15 and drawn 21.

In the series, Rangers have scored 327 goals and conceded 124.

Player Points

★ Goalkeeper **ALAN ROUGH.** 6ft 1in, 12st 7lbs. Signed from Sighthill in 1970 and has been the first-team keeper for the past three seasons. Played in all 48 games for the club last season. Youth, and Under-23 international player—and still just 21.

★ Full back **JOHN HANSEN.** 6ft. 11st 3lbs. Signed as a centre half from Sauchie in 1968, but became a right back three seasons ago. Under-23 and full internationalist, having played against Belgium and Yugoslavia under Tommy Docherty. A serious leg injury hampered his career, but he has come back strongly this season.

★ Full back **DANNY KELLACHAN.** 6ft ½ in, 10st 7lbs. Long, lean red-haired youngster 21 who has come through to claim a first team place this season in place of Alex Forsyth, now with Manchester United. A car crash last year set him back, but he has recovered completely and despite his thin frame tackle fiercely and is a resolute defender.

★ Wing half **RONNIE GLAVIN.** 5ft 10in, 11st 12lbs. Hard driving midfielder man whose ability has raised a lot of interest south of the border. Captain of Scotland's Under-23 side, he is also Thistle's skipper. Just 21, he seems set for a great future. Not content with being a goal-maker, he was the club's No. 1 marksman last season with 17 goals.

★ Centre half **JACKY CAMPBELL.** 6ft 11st. Longest serving player at Firhill, signing from Greengairs United. Formerly a full back, he is a part-timer and works as a draughtsman.

★ Wing half **BOBBY CLARK.** 6ft 1in, 11st. Signed from youth side Sighthill five years ago and has now established himself as a first man in the defence. Part-timer, he is a cost clerk with a motor firm. Played 32 times last season.

★ Midfield man **BENNY ROONEY.** 5ft 10in, 12st. Big, versatile player who only joined Thistle a couple of weeks ago from St Johnstone. Ex-Celtic and Dundee United, he can play in defence and attack as well. His experience will be invaluable to Jags.

Player Points

★ Winger **JOHNNY GIBSON**. 5ft 6in, 10st. Tricky, speedy little player who was signed in 1968 from Clydebank Strollers. A real ball-hugging winger in the old style, with the fiery temperament to go with it. Played 20 games and scored three goals last season, but is mainly a goal-maker.

★ Forward **JOE CRAIG**. 6ft. 11st 4lbs. Big, aggressive striker who is only 20 and seems set for a fine future. His form has shaded off this season but he is still a dangerous raider. Ex-Youth cap, he played 20 games last season and scored nine goals.

★ Forward **TOMMY RAE**. 5ft 10in, 11st. Experienced attacker who was sold to Aberdeen a few seasons ago then brought back to help the Firhill youngsters. Played 16 times last season and scored five goals.

★ Forward **BOBBY HOUSTON**. 6ft 1in, 13st. Big, powerful player who is only 21 and still to settle in at Firhill. Signed from junior club Rutherglen Glencairn last year and made nine first team appearances last term.

★ Winger **BOBBY LAWRIE**. 5ft 6in, 10st 6lbs. Transfer-listed forward who is rated one of the fastest players in Scotland. A chance maker, he is 24 and has been at Firhill since 1969. Ex-Irvine Meadow man.

★ Winger **DENIS McQUADE**. 6ft ½ in, 10st 5lbs. Part-time player, he is a University graduate at presently engaged on Work Study methods. Under-23 cap he was also capped against the English League last year. Now 22 he was signed from St Roch's in 1970. Played 35 games last season and scored seven times.

★ Forward **FRANK COULSTON**. 5ft 10in, 11st 3lbs. Fast, direct raider whose running off the ball creates openings and space for his colleagues. A P.E. teacher he was formerly with Stranraer. 28 years old, he was signed in 1967 and last season scored five goals in 36 appearances.

SATURDAY brings the fifth Old Firm clash of the season, and Rangers once again remind all Ibrox fans that they must do nothing at Parkhead on Saturday which will damage the good name of the club.

No matter the result, the image of the club must come first. Do nothing to bring Rangers into discredit.

Only the highest standard of behaviour will do. It is an opportunity to set the pattern for 1974 — Rangers ask all supporters to set the New Year going in the proper fashion. Let us have a trouble-free day. By following the Ibrox Code of Conduct printed below, the fans can help tremendously towards achieving this.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the road-side when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

'Gers find net—in last minute!

