Sons build up for Top Ten

HAVING scraped through to survival in their first promoted season in 1972-73—they finished in third bottom place—Dumbarton last term fought their way up the table to finish in the top 12.

And now Sons are confident they can go a place or two better once again this season—and win themselves a coveted place in the top 10 for next year's Super League.

Manager Alex Wright a few weeks ago strengthened the Boghead pool for this very purpose by signing the tall Jim Muir from Motherwell and tricky winger Jim Cook from Kilmarnock.

"This gives us a pool of around about 17 players—just what is needed for the task ahead," says manager Wright.

"We know that it is going to be a difficult job. The battle for those top 10 places will be quite something. But we are ready, and I'm sure we can make it.

"Today's game will let us

know just how we will fare in the games against the big clubs. We are looking for points—and pointers."

However, you have to go back into the **LAST CENTURY** to find a Dumbarton League win at Ibrox. That was in season 1891-92, the second year of the League competition. Sons won 3-1... and of course, the game was played at Old Ibrox, the fourth of Rangers' five grounds. The Light Blues didn't move into the present Ibrox till 1899.

In all, the club's have met 34 times in the League—Rangers won 24 of the games, lost six and four have been drawn.

In the process, Rangers have scored 83 goals and conceded 43 goals.

★ Sons will choose today from the following pool of players:

★ Goalkeeper **LAWRIE WILLIAMS**. 5ft 11in, 11st 7lbs. Signed from Port Glasgow in 1970, he has had to fight hard to win the No. 1 keeper's spot at Boghead but seems to have made it now. From Port Glasgow, he is a part-timer and works as an engineer.

★ Full back **TERRY MULLEN**. 5ft 8in, 10st 4lbs. Talented 18-year-old who was signed from schools football in Denny last year and soon made the break-through. Has just left school and plans to go to college.

★ Full back **DONALD WATT**. 5ft 11in, 11st. Speedy big defender who was snapped up by Sons when he was freed by Celtic last year. Injuries hampered him last season, but he seems set for a fine season now.

★ Wing-half **DENIS RUDDY**. 5ft 11in, 11st. Big, powerful defender who was signed from near-neighbours Clydebank a couple of years ago. One of the strong men of Scottish football. Part-timer, he works as a painter and decorator.

★ Centre-half **JIM MUIR**. 6ft, 10st 7lbs. Lanky defender—he can also play striker—who was bought from Motherwell a couple of weeks ago for £20,000. Sons hope this big Ayrshire man, a former junior with Irvine Vics, will add the necessary height and strength to the defence to see them through this testing season. Full-timer.

★ Wing-half **JOHNNY GRAHAM**. 5ft 8in, 10st 3lbs. Skilful, intelligent midfield man who drives hard to get the attack going. Signed from junior club Arthurlie in 1968.

Part-timer, he works with a whisky company in his home town of Paisley.

★ Winger **PETER COLEMAN**. 5ft 6½, 10st 4lbs. Signed from Albion Rovers in 1970, he's a clever ball player with a turn of speed which can be used on the wing or midfield. Part-timer, he's a time-keeper with Glasgow Corporation.

★ Forward **WILLIE WALLACE**. 5ft 9in, 11st 8lbs. One of football's wanderers, and a successful one. Started with Stenhousemuir, then moved on to Raith Rovers, Hearts, Celtic and Crystal Palace before joining Sons in 1972 after a couple of seasons in the south. Formerly a striker—with 7 caps—his most successful years were with Celtic and he was in the 1967 European Cup winning team.

★ Forward **TOM McADAM**. 6ft, 11st. Tall, skilful attacker whose ability has made him a target for bigger clubs—Dundee failed with a £50,000 offer last year and only a couple of weeks ago Sons turned down £60,000 from Nottingham Forest. A full timer now, he is only 21 and seems to have a great future ahead of him. Makes and takes goals.

★ Forward **JOHN BOURKE**. 6ft, 11st. Another bright youngster who links with McAdam to form a tall, formidable strike force. Signed from local juvenile football in 1972 and after a year was a first-team man. His progress was held up by a cartilage operation, but he has fully recovered now. A student at Jordanhill College in Glasgow, he has been training full time for the past few months before going back to college.

