Queen's didn't lose a goal in seven years!

QUEEN'S PARK are unique. Not just in Scotland, but Britain. Very possibly the world. Is there another country where an **AMATEUR** side competes successfully in a professional League?

There may be—but even if Queen's do have a rival in this sphere, it's doubtful if they could match the proud Hampden record of having battled it out with professionals for more than 70 years.

Queen's of course, have a special place in Scottish football history. They are our oldest club—founded in 1867, SIX years before the S.F.A. was formed and 24 years before the Scottish League was founded.

As you might expect, Queen's dominated the Scottish scene in those early formative days. They were the giants—so far ahead of the rest that for the first seven years in their history they didn't even lose a goal!

They even took on the best in England in what was the fore-runner of the international events to come. And a 0-0 draw against the English in Glasgow in 1872 helped give the game a tremendous boost in Scotland—yes, even as far back as that the Scots enjoyed a good result against the English.

A year later under the guidance of Queen's, who called the original meeting, the S.F.A. was formed and the Scottish Cup came into being in 1873-74.

It was to be expected that Queen's would dominate the new competition, and they did . . . winning the trophy for the first three years of its existence. Indeed, in the first 20 years the Amateurs took the trophy 10 times, and twice reached the final of the English Cup!

FOCUS ON THE CUP



However, when the League was formed in 1891 Queen's would have nothing to do with the new set-up because of the then illegal, but evident, professionalism. Even when professional football was legalised in 1893 Queen's remained outside the League and spent 10 years 'in the wilderness' before finally joining.

By that time, their truly great days were over. They have never won the Cup since 1893, the year the professionals arrived, and have never taken the First Division title although they have twice been Division Two champions.

But this lack of success has never discouraged Queen's. Neither has the huge financial commitment of running Scotland's biggest ground, Hampden.

The club naturally supplies the bulk of any Scottish Amateur International side.

And through the years they have enriched the game with dozens of great players, many of whom have

The men we face today . . .

★ Goalkeeper **RONNIE LOWRIE**. 6 ft. 11 st. 7 lbs. Joined Queen's last year from St. Roch's and made a quick breakthrough this season. From East Kilbride, he is a student at Jordanhill College in Glasgow. Was ordered off early in the match in an earlier Cup tie against Edinburgh University at Hampden—which the 10-man Queen's team won 1-0.

★ Full back **TOMMY BARR**. 5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 7 lbs. One of the long-serving Queen's men, having joined them from Lanark United in 1965. Amateur internationalist with nearly 20 caps he was originally a right half. A bank accountant.

★ Full back **JOHN MCGOWAN**. 5 ft. 9 in., 11 st. Joined Queen's from Glasgow University in 1972 and has been a regular ever since in the first team. Played 29 League matches last term. Amateur internationalist, he holds a B.Sc. degree in accountancy.

★ Full back **IAN DOUGAN**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 5 lbs. Signed from Bellahouston Academy in 1971, he is a student at

Jordanhill College. Played 12 first team games at the end of last season.

★ Wing-half **DAVID GIBSON**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 8 lbs. Ex-Garrioch United player who joined up at Hampden in 1970. Skilful midfield player, he's an engineer with Rolls Royce at Hillington. Played 14 games in the first team last season.

★ Centre half **CAMMY THOMSON**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 10 lbs. Club captain. Joined Queen's in 1969 from City Chambers A.F.C. Amateur internationalist, he is a B.Sc. (chemistry) graduate and works as an insurance surveyor. Played in 26 League games last season. Saved a penalty against Edinburgh University after taking over in goal when Lowrie was sent off.

★ Wing half **EDDIE HUNTER**. 5 ft. 11 in., 12 st. 6 lbs. Came up through the Queen's Park coaching school after joining the club in 1963. A sanitary engineer, he's a big forceful player.

★ Forward **MALKY MACKAY**. 5 ft. 11 in., 12 st. 4 lbs. Longest serving player at

gone on to become among the top professionals in the country.

Rangers have benefitted greatly from the services of men who have stepped across Glasgow from Hampden to Ibrox to become legends in the Light Blue jersey.

The supreme example, of course, is the late Alan Morton. There have been many others down through the years . . . George Brown, Sammy Cox, Bobby Brown, Ian McColl right down to two young men currently on the staff, Derek Parlane and Ally Scott. And a third ex-Hampden man, Doug Houston, is now at Ibrox after a career with Dundee.

Queen's still supply a steady stream of talent to the professional ranks, and it would be surprising if some of the Hampden squad in action today did not take the same route to fame.

Queen's were relegated at the end of season 1957-58 and have been stuck in the Second Division since then. But with four teams on the go at

Hampden, the talent is still available. And the will to win, particularly against the bigger clubs, remains unshaken.

There is no harm in repeating what has been said before—Amateur doesn't mean push-over.

RANGERS RALLY

Left back **WILLIE MATHIESON**, the quiet man of Ibrox, will be the guest speaker at the 26th annual rally of the Rangers Supporters' Association in March.

FACT FILE ...