RANGERS and Thistle have already met this season—in a League match at Firhill on September 8. And the Light Blues edged home by a goal from Ally Scott in the last minute of the match!

This result follows the pattern of last season, when Rangers won by the odd goal in both League matches—winning 2-1 at Ibrox in September and 1-0 at Firhill in January.

And both games produced an ordering-off. In the Ibrox match, outside left Willie Johnstone of Rangers was sent off in a flare-up just a minute after scoring the goal which edged Rangers home.

He had thundered home a tremendous left foot shot in the 69th minute from a Greig pass for what proved to be the winner, and virtually his last kick of the game. He got his marching orders 60 seconds later after a clash with Thistle's Alex Forsyth.

It was Forsyth who put Jags ahead in the 29th minute from the penalty spot after Glavin had been brought down.



Then in the 41st minute Alex MacDonald headed home a McLean corner to level the scores and after both Derek Johnstone and Willie Johnston hit woodwork, the latter snatched the winner.

In the return match at Firhill, it was the turn of Thistle Ronnie Glavin to take the early walk to the pavilion. He went off in the 77th minute after fouling Quinton Young. The Thistle man had been booked earlier.

Young was the scorer of the only goal of the game, diving to head home a McLean cross in the 10th minute. And the ex-Coventry winger turned in a great display throughout the game, constantly keeping the Jags defence on the hop.

It was one of his best performances for the Light Blues.

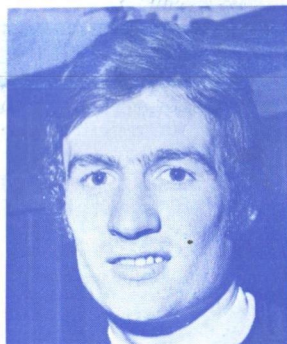
But the incentives are great. So is the challenge. A combination of circumstances which brings out the best in Rangers.

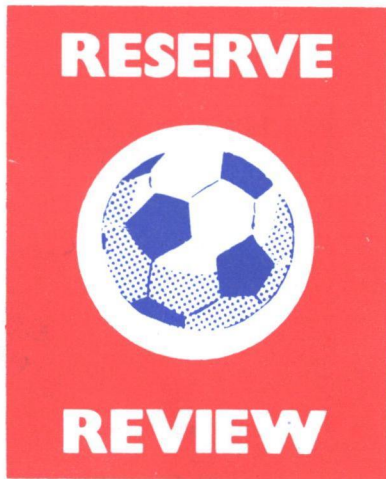

Joe's New Year wish ...no more games off



RANGERS' second team coach Joe Mason is hoping desperately for a non-frosty start to the New Year.

For with three vital games inside the next week, Joe is hoping for good weather which will allow the fixtures to be played.

"We've lost too many games already," says the Ibrox coach.

"We are something like five games behind Partick Thistle in the League programme and I don't want the gap to widen any more.

"If we lose any more games it is bound to mean a hectic run of matches towards the end of the season.

"And I would hate to be in a winning position in the table, then lose out because of too many games inside a short period.

"I don't think it would happen anyway, for the boys are determined to get the title this time, but it would certainly be better if we could catch up on our backlog of games gradually."

Of course, part of the trouble is that with the ban on floodlights there can be no mid-week night games until the lighter evenings come in the spring.

"We can't play midweek games with early afternoon kick-offs because many of the other teams in the League are part-timers and cannot get players off work.

"So we'll just have to keep playing away whenever we can and hope that there are no more postponements."

Coach Mason is happy with the way the team is progressing, and is particularly

pleased with the form showed by some of the younger players in the recent trial match against the Scottish Professional Youth squad.

"Boys like Gordon Boyd, Alex McVake, Martin Henderson and Donald Hunter shaped up really well. The promise for the future is encouraging."

One Ibrox youngster who found the trial game an unusual experience was striker Alex O'Hara—who played for the Scots *AGAINST* Rangers.

"It was strange right from the start," says 17-year-old Alex. "I wanted to go to the other end of the pitch at the kick-off and during the game felt I should be passing to a blue jersey."

"It also let me see just how hard it is to play *AGAINST* Rangers, and how difficult it is to score goals."

Alex also learned the hard way that when you change sides, your friends quickly forget who you are—for he was at the receiving end of some hard tackles from Ibrox colleague Ian Thomson.

"I got no favours from Ian," says Alex. "But I suppose that's how it should be."

Today's game against Partick Thistle at Firhill is a vital one for the Reserves, for Jags are the League leaders and a win for the Light Blues would strengthen considerably their chances of ending up as champions.
