Your Code of Conduct

RANGERS once again remind all fans of the need for the very best behaviour on the terracings. It is in the interests of the good name of the club that this should be a trouble-free day.

Once again Rangers ask all supporters to adhere to the club's 10-point Code of Conduct printed below.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on the terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the roadside when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.

They scored twice—and were beaten!

HEARTS come to Ibrox today back in the challenge for the Premier title after a slow start—and hoping for better luck than in their previous encounter with the Light Blues this season.

For in the second match of the season at Tynecastle on September 6, Hearts scored twice . . . and finished up beaten 2-0!

Yes, it was a couple of own goals that delivered the k.o., with the unlucky scorers being Alan Anderson in seven minutes and Don Murray in 32 minutes.

Anderson headed past Jim Cruickshank while trying to stop a Derek Parlane header reaching the waiting Derek Johnstone at the far post and Murray booted the ball home when he tried to turn a low Alex Miller shot past the post and instead put it into the net.

However, it was a game Rangers never looked like losing, despite having Tom Forsyth limp off injured after only nine minutes to be replaced by Jim Denny.

Hearts made strenuous efforts to get back at Rangers, but seldom troubled Peter McCloy and indeed it was Rangers who came nearest to getting another goal—Derek Parlane hitting the bar with a header.

Hearts step up their challenge

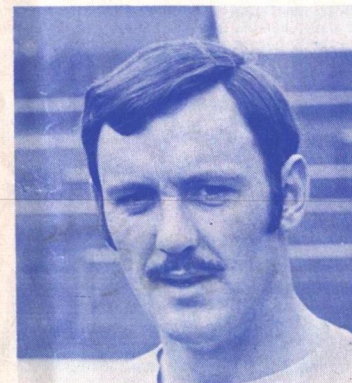
HEARTS, one of the great Scottish clubs with a long history of triumph and tradition, are currently trying to rebuild the team under the youthful managership of John Hagart.

A natural enthusiast, the new Hearts manager knows he has a formidable task ahead of him—but tackles it with relish.

However it may be a slow process before the team can regain the glory days like the 1950's when a star-packed side won the League title twice (and were second four times), took the League Cup three times and the Scottish Cup once.

Those were the days of the famous inside trio of Alfie Conn, Willie Bauld and Jimmy Wardhaugh. But there have been equally famous Tynecastle stars in previous generations and no doubt will be again.

At the moment manager Hagart sees his main job as consolidating Hearts' position in

the Premier Division—and at the moment he is being very successful.

Hearts are at Ibrox today in joint second place with Rangers and Motherwell—all sharing the 11-point mark.

A result today could go a long way towards maintaining the challenge and Hearts will be looking for at least a point. And they have plenty of experienced men to help them fight for that point.

Goalkeeper Jim Cruickshank and central defenders Alan Anderson and Don Murray are seasoned campaigners past the 30-year-old mark and know just how to play it under the kind of pressure Rangers are likely to exert today.

And up front Hearts have the strength and determination of Drew Busby plus the left wing skills of Rab Prentice to help them get the goals on the break.

Hearts will choose from the following pool of players:

★Goalkeeper **JIM CRUICKSHANK**. 5ft 10ins, 11st 10lbs. Hearts' longest-serving player, having joined as an amateur internationalist from Queen's Park in 1960. Now 33, but still playing well enough to earn a call-up to Scotland's pool for the European Championship match against Denmark last month. Has five full and three League Caps. Played 27 League games last season.

★Full back **ROY KAY**. 5ft 10in, 10st 8lbs. Signed from local football in 1968 and has been a first-team regular for the past few seasons. Played in 28 League games last season.

★Full back **DAVE CLUNIE**. 5ft 10½in, 11st. Has been 12 years at Tynecastle, signing from local youth football. Ex-schools international outside left who was converted into a top class club defender. Played in 27 League games last season.

★Full back **JIM JEFFERIES**. 6ft 1in, 11st 3lbs. Big, strong player who turns in a solid game either at the back or in midfield. Played 27 League games last season.

TODAY'S OPPONENTS

★Wing-half **JIM BROWN**. 5ft 9in, 10st 7lbs. Skilled midfielder signed from local football 10 years ago. Former Scottish Youth, Juvenile and Amateur cap. Attack-minded player with a fine passing touch. Played in 18 League games last season.

★Defender **ALAN ANDERSON**. 6ft 1in, 12st. Cost only £5,000 from Scunthorpe back in 1963 which makes him a real bargain buy for Hearts considering the hundreds of solid performances he has turned in for the club. Solid tackler and very powerful in the air. Owns a pub in Edinburgh.

★Defender **DON MURRAY**. 6ft 13st. Big, rugged Highlander who spent all his career in English football after going south as a schoolboy. Won Under-23 honours. Has great experience—in European football as well—and has been a strong influence since he was signed last season. So much so he is now the skipper.

