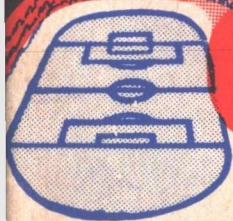

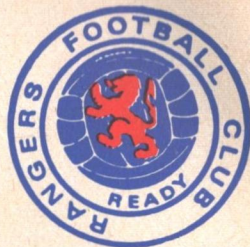

'BULLY WEE' OUT FOR VITAL POINTS

A DISAPPOINTING 2-0 home defeat last week by Morton deprived Clyde of the two points which would have assuredly lifted them clear of any lingering relegation worries. As it is they still look safe enough on the 21-point mark.

But manager Stan Anderson will be looking for a few more points just to make sure.

And that's why Clyde will be dangerous opponents today—particularly since ex-Ibrox man Stan (he only joined the Shawfielders this season after serving successfully as coach with Rangers for several years) would like nothing better than to put one over on his ex-boss Jock Wallace.

The Ibrox manager and the Shawfield boss are good friends—but that won't get in the way of either boss looking for a win today.

Stan, of course, needs no run-down on the Rangers team. But even his specialised knowledge might not help Clyde—judging by the record books.

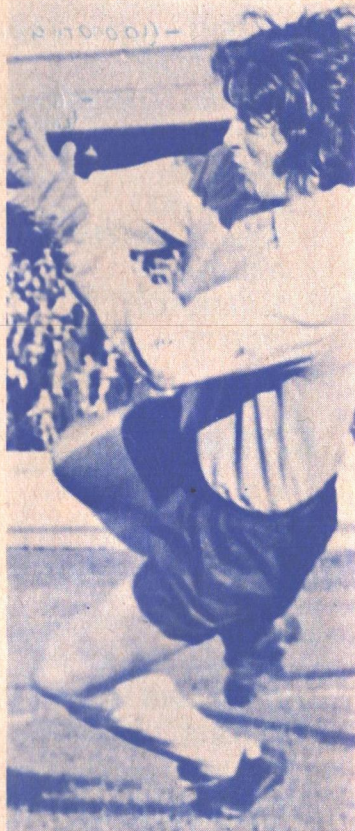
For only five times in 61 League visits—today is the 62nd—have Clyde come away with both points. Their last Ibrox win was in 1955-56 when they won 1-0 in the last match of the season.

The last time they even got a point was in 1966-67, when they drew 1-1. And, incidentally, that goal they scored is the only one they have netted at Ibrox in the past seven visits.

So the odds are stacked against Clyde, but that won't stop the determined Shawfielders or manager Anderson who is also a former Rangers and Clyde player.

Clyde are, of course, the current holders of the Second Division championship flag—having won the title last season when they bounced back to the top League in a season with 56 points,

four ahead of the field. It's a title they have won on four other occasions. And although they have never lifted the First Division crown, Clyde have a proud Scottish Cup history.

Three times winners, and three times runners-up... that's the Shawfield Cup tally. They first won the trophy in 1939 when they beat Motherwell 4-0 and then in the 1950s scored great wins over Celtic in 1955 (1-0 after a 1-1 draw) and three years later defeated Hibs by the only goal of the game.

Their first Final appearance was in 1910 when they lost 2-1 to Dundee after two drawn matches.

Two years later they were beaten 2-0 by Celtic and in 1949 went down 4-1 to Rangers.

Clyde were founded in 1878 and joined the First Division in 1892. Originally they played at Barrowfield but moved to Shawfield in 1898.

Over the years the Shawfield club has produced some great international players—men like Tommy Ring and Harry Haddock.

They are, of course, at present a part-time club.

THE MEN WE FACE TODAY...

★ Goalkeeper **PHIL CAIRNEY**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 10 lbs. Signed from juvenile football in 1970 and made the breakthrough a couple of seasons ago. Only missed two League matches last season. A student of physical education at Jordanhill College in Glasgow.

★ Full back **EDDIE ANDERSON**. 5 ft. 9 in., 11 st. 6 lbs. Signed from Kirkintilloch in 1969. Skilful defender with a liking for attack. A Post Office electrician in Glasgow.

