## 'Gers must stop the Hearts hat trick

**Hearts come to Ibrox today as the perfect proof of the old theory that anything can happen in football.**

Just a few short months ago the Tynecastle side were hovering around bottom and second bottom place in the table. Naturally the morale was suffering, for it was an unusual experience for one of Scotland's most distinguished clubs.

But now under the guidance of new manager John Hagart, a youthful and enthusiastic character, Hearts have revived to such an extent that their fans are saying regretfully that if the team hadn't got away to such a poor start they would be title challengers!

Certainly the Tynecastle side have shot up the table at an impressive rate until they now lie in joint fifth place on 27 points alongside Aberdeen and Dundee.

They have lost only once in their past 19 matches, and that

1-1 draw against Airdrie last week has stretched their run of unbeaten games to 15.

So the scene is set for a great game this afternoon. Hearts aim to keep that record intact—while for Rangers this is another one which is vitally important in the title run-in. But, then, all the matches are important for the Light Blues now so the attitude today will be just the same—all out for victory.

And it won't be any harder a game than some of the others which Rangers have faced in the past few months, there will be no such thing as an easy match between now and the end of April.

However, there can be no doubt that there is always a little extra spice in a Rangers-Hearts match. Over the years the two clubs have featured in some memorable games.

Today's game is the 156 League meeting since the clubs first clashed back in 1890-91 when the Scottish League was formed.

And only Celtic have a better record against the Light Blues than Hearts.

The Edinburgh side have won 38 of the previous meetings and drawn 30 with Rangers

winning 87. In the process, the Light Blues have scored 242 goals and conceded 192.

Indeed, Hearts have been successful in their last two League visits to Ibrox—winning convincingly 3-0 last year and 1-0 the year before. So there is plenty of evidence available about how dangerous this game is for Rangers.

Hearts hold the distinction, along with the Old Firm, of having held First Division status throughout the history of the League.

The Tynecastle club's honour roll is distinguished:

League champions in 1894-95, 1896-97, 1957-58 and 1959-60.

Scottish Cup winners in 1891, 1896, 1901, 1906, 1956.

League Cup winners in 1954-55, 1959-60, 1962-63.

In the process of winning the 1957-58 championship, Hearts scored a staggering 132 goals—a record for the First Division and one that seems likely to remain for a long time.

At the moment the Edinburgh side are still in the Cup, and their fans feel that this could be win No. 6 coming up.

But first of all, the Hearts aim is to bring off their third Ibrox League victory in a row—something they have never achieved before. Here is their player pool:

★ Goalkeeper **JIM CRUICKSHANK**. 5ft 10in, 11st 10lbs. Playing as well as ever in his long, distinguished career with the Edinburgh club. He is their longest-serving player, having joined as

an amateur internationalist from Queen's Park in 1960. Lost his place in the first team for a couple of seasons to Kenny Garland but came back again this season and has played in 20 games. Won five full and three League caps.

★ Full back **ROY KAY**. 5ft 10in, 10st 8lbs. Signed from local football in 1968 and has come on gradually to be an accepted first-team regular in the past few seasons. Has played 28 times this season. Likes to go into attack whenever he can.

★ Full back **DAVE CLUNIE**. 5ft 10½in, 11st. Has been 11 years at Tynecastle since signing from local youth football, and has been a great club man. Formerly a schoolboy international outside left before being converted into a defender.

★ Wing-half **JIM JEFFERIES**. 6ft 1in, 11st 3lbs. Big, powerful fellow who can turn out at the back or in midfield. Played in 33 matches so far this term out of a possible 37—proof enough of his consistency.

★ Wing-half **GEORGE DONALDSON**. 5ft 9in, 10st 6lbs. George started his career as a schoolboy with Rangers, and when he was released last year he was snapped up by his home-city club Hearts. Has proved to be a valuable addition to the pool, being able to turn out in a number of positions.