★Winger **KENNY AIRD**. 5ft 5in, 10st. Tricky little winger who started his career with Celtic, moved on to St. Mirren then St. Johnstone and finally Hearts three years ago. A maker rather than a taker of goals. Only played in 12 League games last season.

★Striker **DREW BUSBY**. 5ft 8in, 12st. Cost a club record fee of £50,000 from Airdrie three years ago. Very powerful player in the air and on the ground. Can play in a deeper midfield role as well, turning in 90 minutes of strong work. Scored 15 goals last season—the same as the term before.

★Striker **WILLIE GIBSON**. 5ft 8in, 10st. Signed from Fife juvenile football in 1970 and has been a first-team man for the past couple of seasons. Super-enthusiast who chases every chance to the limit. Scored nine goals in 28 League appearances last term.

★Midfield man **RALPH CALLACHAN**. 5ft 8in, 10st. A youngster who came up through the ranks—signing from Tynecastle Boys Club in 1970. Is developing into one of the best young midfield men in the country, a player with a fine constructive touch. Played in 27 League games last season.

★Winger **RAB PRENTICE**. 5ft 10in, 11st. Strong, fast and very clever winger with a grand left foot. Ex-Celtic player who left Parkhead a couple of years ago at his own request. Temperamental—but when he is on form he is one of the best in the country and has won Under-23 recognition for this. Crosses the ball beautifully on the run.

Others who could come into the reckoning are winger or midfielder man Donald Park, an ex-Highland League player, former Celt Steve Hancock and ex-Ranger George Donaldson.

