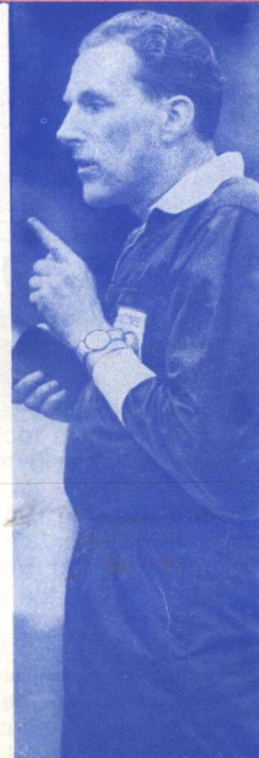

THE MEN WE

'GERS HOPE FOR A CUP REPEAT!

TONIGHT'S tie is the fourth time Rangers and Aberdeen have met in Scottish Cup replays — and if the result goes the way of the previous three games then Rangers will be happy.

Back in 1952-53 the sides drew 1-1 in the Final at Hampden . . . and Rangers took the trophy with a 1-0 win in the replay.

In the third round in 1961-62, the sides battled to a 1-1 draw at Pittodrie . . . and Rangers cruised home 5-1 in the return match at Ibrox.

Then in the 1965-66 semi-final at Hampden, Rangers got through 2-1 after a goal-less draw in the first match at Hampden.

So the statistics are with Rangers. But the Ibrox men know only too well that the fighting qualities of Aberdeen can make a mockery of facts and figures.

Particularly since the Pittodrie men, in recent years, have a fine record at Ibrox—much better than on their own ground.

Indeed, in their last 16 League visits to Ibrox DONS

HAVE LOST ONLY FOUR TIMES. They have won six and drawn six of the games, so the evidence is clear—it's going to be tough.

It's also certain to be exciting, for Rangers-Aberdeen games seldom provide anything but thrills.

Dons are bossed by the likeable Jimmy Bonthron, a Fifer who served a long football career with Partick Thistle, East Fife, Dundee, Stirling Albion and Queen of the South before taking on the job as manager of his former club East Fife.

Just before the start of season 1969-70 he joined Eddie Turnbull at Pittodrie as coach and played a big part in the winning of the Scottish Cup at the end of his first term at Aberdeen.

In July 1971 he took over as Dons manager when Eddie Turnbull moved to Hibs—and within a month had won the inaugural Drybrough Cup by beating Celtic 2-1 in the Final.

A respected coach, Jimmy worked with the Scottish international side for a spell under Bobby Brown. He is slowly rebuilding the Aberdeen side, mainly by developing youngsters on the staff.

And in this job he has an able assistant in coach George

Murray, a former skilful Motherwell and Aberdeen midfielder who is a former Under-23 cap. He played in the 1970 Scottish Cup winning side and became coach in December 1971.

Under his guidance Dons have developed a fine young reserve side, always challenging for reserve honours and currently battling it out with the Rangers Colts in the championship.

The quality of players at Aberdeen is reflected in the fact that they have in their pool nine players who have won international recognition at various levels from full to youth.

The Dons "caps" are:

★ **BOBBY CLARK.** Goalkeeper. 6ft, 12st 11lb. Born Glasgow. Signed from Queen's Park in 1965. Bobby has gained more full caps for Scotland than any other player in the Club's 70 year history. He kept goal for Scotland in Brazil's mini-World Cup tournament in 1972 and his appearance against England at Hampden in February, 1973 in the Scottish Football Association Centenary match was his 17th full honour. He has also been capped at youth, amateur Under-23 and Scottish League level. Four seasons ago he played 13 successive matches for Aberdeen without a goal being scored against him. Clark's number of appearances for Aberdeen is now over the 400 mark. Stoke City were on the point of paying £100,000 for his transfer in 1972 which would have been a British record fee for a goalkeeper. A qualified coach and physical education teacher, Bobby is also an expert basketball player. He has missed only four games this season.

★ **EDDIE THOMSON.** Defender/midfield. 5ft 11½in, 12st. Gained three Under-23 caps and a Scottish League honour while with Hearts whom he skippered until his £60,000 transfer to Aberdeen in March, 1973. Powerful tackler and strong in the air. Had a spell in attack early in the season, but now back at right-half.