★ Centre half **ALAN ANDERSON**. 6ft 1in, 12st. Cost about £5,000 from Scunthorpe back in 1963 and at that price is one of the Edinburgh club's greatest bargains. Solid, powerful defender who uses his height in the air to great effect. Owns a pub in Edinburgh. Likes to come up for corners and free kicks and has snatched quite a few valuable goals over the years.

★ Defender **DON MURRAY**. 6ft, 13st. Big, rugged defender who was bought from Cardiff City a couple of months ago and has strengthened the Hearts defence considerably. A Highlander, he went south as a boy and won Under-23 recognition with the Welsh club. Former Cardiff skipper, he has great European experience as well and brings all this to use in a match.

Midfield man **JIM BROWN**. 5ft 9in, 10st. Skilful, hard-working player who was signed from local youth football in 1965. A former Scottish Youth, Amateur and Juvenile cap. Now the club skipper.

★ Midfield man **TOMMY MURRAY**. 5ft 5in, 10st 4lbs. Ex-Airdrie and Carlisle schemer who was signed four years ago. May be small, but he's hardy and uses his experience and ability to set up the play from midfield.

★ Winger **KENNY AIRD**. 5ft 5in, 10st. Bought from St. Johnstone two years ago, this little red-haired winger was originally with Celtic then St. Mirren and St. Johnstone, Small, but tricky he makes rather than takes goals.

★ Striker **DREW BUSBY**. 5ft 8in, 12st. Hearts paid a club record fee of £50,000 for the powerful Busby two years ago. Tremendously strong player who is great in the air although he is not big, and very forceful on the ground. Can also play in a deeper role. Scored 15 goals in the League, and League Cup last season and so far this season has 11.

★ Striker **WILLIE GIBSON**. 5ft 8in, 10st. Started to push through last year after joining from Fife juvenile football in 1970. Restless, hard-working leader he got the last-minute goal last week which earned his team a point against Airdrie at Broomfield. That gives him seven so far this term. Got 10 last season in a dozen games.

★ Striker **DONALD FORD**. 5ft 7½in, 10st 10lbs. Not big or heavy, but hard to beat in the air and on the ground. Very, very fast over the first 10 yards and can score goals with either foot. He has won international honour and, was in Scotland's World Cup squad last year. Versatile type—he's an accountant, company director, fine cricketer and ex-local councillor.

★ Winger **RALPH CALLAGHAN**. 5ft 8in, 10st. A highly promising youngster who has been with Hearts for four years now, signing from Tynecastle Boys club. Made 26 appearances this term.