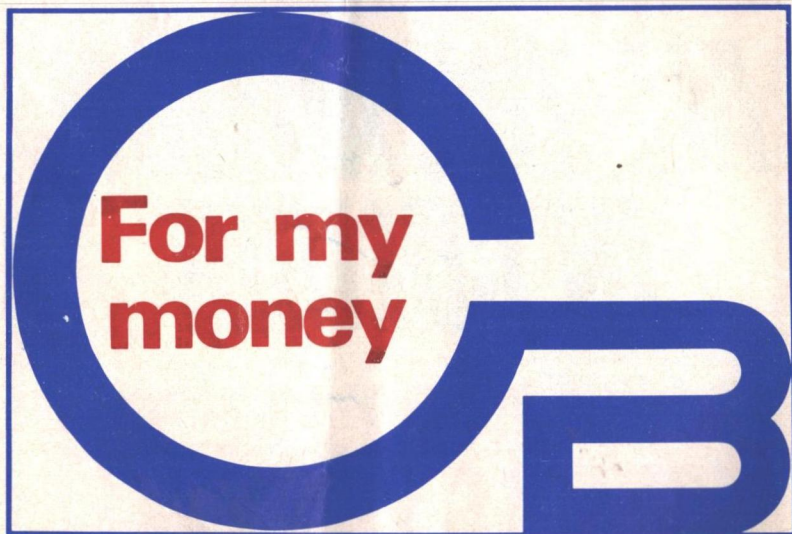

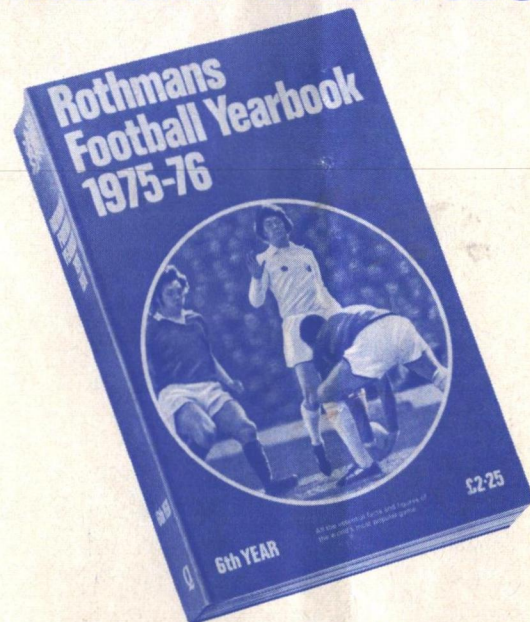

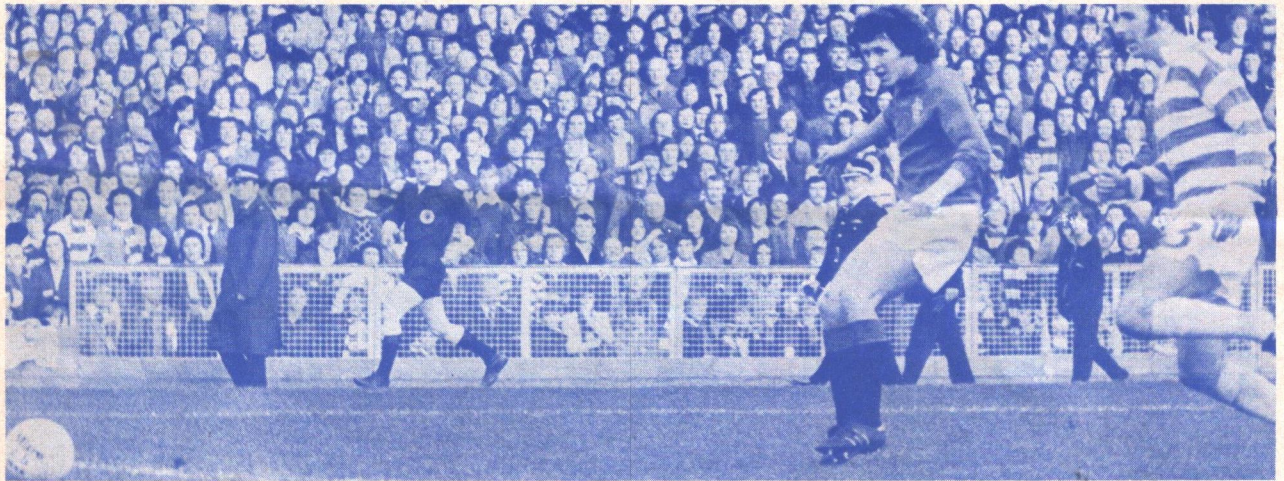

DUNDEE United come to Ibrox on Wednesday night for the League fixture which was postponed on October 25 because of the League Cup Final.

United, one of the most promising young sides in the country, made a poorish start to their Premier League campaign and then sold their star striker Andy Gray into English football.

However, the extent of their ambition under manager Jim McLean was shown by the determined way

they persisted with their efforts to sign Dumbarton striker Tom McAdam as a replacement for Gray.

That persistence paid off last week when only a couple of days after signing for United, young McAdam potted two goals in a 3-1 win over St. Johnstone at Perth.

This extra goal thrust should help ensure that Wednesday night's game is another cracker in the ex-

citing Premier League battle which is developing more and more interest with every week.

Just look at that table—only two points covering the first five teams with two other sides just one more point away.

That surely was the object of the exercise—to ensure a wide challenge for the title. It seems to be working out well at the moment and there looks like being a lot more excitement to come for the Scottish fans over the winter.

DEREK GETS BACK IN GOAL GROOVE

NOW that he has broken his "duck" in the Premier League with that goal against Celtic last week at Parkhead, Rangers centre Derek Parlane is hoping his scoring luck will take a turn for the better.

For the past couple of months Derek has been playing away well in his striking role, but with his scoring touch deserting him.

"At one time I would have worried about this," says the 22-year-old international player. "But experience has taught me just to play away and forget it.

"It has happened before, the goals simply won't come ... then suddenly they are on tap again.

"I'm hoping that the goal against Celtic will open up the way again ... I was beginning to get fed up with hitting woodwork or having shots just slip inches wide, both of which happened again at Parkhead."

Derek had a similar blank spell last season, ending his run finally in spectacular style with a five-goal performance against Dunfermline.

"But I reckon last Saturday's one goal against Celtic was as important as the five against Dunfermline. Certainly I enjoyed it as much as getting that nap-hand," he says.

Now he's off looking for more—remembering that a couple of seasons ago he banged in four against Hearts at Tynecastle.

No doubt he'd like a repeat of that today—but would settle for a couple if need be!

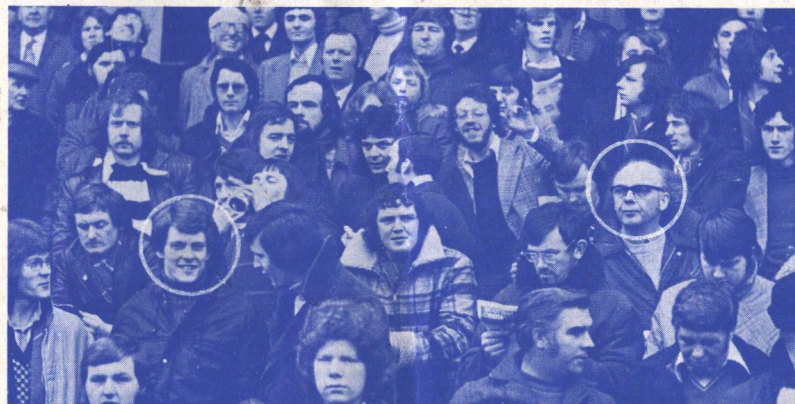

'Gers aim

PREMIER League football comes back to Ibrox today after an absence of five weeks—and a lot has happened in the time since Rangers got through to a 1-0 win against Aberdeen on October 4.

The gap was caused by a combination of away fixtures running together and the postponement of the Dundee United game due on October 25 because of the League Cup Final.

