United out to maintain form

THE great football revival on Tayside is a double effort, for today's visitors Dundee United are going every bit as well as their cross-the-street neighbours from Dens Park.

United are currently in the top half-dozen in the table, and of course won through against Morton last weekend to make it to the quarter-finals of the Scottish Cup where they are due to face Dunfermline.

So the season so far has been a successful one for the Tannadice men, and they are determined to keep the form going.

United have never been able to bag any of the major honours—two Second Division Championships is the best they have managed.

Ambitious

But under the ambitious Jim McLean they are striving for the kind of style and form which can put them up alongside the top teams.

They were formed in 1910 as Dundee Hibs, and only became United in 1923 after some controversy. There was a move to have the club named Dundee City, but eventually the 'United' supporters won through.

United have won promotion four times—in 1924-25, 28-29, 30-31 and 59-60. The first twice they came up as Second Division champions.

They were relegated in 26-27, 29-30 and 31-32.

United played in the Fairs Cup in 1966-67 (beating the then holders Barcelona before going out to Juventus) and also in 1969-70 where they lost in the first round to Newcastle.

In 1940, United went to the Final of the War Cup and lost 1-0 to Rangers at Hampden.



Today's match will be the 36th League meeting between the clubs, and the record reads: Rangers won 24, lost seven and drawn four.

Over the previous 35 games, Rangers have scored 76 goals and conceded 30.

Brothers

Tannadice manager Jim McLean is, of course, brother of Ibrox winger Tommy. And another member of the family, Willie, bosses Queen of the South, so the McLeans of Ashgill can lay claim to being one of Scotland's top footballing families.

The United manager is only 34, and recognised as one of the country's most progressive bosses. He served a long career in football as a player with Hamilton Accies, Clyde, Dundee and Kilmarnock before going to Dens Park as coach in 1970 under John Prentice.

In December 1971 he stepped across the road from Dens to take over at Tannadice and since that date has made a number of changes in the line-up of the United squad.

His main aim has been to sign and develop his own youngsters and judging from the quality of players like Youth caps Andy Gray, David Narey, Graham Payne along with Brian Rankin, manager McLean is well on the way to his target.

THE MEN WE FACE TODAY...

★ Goalkeeper **SANDY DAVIE**. 6 ft. 1 in., 11 st. 7 lbs. Former Scotland Under-23 'keeper who returned to United in May 1972 after a successful spell in English football with Luton and Southampton. Cost £8,000 to bring him back. Played in 10 League matches last season and only recently won first team place back from Hamish McAlpine.

★ Goalkeeper **HAMISH McALPINE**. 5 ft. 11 in., 10 st. 7 lbs. Signed in 1966 from local youth football. Played in 24 League matches last season and this term after playing 31 games in a row dropped out four matches ago.

★ Full back **ANDY ROLLAND**. 5 ft. 9 in., 11 st. Adventurous, attacking defender who can also turn out in attack and grab a goal. Has hit four so far this season. Was on the right wing against Morton last week. Signed from Cowdenbeath in 1966 and a regular ever since. Packs a wallop in both feet.

★ Full back **FRANK KOPEL**. 5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. 4 lbs. Former Manchester United star who lined up alongside Bobby Charlton and Denis Law in his Old Trafford days. Returned to Scotland on a free from Blackburn in 1972 and has been a fine player for United ever since.

★ Wing half **JACKY COPLAND**. 6 ft., 12 st. Was a striker when signed from Stranraer for £10,000 in 1971. But United converted this big strong player into one of the most consistent, solid defenders in the country. He has been linked with a number of big English clubs, including Newcastle.

★ Centre half **DOUG SMITH**. 5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. 2 lbs. Brother of Rangers wing half Dave, and one of the most consistent, solid pivots in the country over the past 16 years. A wonderful club servant, he has made more than 500 first team appearances and is still playing as well as ever. Played in 31 League matches last term.

★ Wing half **WALTER SMITH**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 2 lbs. No relation to Dave—but operates alongside his namesake well. Ex-Ashfield junior, he was signed in 1967 and can play equally well in midfield as well as at the back.