★ **DREW JARVIE.** Striker. 5ft 9½in, 11st 3lbs. A junior international, Drew made his mark with Airdrie as a maker and taker of chances. Shot into Scotland international prominence three seasons ago and played for the Scottish League, the Scotland Under-23 team and made three substitute appearances for Scotland. Aberdeen paid club record fee of £70,000 during close-season in 1972 and he was the team's leading scorer in 1972-73 with 30 goals. Again the Dons' top shot in 1973-74. Missed five games this season, but came on as substitute each time. Scored nine goals so far.

★ **WILLIE YOUNG.** Centre half. 6ft 3½in, 13st 11lbs. A native of Edinburgh, Willie has made giant strides in the past couple of seasons to become one of the leading pivots in the country. He has gathered several Scotland Under-23 caps and has trained with the full Scotland squad. Scores regularly when coming upfield for corner kicks. Netted five so far this term.

★ **JIM HERMISTON.** Right or Left Back. 5ft 10in, 11st 8lbs. Edinburgh born Jim was signed by Aberdeen in 1965 and played for the Scotland Under-23 team in 1971. Likes to come through in support of attack. Lost his first-team place this term and is currently for sale.

★ **ARTHUR GRAHAM.** Midfield/winger. 5ft 7½in, 10st 8lbs. Arthur was playing in minor football at the start of the 1969-70 season, at the end of which he was a member of the Aberdeen Scottish Cup winning team. A youth international, Arthur played for the Scottish League team in 1971-72. Hasn't missed a game this term, and has worn every forward jersey except outside right. Netted six goals.

★ **WILLIE MILLER.** Sweeper/midfield. 5ft 10in, 11st 9lbs. Signed from Glasgow minor football in 1971 as a free-scoring striker, Willie was converted into a defender in the Aberdeen Reserve team and gained his first-team spurs in the 1973/74 season as a sweeper with attacking ideas. A former Scotland youth cap, Willie, who is 19 in May, gained Scotland Under-23 honours and

was a member of the Scottish League squad in the early months of 1974. Ever present this term.

★ **JIM HENRY.** Midfield. 5ft 11in, 11st 2lbs. A skilful ball-player who played for the Scottish League and the National Under-23 XI while with Dundee United. Joined Aberdeen in £25,000 deal in January, 1974. Took a while to settle, but recently fought his way into the team in the No. 8 berth and looks like staying this time.

★ **IAN PURDIE.** Forward. 5ft 9in, 10st 7lbs. Originally a winger when signed from Larkhall Thistle in 1970. But this season has developed into a skilful midfielder man whose improvement brought him on as substitute in the recent Under-23 international against England at Pittodrie. Only missed one game, and has netted eight goals so far this term.

★ **JOE SMITH.** Midfield. 5ft 11½in, 11st 1lb. Joe's brother Jimmy was a skilful inside forward with Aberdeen before being sold to Newcastle for £80,000 four years ago. Joe, 21 in November, is developing along the same lines although he looks to be a more versatile player. Gained place in first-team squad in second half of 1972-73 season. Played 21 games this season at right half.

★ **BILLY WILLIAMSON.** Full back. 5ft 11in, 10st 11lbs. A free-scoring forward before he was signed in 1969, Billy had a spell in first team at right back.

★ **DUNCAN DAVIDSON.** Midfield/striker. 5ft 7½in, 10st 12lbs. Elgin born reserve can play midfield or striker. Been on as substitute in Aberdeen's last 5 League games.

★ **IAN HAIR.** 5ft 10in, 11st 7½lbs. A Glasgow junior who has been converted from an attacker into a defender by Aberdeen. Brought into the first team at right back in the 1973-74 season and was a regular until laid low by illness in November. Took a long time to recover, but is now back at his best.

★ **CHIC McLELLAND.** Full Back. 5ft 9in, 9st 12lbs. Chic gained Scotland youth honours during long apprenticeship in reserves as understudy to Jim Hermiston. Finally got first-team chance at left back in 1974 and has never looked back. Ever present this term.

★ **BILLY PIRIE.** 5ft 9½in, 11st. A 24 year old Aberdonian who was signed for £40,000 from Arbroath in March, 1974. A product of Aberdeen junior football, sharpshooter Pirie had a spell in South Africa and on his return joined Highland League Club Huntly. Three months later he was snapped up by Arbroath and his goal scoring exploits played a big part in the Gayfield team establishing themselves in the Scottish First Division. Took a time to settle, but now finding scoring form—having hit 5 so far this season.