★ Forward **JIM COOK**. 5ft 4in, 10st 4lbs. Only joined Sons a couple of weeks ago from Kilmarnock. Formerly with Hearts, he's a quick, lively attacker who likes to come in off the wing looking for goals. Hard player to mark. Works in motor factory at Bathgate.

Others who could be in the running are veteran defender John Cushley, 5ft 10in, 11st

ex-Celtic, West Ham and Dunfermline defender who combines rugged football play with schoolteaching, and youngsters Andy Checkley (signed from Vale of Leven this year) and Ian Wallace who joined up from Yoker last year and is now a full-timer.

Behave..or stay away

RANGERS again ask their supporters to protect the image of the club. Do nothing which will bring discredit on Rangers—whether in victory or defeat.

By following the Ibrox code of conduct printed below, the supporters can help tremendously towards a trouble-free day.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the road-side when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

WHAT A FIRST GOAL!

A NEW name joined the Ibrox scoring lists last week—**IAN McDOUGALL**.

And the young midfielder man could hardly have picked a better game in which to score his first-ever goal for the club.

Ian's opener was the boost Rangers needed, and he was unlucky not to get a second soon after with a left-foot shot which touched the post on the way past.

The stocky ex-Pollok junior has made tremendous progress

since his first-team breakthrough last season, but has wisely been moved in and out of the top squad to bring him along at a reasonable pace.

However, the youngster will have to keep scoring at a fair rate if he wants to challenge the top boys.

Sharing the lead at the moment are Graham Fyfe and Sandy Jardine with 10 each (not counting the Texaco tie against Southampton on Wednesday) followed by Ally Scott on the seven mark.

COLIN JACKSON'S great winner against Celtic at Parkhead was his first goal of the season. He might get a better one at some time during the next few months.

"But I doubt if it will give me more pleasure," says 'Bomber', who showed just why he has earned that nickname as he came bombing over the Celtic defence to bullet home Tommy McLean's corner kick.

"I have come close a few times since the start of the season, but always the effort was blocked or cleared on the line.

"And even in the Celtic match I had made a couple of tries without success. So it was really good to get a clear run and jump for the goal.

"It's always good to score a goal. It's even better when it's a winner in a vital match. And when it happens to be Celtic..."

Colin, has of course, netted a few goals in his career. But he can't recall getting off to a better start to the season.

"The whole thing, of course, is that the team is playing so well and with so much confidence," says Colin. "We are all enjoying our game, and I'm particularly happy to get settled in at centre half and stay there."

Despite his 11 years at Ibrox, he is still only 27 and has plenty of good years to come yet.

"Perhaps the best years," says Colin, who in his spare time runs his own advertising and printing agency and is now learning the hotel trade with an eye to the future.

"But that's far in the future yet," says the Falkirk-born, Aberdeen-raised, Rutherglen-based defender.

"Right now I'm enjoying my football too much to think that far ahead."

And the fans are just as happy to keep on watching the new, commanding Jackson who right now is probably the best centre-half in the country.

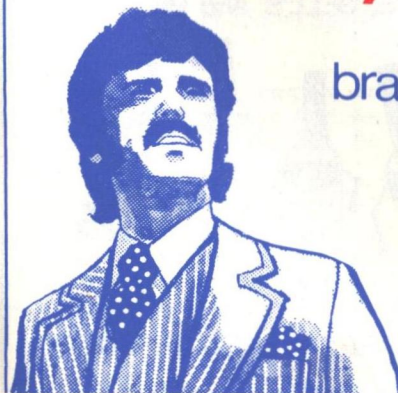

Do You Remember

■ DUMBARTON came to Ibrox on November 25, 1972 for a League match for the first time in half a century. They were relegated in 1921-22 and took 50 years to get back. And their 1972 visit to Ibrox was unsuccessful—they were beaten 3-1, although it took two late goals from Alfie Conn and Derek Parlane to give Rangers a win.

■ In the return match at Boghead on March 31, 1973 it was another Rangers win. But despite a flying start, with goals from Quinton Young and Derek Parlane the Light Blues had to go all the way for a 2-1 win.

Ross Mathie got the Sons goal in the first half in a game played in a semi-gale.

■ On September 19, 1962, Dumbarton drew 1-1 at Ibrox in a League Cup quarter-final second leg tie. John Greig got the Rangers goal and Doug Newlands netted for Sons. Rangers went through because they had won the first leg at Boghead 3-1.