TODAY is the 10th Scottish Cup tie between the clubs, dating back to 1878-79. Rangers have won seven of the previous nine ties, losing twice. There have also been four draws, taking the number of actual games to 13. The last meeting was 20 years ago.

THE QUEEN'S PARK CREST

The record attendance at Hampden for a Queen's Park match was set in 1933 when, after two 1-1 draws, Rangers won a Scottish Cup second round second replay 3-1 before a 97,000 crowd.

Queen's record win is 16-0 in a Scottish Cup first round tie against St. Peters in 1885-86.

Their heaviest defeat was 9-0 by Motherwell in a First Division League match in 1930.

Their highest individual League scorer was Willie Martin, who netted 30 in the First Division in 1937-38.

In the League, Rangers and Queen's have met 84 times. Rangers have won 62 of the games, lost nine and drawn 13.

In the process, the Light Blues scored 223 goals and conceded 78.

4. Be particularly careful on the exit stairs, and avoid jostling as much as possible.
5. Abide by Stewards' and Police instructions.

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REUNION DAY FOR

THE "OLD BOYS"...

TODAY'S tie will bring back memories for four former players, now officials, who will be watching from the stand.

For 20 years ago the quartet were out on the field of action when the clubs last met in a Scottish Cup tie.

It was at Ibrox in January 1954, and on a snow-covered pitch Rangers won 2-0 after a hard battle.

And the hero for the Light Blues was . . . outside right Willie Waddell, now the Ibrox General Manager and a club director.

In the Queen's line-up were Ian Harnett at right-back (now the Queen's Park President), right half Bert Cromar and outside left Willie Omand (both members of the Hampden Committee).

So it's a real 'old boys' get-together today. However, Willie Waddell certainly has the happier memories of the game.

He was nearing the end of his long career at Ibrox, but still had the pace to scorch over the snow in the 50th minute on a great run from the half-way line.

He cut inside, beat the full back Dewar then chipped a shot past goalkeeper Hastie Weir from an acute angle.

That goal took the pressure off Rangers, who had found the lively Queen's attack a problem in the first half. Happily for the Light Blues Willie Woodburn was in tremendous form in defence and coped well with a young centre called Max Murray!

'clean through'

After the Waddell goal, Rangers piled in looking for more. Weir had great saves from McCulloch and Gardiner then 16 minutes from time Gardiner was clean through and looked certain to score but shot against the keeper.

Just as Rangers were prepared to settle for a 1-0 win, they got No. 2 . . . Gardiner heading in a corner three minutes from time.

The cross came from . . . Waddell, of course.

That lifts his total to the season to 17, with eight in his last seven matches.

A run which naturally delights the young centre. But he is quick to point out how much he owes to his Ibrox colleagues, particularly regarding the goals in that 4-2 win at Tynecastle.

"Big Ally Scott, Tommy McLean and Eric Morris played so well and helped make scoring easier for me" says Derek.

Now Derek is looking forward to keeping the goals going—and

is keen to get more today against his old team Queen's Park.

The Rhu youngster spent some time at Hampden as a boy learning the game. And, of course, Ally Scott is an even more recent ex-Hampden man, only leaving the Amateurs this season to turn pro with Rangers.

Ally, whose powerful running shattered the Hearts defence, has been unlucky so often with his scoring attempts and had one kicked off the line at Tynecastle with the keeper beaten.

So nothing would please him more than a goal or two today against his old mates.

RESERVE REVIEW

COLTS TITLE BID HIT BY WEATHER

RANGERS RESERVES, already well behind in their League schedule, lost another game last week when the match against Hearts took a wet K.O.

The heavy rain in the previous few days left the Ibrox pitch waterlogged and the game had no chance of going on.

Which adds to the frustration felt by the Colts, who are poised to scoop the Reserve League title but may be hit by a crush of games at the end of the season.

Currently the reserves are in second place, a point behind leaders Partick Thistle but with four games in hand.

They are in a really strong position

and are anxious to catch up on a few games and overtake Jags at the top.

"We'll be trying to fix up as many midweek matches as we can," says coach Joe Mason. "But in the present emergency conditions night games are ruled out so it makes it difficult finding teams who have players free for afternoon games."

However, last week the Colts did manage to get a game—and went to town in style with a 5-0 walloping of Dundee at Ibrox.

That was their 12th win in 16 games, and one of the best.

It contained a hat-trick from outside left Eric Morris which led to the ex-Irvine Meadow youngster getting a chance in the first team a few days later against Hearts.

Derek Parlane was played for part of the game to keep him ticking over—and produced a goal. Then on came Ally Scott as substitute . . . and he netted as well.

Both players were also in against Hearts, and produced devastating form so the Reserve game certainly provided the right guidance for manager Jock Wallace.

"It was the best performance I've seen from the team," says coach Mason. "It was a great all-round display, with young Alan Cuthbertson coming in for a game in midfield and shaping up really well.

The Colts were one down at the interval, but 10 minutes into the second half Johnny Hamilton equalised from a Martin Henderson pass. A point seemed likely, until Dons grabbed the winner.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terraces.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the roadside when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.