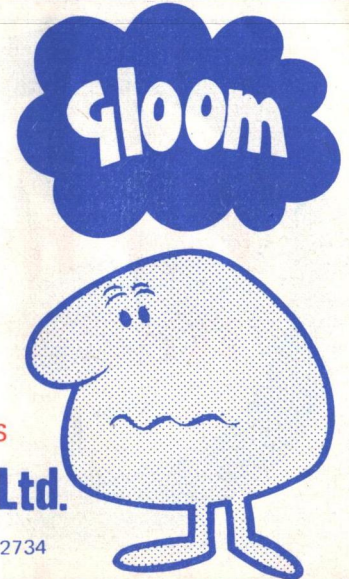

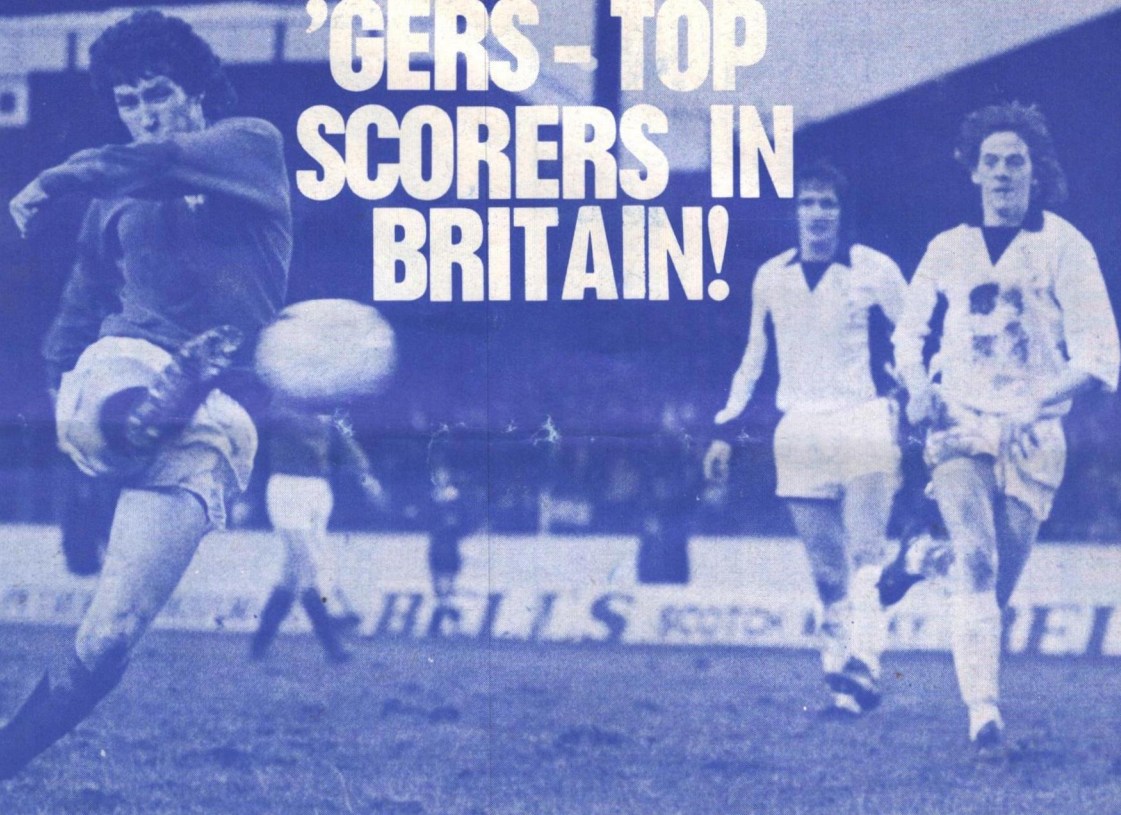

# 'GERS - TOP SCORERS IN BRITAIN!

**TOP scorers in Britain**—that's the exciting title Rangers can claim at the moment as they lead the chase for the Scottish League championship.

The Light Blues have rammed in 70 goals in their 25 matches—which puts them out in front of the other high-scoring teams up and down the country.

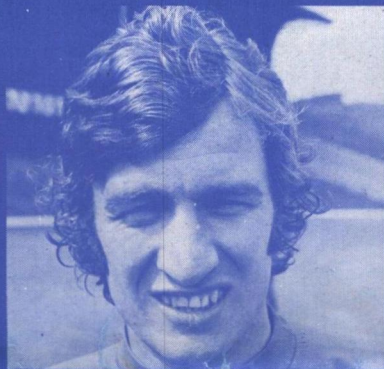
Indeed, the nearest are Celtic who have netted 66.

This is three more than Mansfield Town, who are chasing promotion from the English Fourth Division but despite having played 30 games—five more than Rangers—table-topping Town have netted seven goals less.

Leading scorers in the Scottish Second Division are Falkirk and St. Mirren on 56, while in the rest of the English Leagues the scoring-rate is even lower.

Rangers have scored 18 more goals than the top English First Division marksmen, Burnley;

□ The Light Blues have banged in

20 more than Second Division hot-shots Sunderland and 15 more than Third Division pair Charlton and Plymouth.