■ Last season at Boghead on December 22, Rangers won 2-0 thanks to a headed Derek Parlane goal in 14 minutes and a Quinton Young shot in the 31st minute.

■ Big Ally Scott was the man who dumped Sons at Ibrox on April 27 this year—the final home League match of the 1973-74 season. After missing a load of chances, Ally followed up to net in the 52nd minute after a Graham Fyfe shot came back off the post, then four minutes later ran on to a Sandy Jardine pass and flicked home another. This made the score 3-0—Fyfe had netted a fine opener in the 8th minute. Ex-Ranger Brian Heron got Sons' only goal in the 70th minute.

'We've got to keep up the pressure'

—WALLACE

JUST the start—not the end. That's manager Jock Wallace's view after Saturday's 2-1 win over Celtic at Parkhead.

"It means we've got something to work on now. And work is what we will be doing. There would be no point in throwing away the ad-

vantages gained at Parkhead with slack play in future games.

"We've got to keep the play and pressure going in every game.

"After all, we've only played three League games. There's a long way to go yet."

However, the Ibrox boss is understandably delighted by the way things are going, and with the Parkhead performance.

"I feel the publicity surrounding the Derek Parlane ordering-off overshadowed the many good points as far as Rangers were concerned," says Jock.

"Young Ian MacDougall got a fine goal in his first Old Firm match, and nearly got a second. Derek Johnstone had a header cleared off the line and there was Colin Jackson's great winner.

"I thought we played well and deserved to win."

The Ibrox manager also paid tribute to the support given to the side by the fans.

"They were tremendous. Even when we went a goal down they kept the effort going and helped to lift the team.

"That's the kind of support we would like in every game. And we know we can get it if we give the fans the results.

"It's up to us. The fans have shown what they are willing to do, and after that Parkhead performance they will be ready to back us right down the line.

"We've got something going. Now we've got to keep it rolling."

'Senior men let us down' says Joe Mason

A BITTERLY disappointed Joe Mason laid the blame for Rangers Reserves 6-1 home defeat by Celtic squarely on the shoulders of the experienced players in the team.

"They let us down. There can be no mistake about that," says the Ibrox reserve coach.

"Men who should know by now how to cover and mark failed to do the job.

"I exempt only Peter McCloy from the criticism. He might be faulted slightly for one of the goals, but that's all. He played really well.

"But the other experienced men—it was just too bad to be true.

"I feel sorry for the youngsters in the squad. They worked hard and

tried everything and were naturally very low after the result.

"I'm just hoping they bounce back from the defeat quickly. It was certainly nothing to do with them."

The reserves lost an early goal, when Alex O'Hara—who had got away with an earlier faulty pass-back—hit the post with another pass-back attempt leaving Celtic striker Dixie Deans with an easy goal.

The troubles piled up after this. The Colts were soon 2-0 down, and after the break went to 4-0 before young Billy Steele, who also hit the post, netted.

But it didn't help much, and Celtic went on to get two more with Deans and Jimmy Bone getting

three each—which illustrates coach Mason's complaints about the marking.

"It was so disappointing after the improved performances in the previous few games" says Joe.

"But once we have sorted out what went wrong, we must buckle down to making up the lost ground in the championship."

Richard Sharp and Gordon Boyd were brought on as substitutes for Hamilton and Morris.

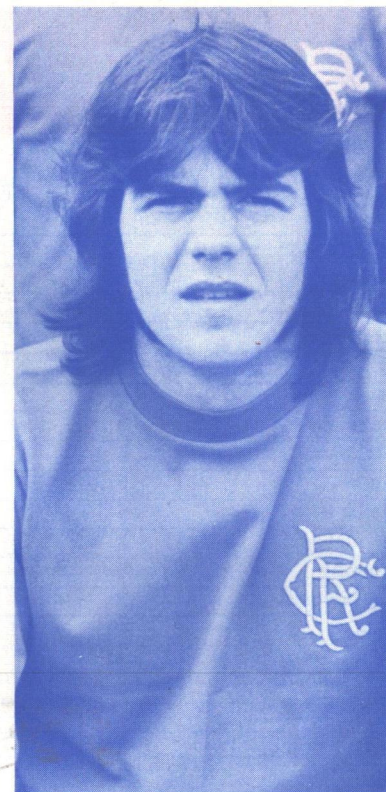