★ Forward **GEORGE FLEMING**. 5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 4 lbs. Tough, hard-working forward who was signed from Hearts in 1972 as a winger but now operates in midfield. Made 31 League appearances last season and scored three goals.

★ Forward **BRIAN RANKIN**. 5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. 9 lbs. Big, strong forward who was signed from junior club Vale of Clyde in 1971 and has progressed well. Got the goal which beat Morton in the Cup last Sunday.

★ Forward **PAT GARDNER**. 5 ft. 10 in., 12 st. Cost £13,000 from Dunfermline in 1972. Versatile, experienced man who can make and take goals. Was the club's top scorer last term with 15 goals in League and League Cup and has netted five this season. Has worn the 7, 8, 9, 10 and 6 jerseys.

★ Forward **ARCHIE KNOX**. 5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. 7 lbs. Local man who was with Forfar and St. Mirren before going to Tannadice for a small fee just two years ago. Works hard in midfield, and comes through for a goal—having hit six this term so far.

★ Forward **ANDY GRAY**. 5 ft. 8 in., 10 st. Ex-Clydebank Strollers youth cap who is set for stardom. Dozens of top clubs have been watching this 18-year-old's meteoric rise to stardom. Came into the first team this term and really caught on. Has hit 15 goals so far, despite being hampered by injury which has kept him out of action recently. Will be in Scotland's Youth squad for the European Professional Youth tournament this season.

★ Forward **GRAHAM PAYNE**. 5 ft. 5 in., 9½ st. Lively little forward who has the makings of a top player. Also in the Professional Youth squad.

★ Forward **TOMMY TRAYNOR**. 5 ft. 6 in., 9 st. 10 lbs. Ex-Hearts man who was signed in 1970. Winger, he can also lie deep to take the weight off his defence.

Others who could come into the reckoning include experienced striker **KENNY CAMERON**, ex-Dundee and Kilmarnock; 17-year-old centre half **DAVIE NAREY** who is being groomed as a successor to Doug Smith and is a Youth cap and Irishman **KEVIN SHEEHY** who had a spell in English football before joining United but has only recently recovered from a cartilage operation.

DANDY DEREKS GET CALL-UP...

CENTRE HALF Derek Johnstone and striker Derek Parlane were named during the week for the Scotland Under-23 pool for the meeting with Wales at Pittodrie on Wednesday.

For striker Parlane in particular this is a welcome boost. After a sticky spell at the start of the season the strapping youngster has recovered the form which made him a full internationalist last season and now has his eye set on a place in the final party for the World Cup finals in Munich in the summer.

All he has to do is keep on turning in the strong, forceful displays of recent weeks and he should make it.

Derek tops the Ibrox scoring charts with 21 goals so far.

Conn's crackers settles it

SUBSTITUTE Alfie Conn was the man who mattered when Rangers took on United at Tannadice in the League match played earlier this season—October 20 to be exact.

For deputy Conn—brought on as sub for Ally Scott in the 61st minute—came in with a late 1-2 goal punch which k.o.'d United.

The Ibrox men were leading by a 46th minute goal from young Alex O'Hara, who had headed in a McLean cross in the 46th minute. Then manager Jock Wallace sent on Alfie to try to clinch the win.

In the 76th minute Conn moved in on a pass from O'Hara—after good work by Doug Houston—to hit Rangers' second.

A minute later an own goal by Derek Johnstone—he deflected a Gray shot into the net—brought United back into it.

But six minutes from time Conn crashed a 20-yarder under 'keeper McAlpine to settle the win.

Last season, Rangers won both League matches—4-1 at Tannadice on December 9 and 2-1 at Ibrox on April 14.

In the Tannadice match, Rangers led 3-0 at half-time with a display which delighted the Ibrox fans.

The pitch was very slippery, but both Quinton Young and Tommy McLean were in fine form while Alex MacDonald was a good deputy for the absent John Greig and Derek Johnstone was stand-in skipper.