If it's goals the fans want, then Rangers are the team providing them. Even when the form has shaded off slightly, as in the past three League games, Rangers still provide the goals.

Two against Dunfermline, three against Kilmarnock and two more against Clyde... all in games where the Light Blues

really failed to find their best form.

The result was five points out of six in matches which in the past might have been lost. But not this season. Rangers have found the touch of consistency, which allied to determination, can carry a team through a sticky spell.

Topping the Ibrox scoring charts is the familiar figure of Derek Parlane, leading marksman at Ibrox for the past two seasons. Derek is on 22 now, four ahead of Sandy Jardine and with the others falling out of the race.

So it looks as though the No. 1 hot-shot title is heading Derek's way again.

However, a happy young man at Shawfield last week was Alex O'Hara—whose 42nd minute header not only turned out to be the winner in a tight, match—but was his first goal of the season for the top team.

Bobby McKean took his tally to five with the opening goal, his second in three appearances since his recall to first-team action.

Midfield man Johnny Hamilton has waited patiently for a long run in the Rangers first team since he was signed after being freed by Hibs a couple of seasons ago.

Says Johnny, who has played in the last two matches: "I was injured in my very first kick of the ball against Kilmarnock a couple of weeks ago, and although I managed to last out the game I had to fight to be fit for the game against Clyde.

"Then at Shawfield I took another knock on the same ankle and was off after only 32 minutes. It's very disappointing. I'd like to be in

the first team in these closing matches in the championship race".

Johnny, Glasgow born and a lifelong Rangers fan, started his career with Possil Y.M. then signed for Cumbernauld Juniors. Hibs saw him in his first game for the junior club—and promptly signed him.

"I only played two games for Cumbernauld before stepping up" says Johnny.

During his six years at Easter Road he won a Dry-brough Cup medal and League Cup badge.

"Now I'm hoping to add a League Championship medal as well" he says.

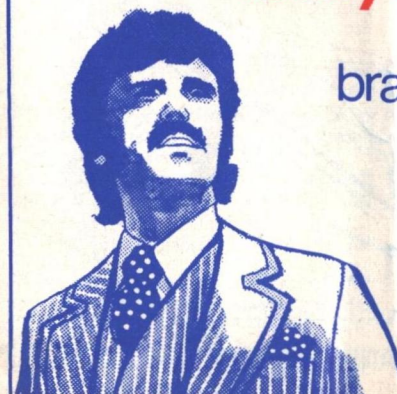

# COLTS KEEP JOE HAPPY!

**ONE great performance and one not-so-hot display kept Rangers' Reserves trophy hopes going strongly.**

The good showing came in the quarter-final of the Second Eleven Cup when the Ibrox boys whipped Motherwell 5-0 to qualify for the semis in great style.

It was a performance which delighted coach Joe Mason.

However, a few days later Joe wasn't so happy. For although the Colts won 3-1 against Clyde at the Albion in a League match, it was a disappointing display.

"Particularly in view of the showing against Motherwell a few days previously" says Joe.

"Although we were 2-0 up at half-time and got a third after the break, I wasn't at all pleased with the way the defence played."

Evidence of this is given by the fact that when Rangers were 2-0 up coach Mason took off two back four men—Ian Loose and Isaac Farrell—put on sub-

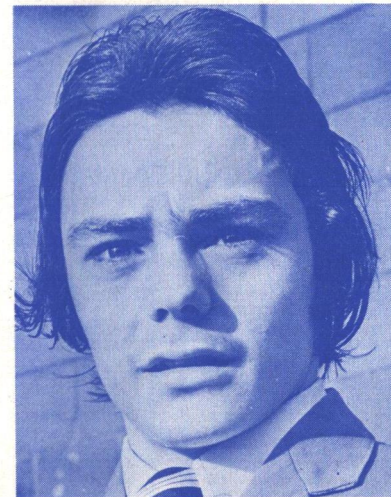