★ **WALKER McCALL.** Striker. 6ft 3in, 11st 8lb. Joined Aberdeen from Ayrshire Junior Football Club for the start of the 1973-74 season and has shaped up very well in the Reserve team. Probably the best header of a ball on the Pittodrie staff. Netted five times this term.

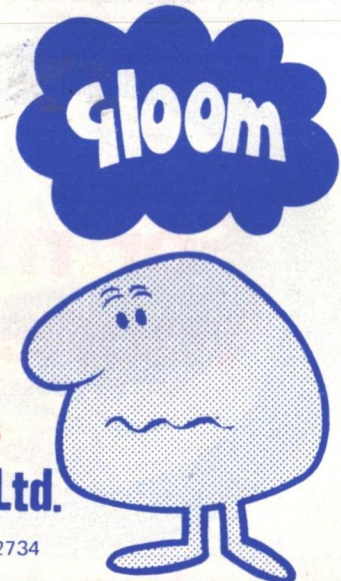

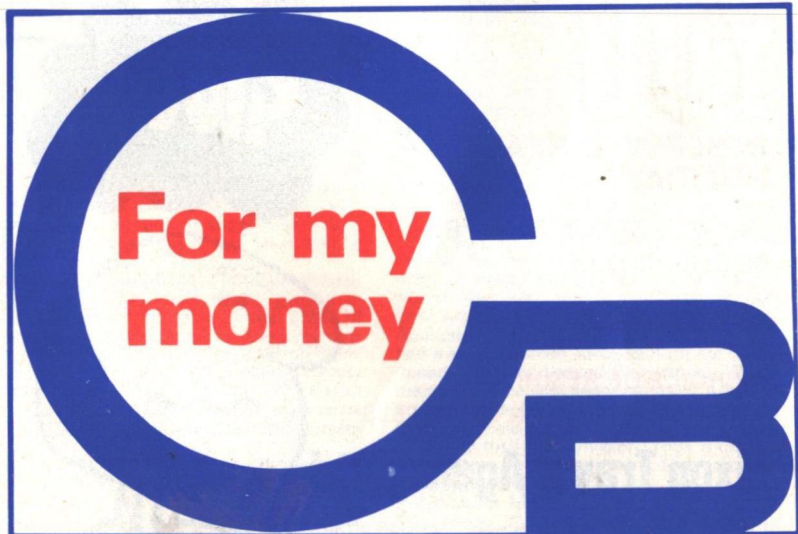

WEE Tommy McLean was the match-winner when Rangers visited Pittodrie in the League in December.

Two minutes from time the wee man pounced on a beautiful Derek Parlane cut-back to slam the ball home to give Rangers a 2-1 win in a tremendous match.

Rangers, with Derek Johnstone back in midfield after injury, commanded the first-half and big Derek was the driving force. He whipped a shot just wide, brought a great save from Bobby Clark soon after and was always a menace to Dons.

And after Clark had stopped a scoring Alex MacDonald shot with his feet, it was Johnstone who got the opener, chesting down a McLean cross and wheeling to crack the ball home.

After the break it was Dons' turn to take over, and Stewart Kennedy got plenty of opportunity to confirm that he is among the best keepers in the land right now. He defied Dons until the 75th minute when Ian Hair, who had moved into midfield, volleyed the ball into the net after Willie Young had headed on a corner kick.

It was touch and go from then on—till Derek Parlane's persistence and Tommy McLean's cool head produced the winner.

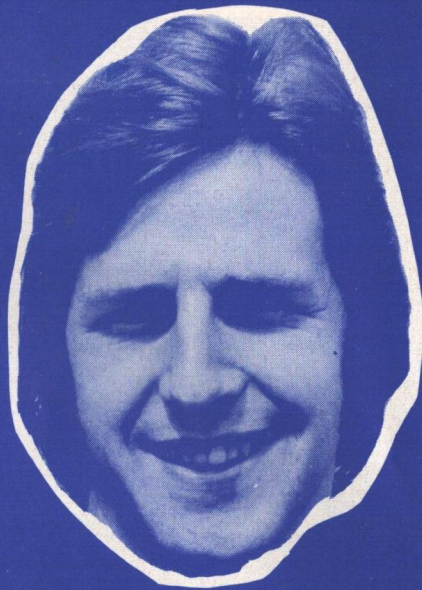


● TOMMY McLEAN . . . he'll be out to cause havoc to Aberdeen once again.