During the spell away from Ibrox, Rangers had a loss of form which brought defeats from Ayr United and Motherwell in the League and St. Etienne in the European Cup. But balancing that has been the League Cup Final triumph over Celtic, and the draw with the other half of the Old Firm in the League at Parkhead last Saturday.

Manager Jock Wallace firmly believes that the performance against Celtic at Parkhead in what was a highly exciting, entertaining match, was the best by his men for a number of weeks.

"We were going through a poor patch—but I think we came through it at Parkhead," says Jock. "We are over the hump—now I'm looking for much better form."

The 1-1 draw means that Rangers have taken three points out of four from the two

meetings with Celtic in the league so far this season, and the Ibrox men are hopeful of repeating that performance in the two other encounters still to come in the new Premier set-up.

And, of course, the 1-0 League Cup Final win at Hampden was a great boost to everyone at Ibrox. It means that of the six trophies available in Scotland at First and Reserve team level, four are currently with Rangers ... the League championships and League Cups at both levels.

Four out of six is good "scoring" in any sphere of sport. And there is every chance that the performance can not only be equalled this season ... but bettered.

For both the First and Second teams are well placed in the championship chase and the Colts are virtually certain to make it through to the Reserve League Cup Final, since they hold a 3-0 win in the first leg of the semi-final against Dundee United with the return still to come at Ibrox.

BEST WISHES TO BIG D.J.

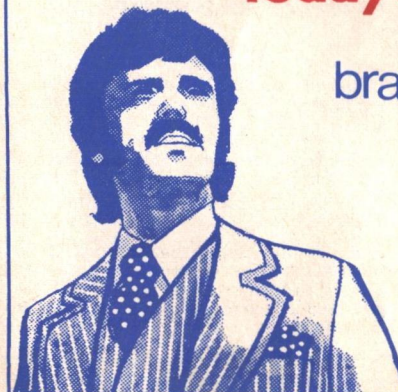
IT was Derek Johnstone's birthday this week—he was 22 on Tuesday, the night before the St. Etienne match.

Hunter foils Colts' terrific fightback...

"THE team played as well as it has done all year—but we finished up beaten." That's the verdict from a disappointed Joe Mason after Rangers Reserves 4-3 defeat by Celtic at Ibrox last weekend.

The Ibrox second team coach, while happy with the way the team played, is naturally sad about losing the points and not too pleased about losing four goals in a home match.

"You can't expect to win if you do that," he says.

MAGNIFICENT FIGHT-BACK

Yet, at one stage it looked as though the Colts were going to cap a magnificent fight-back by actually winning the game.

They were trailing 3-0 at one point, but battled back to draw level and were pounding for a winner when Celtic snatched the vital goal instead inside the last 10 minutes.

"It was a bit of a blow losing like that after putting in such a great effort," says Joe. "But I repeat—you can't expect victory if you lose four goals in a home match."

The game was a thrill-a-minute affair, full of action for the fans.

Celtic went ahead early in the match through Andy Ritchie, then after Rangers had a Graham Fyfe goal disallowed Celtic hit the Light Blues with a quick 1-2 from Bobby Lennox and Ronnie Glavin.

It was at this point that the Ibrox boys needed all the traditional fighting spirit of Rangers—and they produced it.

VITAL GOAL

Big Ally Scott got a vital goal just before the interval, and that sparked off the great revival.

"Some of the football the team produced after the interval was as good as I've seen from them," says coach Mason. "They really turned it on."

Big Martin Henderson got goal No. 2 when he was on the spot to net after Alex O'Hara had pounced on a bad pass-back and fired in a shot which Ally Hunter could only block.

Then Martin pulled the game level with another close-in effort after an Ally Scott cross-shot was pushed out.

Rangers really pounded Celtic for a while after this and had goalkeeper Ally Hunter pulling off some fine saves. But then, as so often happens, the defending team mounts a breakaway raid which produces a goal.

This time a shot from Ritchie hit a post and came out for Celtic new boy MacLean to net what turned out to be the winner although it took a great double save from Hunter near the end to deny Rangers yet another equaliser.

He brilliantly parried a lob from substitute Eric Morris—brought on for Gordon Boyd—and recovered to scoop the ball away a second time as Morris seemed set to net from the rebound.

PLAY IT SAFE

RANGERS FOOTBALL CLUB ask all fans to co-operate and make sure that everyone leaves the ground with the maximum of comfort and safety by following this procedure at the end of the game:

1. Take your time leaving the Stadium.
2. If you see that passages or stairways are becoming jammed—hold back. You will only be delayed for a few moments.
3. Help any youngster, old person—anyone in fact—if you think they are having difficulty.
4. Be particularly careful on the exit stairs, and avoid jostling as much as possible.
5. Abide by Stewards' and Police instructions.