★ Full back **ALAN SWAN**. 5ft. 9 in., 10 st. 10 lbs. Joined Clyde in 1970 from Shettleston Juniors as a centre forward but has developed into a hard-tackling full back. Another Glasgow man—and another Post Office electrician.

★ Wing half **JOHN MCHUGH**. 5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. 7 lbs. Clyde's longest-serving player, having joined them in 1961 from Dennistoun Waverley. Has been a tremendous servant to the club. Solid professional player and a deadly tackler. A graduate of Glasgow University, he is a schoolteacher.

★ Centre half **WILLIE McVIE**. 6 ft., 12 st. A big, robust defender whose power in the air makes him hard to beat. Joined Clyde from Lanarkshire junior football in 1970, he comes from Larkhall and is a plumber with the county council.

★ Wing half **BRIAN AHERN**. 5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 10 lbs. Joined Clyde from juvenile football three years ago and has developed as a fine attacking half back in the past couple of seasons. Can grab a goal as well, hitting nine in the League last season. He's a Rutherglen man and works as a civil servant in the Savings Bank at Cowglen.

★ Forward **DOMINIC SULLIVAN**. 5 ft. 10 in., 10 st. 12 lbs. Joined Clyde from Glasgow junior club St. Roch's in 1969 and has become a big favourite with the Shawfield fans. A fast, tricky winger with two good feet he was nominated for the Scottish League international pool last week. Works in local government in Glasgow.

★ Forward **JIM BURNS**. 5 ft. 8 in., 11 st. Seasoned campaigner who was signed from Cowdenbeath in 1968. His experience and calm skill are vital in midfield for Clyde. The only player in the side who was bought from another club, he works as a joiner in Stirling.

★ Forward **SAM MILLER**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 3 lbs. Tall, elegant player who can operate in midfield or as a striker. He was signed from juvenile football four years ago and is a student at Glasgow University.

★ Forward **BOBBY FERRIS**. Bright new Shawfield star who looks like being a top player. Only called up from local Fernhill amateur club this season and has already shown great skill as a goal-maker and taker. Just 18, he is an auto-electrician in Glasgow but comes from Rutherglen.

★ Forward **PETER BOYLE**. 5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 7 lbs. Operates on the left wing, but likes nothing better than to come inside looking for goals and has netted enough to prove he's good at it. Fancied by several bigger clubs because of this ability. Signed in 1972 from Larkhall Thistle, he's a Lanarkshire man and works as an industrial chemist.

★ Forward **ROBERT HARVEY**. 5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 7 lbs. Shawfield new boy—signed last year from juvenile football—who has made a quick breakthrough. He's from Rutherglen, and works as a clerk with Lanarkshire County Council in Hamilton.

★ Defender **JOE McGOLDRICK**. 5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. 7 lbs. Versatile defender who was signed from Paisley juvenile football in 1971. From Renfrewshire, he's a college student in Glasgow.

DONALD'S NO FOOL!



YOUNG goalkeeper Donald Hunter, who has had a spectacular rise to eminence with Rangers this season—he was a schoolboy in Dumbartonshire at the start of the term—will have another cause for celebration on Monday . . . his 19th birthday.

COLIN BULLETS ONE IN!

Clyde defence in top form

RANGERS went to Shawfield on League business four months ago and came back with both points from a 2-0 win. But they had to fight all the way for the goals despite having the bulk of the pressure from start to finish.

The Ibrox men were never in danger of losing, but it was a different matter getting the goals that brought the points.

Clyde defended with great determination and coolness, marshalled superbly by veterans John McHugh and Jim Burns.

Rangers came close several times early on, particularly big defender Colin Jackson, who kept coming up for the many corner kicks won. Derek Parlane hit a hook shot against the bar and it seemed a first-half goal would never come.

But in the 40th minute big Colin Jackson's persistence paid off. A corner was blocked, and went back to Tommy McLean who promptly fired in a fine cross for Jackson to soar high and bullet in a header.

Skipper John Greig, who had been operating as a striker alongside Parlane in the first half, moved back to midfield after the break because of the tight defensive work of the Shawfielders.