IT TOOK Ian McDougall nearly five years to make through to the Rangers first team—and he's only 20 right now! The young midfielder player has been linked with Rangers since he was 14, and is quite delighted at the pace of his progress.

"I'm quite happy with the way things are going," says Ian. "Particularly at the moment. I'm really enjoying my football. Maybe the heavy going suits me more than others, certainly the mud doesn't bother me. I feel I'm getting stronger every game and improving all the time".

Ian came to Rangers as a striker, and indeed banged in 30 goals in his one season as a Junior with Pollok.

"So far I've only got two—one against Celtic and the other against Partick Thistle. But my main job is

to win the ball in midfield and feed the front men, so I concentrate on that. Any goals which come are a bonus, but I'm always looking for more".

Ian regards his year in the Junior grade as great experience—"It certainly taught me how to look after myself. I was only 17 and playing against men a lot older. It was a hard school, but worthwhile in the end".

Ian, born and bred in New Stevenston, Lanarkshire is due to be married later this year and has brought the wedding date forward just in case he is in the Rangers tour party which will head for Australia in June.

"I just hope I'm still in the first team pool by then" he says.

If he continues to show his current form, and keep on improving at his present rate, there seems no danger in him missing out.

THOSE DRAMATIC GAMES

OVER the years, Rangers and Dons have met 14 times in the Scottish Cup (including three replays) and the ties have produced some dramatic matches.

Rangers' best performance was in the 1968-69 semi-final which was played at Parkhead. Dons were right in form at the time, and not even the most avid Ibrox fan anticipated the kind of result Rangers achieved . . . a stunning 6-1 victory.

Goals by Andy Penman and Willie Henderson, with a reply from ex-Ranger Jim Forrest, gave Rangers a 2-1 interval lead.

But within six minutes of the restart Willie Johnston and Andy Penman had banged goals past Ernie McGarr. Then Johnston went on to get a hat-trick.

The teams were:

Aberdeen: McGarr; Whyte, Shewan; Petersen, Boel, Buchan; Johnston, Smith, Forrest, Robb, Craig.

Rangers: Martin; Johansen, Mathieson; Greig, McKinnon, Smith; Henderson, Penman, Stein, Johnston, Persson.

Only John Greig and Willie Mathieson remain at Ibrox while Davie Robb, currently out of football because of injury, is the sole remaining Don. What a difference in five years.

Aberdeen can, of course, also trot out a six-hit Scottish Cup win . . . their 6-0 victory in the 1953-54 semi-final, a result which stunned Rangers supporters. It came in the last year of Bill Struth's amazing career as manager at Ibrox.

IBROX COLTS GET IT HOT!

"I couldn't have asked for any more effort on the field and co-operation off the field". That's reserve team coach Joe Mason speaking about the performance of the Rangers side in the Viareggio Youth tournament in Italy last week.

The Colts failed to make it through to the quarter-finals of the tourney — but what a go they made of winning the last and vital game against Hungarian cracks Ujpest Dozsa.

It was a game they had to win to qualify after drawing 1-1 with A.C. Milan and losing 1-0 to Napoli in the first two section games.

They failed — going down 1-0 to the Hungarians. But coach Mason's verdict on that result: "A travesty".

"Honestly, we should have won by four or five goals. That would have taken us through. Instead we lost by that one goal. . . . I just couldn't believe it" says Joe.

"We had more than enough chances to win through — but luck was against us".

So much so that the Reserves even missed a penalty — Isaac Farrell's spot kick coming thumping

back off a post. This happened midway through the second half after Ujpest had unexpectedly taken the lead.

"And apart from that miss, we hit the woodwork on two other occasions including a brilliant header from Brian Smith" says coach

Mason. "There was also one time when Billy Steele was through but delayed and the 'keeper saved.

"It was a wonderful effort from the boys. They played great stuff — better I think than last year in the same tournament when we won two matches."

The average age of the other teams competing was around the 22 mark, whereas Rangers had mainly 18-19 year olds and about half of the pool were abroad for the first time with the club.

"So overall, it was very heartening. They will have gained valuable experience" says Joe.

The Ibrox coach was delighted with the form shown by the more experienced members of the side — goalkeeper Donald Hunter, defender Isaac Farrell, midfielder man Alex O'Hara and forward Billy Steele.

"The bit of experience they have had in the second team showed through" says coach Mason.

The team that played against Ujpest was: Hunter; Evans, Loose; O'Hara, Smith, I. Farrell; Robertson, McNichol, Henderson, Armour, Steele.