Alfie Conn got the opener in the 20th minute after Derek Parlane pounced on a poor kick-out and squared the pass. Then Parlane helped himself to a quick double—heading in No. 2 in the 33rd minute and forcing in another goal three minutes later.

Sandy Jardine came charging upfield in the 70th minute to thunder in No. 4 before Henry hit a consolation one for United.

Skipper John Greig was back—with a bang—for the return match in April at Ibrox. He hit both goals in the 2-1 win.

It was 0-0 at half-time in a tight game, then Greig got the first in the 58th minute. MacDonald and McLean set up a chance for Parlane, whose shot was blocked and the Ibrox skipper came charging in on the rebound to blast it home.

His second 11 minutes later was another in the same

mould—a Parlane shot blocked and this time Greig slammed the ball in from 18 yards.

United got one back when Reid netted from a Traynor cross.

HAMBURG CUP FLIES OUT WITH RANGERS

RANGERS fly out for Germany next Sunday—and hope to bring back a Cup to put in the Ibrox trophy room. And it's a Cup which is going out with Rangers!

The magnificent trophy has been donated by the Lord Provost of Glasgow, Mr William Gray, as part of the Glasgow Week celebrations which will take place in Hamburg the week starting March 4.

Rangers will face the strong-going H.S.V. Hamburg in a match on Monday March 4 to decide who keeps the trophy and a 30,000 crowd is expected to watch the game.

Among the spectators will be four special guests—Rangers fans who were lucky enough to win a trip to Germany in a competition run by the club's official newspaper, the *Rangers News*.

The lucky quartet are school-girl Jaqueline Wright, a pupil at Woodside Senior Secondary; Mr John Martin, Andrew Allan, and Allan Black—all from Glasgow, of course.

IT'S A FACT

The record attendance at Tannadice is 28,000 set in the Fairs Cup tie against Barcelona in 1966.

Biggest fee the club has received was £50,000 from Newcastle for Ian Mitchell in October, 1970.

United's record victory was a 14-0 win over Nithsdale Wanderers in the first round of the Scottish Cup in 1931.

Their heaviest defeat came from Motherwell in a Second Division game in season 1953-54—a 12-1 walloping.

Their highest individual League scorer in a season was Johnny Coyle with 41 in 1955-56.

The Tannadice stand was rebuilt in 1960 during a face-lift for the ground which cost £250,000.

Tannadice was originally opened in 1909.

Rangers were the first team to play under the Tannadice lights—in November 1962.



They will spend three days in Hamburg, flying out on Sunday with the team and returning on the Tuesday. It should be a wonderful trip for the four fans. And it will be even better if that Cup comes back with them.

Young'uns star in Colts title bid

A RESERVE side laced heavily with men of first team experience helped the Colts take a step nearer the Reserve League title with a 3-2 win over Motherwell at Fir Park 10 days ago.

The first team men were in action primarily to give comeback men like

John Greig and Tom Forsyth much needed match practice.

But with most of the younger reserves out in Italy for the Under-21 tournament at Viareggio, the older hands also had the job of keeping the fine Reserve record going.

They succeeded, and now the Colts are well out in front with a commanding five-point lead over nearest rivals Aberdeen.

The news of that win must have been encouraging for the youngsters in Italy, who did well to win through their opening two-leg fixture against Bologna of Italy with victories of 3-2 and 1-0.

Because of the current power problem, it is not possible for the Match Magazine to give full details of the Italian tournament but this will be put right in a later issue, plus of course the *Rangers News* will carry information as well.

A Quinton Young header from a cross by Alex McVake gave the Reserves the lead against Motherwell, but then the Fir Parkers hit back to draw level at the interval.

However, after the break the Ibrox men struck with two quick goals. Young John Farrell, a 16-year-old 'S' form signing who plays with Lanarkshire juvenile side Fairholm, got the first of the double and Tom Forsyth came up to get another.

And although Motherwell pulled another one back, the points went to Rangers.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the roadside when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.