The pressure continued, and eventually brought a second goal. Again a Tommy McLean cross started the move. Derek Parlane sent in a header which was blocked, but ran well for the charging Alex MacDonald who rammed a left foot drive into the net in the 67th minute.

Ibrox centre Parlane was booked for dissent and Clyde's Dominic Sullivan also had his name taken—after a clash with colleague Peter Boyle!

Right back Sandy Jardine was Rangers' top man—brilliant in both defence and attack.

BACK HOME!

FOR FIRST TIME IN FIVE WEEKS

MORE like strangers than Rangers. That could be the reaction of the fans at Ibrox today. For the meeting with Clyde brings the Light Blues back home for a match for the first time in FIVE weeks.

February 24 against Dundee United was the last home appearance. The match against Dunfermline on March 9 was postponed because of the Scottish Cup, and this was followed by two away League meetings with Morton and Falkirk.

Rangers also did a bit of travelling in the five-week Ibrox absence—to Hamburg and Manchester for friendly games.

But there is no doubt that the supporters and the players will be happy to be back home today.

Rangers now have four outstanding League matches waiting to be played off, and it seems likely that they will start catching up on the back-log next week once the Scottish League have sorted out the fixtures.

The matches to come are: Aberdeen at Pittodrie (from September 22); Motherwell at Ibrox (from December 1); Dundee at Dens Park (from December 8) and Dunfermline.

IT'S A FACT

● This will be the 124th League meeting between Rangers and Clyde.

★ Rangers have won 90 of the previous encounters, lost 12 and drawn 21.

● In the process they have scored 348 goals, and conceded 118.

★ Clyde's record victory is 11-1 v. Cowdenbeath in a Second Division match in 1951.

● Their record defeat is 11-0 by Rangers in the fourth round of the Scottish Cup in 1880-81.

★ The record attendance at Shawfield is 52,000 for a First Division match against Rangers in November 1908.

● The highest number of points Clyde have won in a season was 64 in the Second Division in 1956-57.

★ The highest tally of individual League goals for the club was 32 by Billy Body in 1932-33.

League race isn't over yet . . .

MASON HAMMERS HOME MESSAGE

THE IBROX Reserves are moving confidently towards their first Reserve League Championship triumph since 1968-69.

At the moment, the Colts are away out in front at the top of the table—eight points ahead of their only possible challengers Aberdeen.

But the Dons have two games in hand, so the gap could only be four and coach Joe Mason is taking good care to hammer it home to his men that the title race is not over yet.

"We have led the table for so long that it would be silly to slip up in the run-in because of complacency," says Joe.

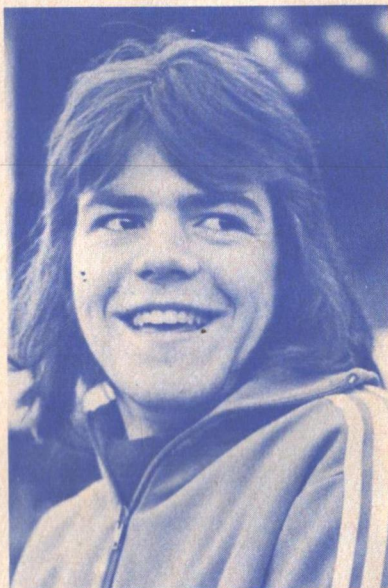
"We've just 10 games to go, and Dons have 12. What we must do is keep on winning to make sure that the gap remains at four points no matter what Aberdeen are doing."

Last week the second team boys whipped Falkirk 4-2 at Ibrox, cramming on three goals in the second half after going in at the interval level at 1-1.

"It was quite a good performance, although we can still play a bit better," says coach Mason.

Young Billy Steele put Rangers ahead with a fine header in the 20th minute from a George Struthers cross. Then Falkirk equalised when a shot hit defender Ian Thomson and went spinning over 'keeper Stewart Kennedy's arms.

After the break Alex McVake hammered in a 12-yard right foot shot to put Rangers ahead again and Johnny Hamilton followed up with a flashing 25-yarder. Then came a fourth from

4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the roadside when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.
