The draw worked out right for us...



IF Rangers have done their job properly, then a win tonight should put them safely into the quarter-finals of the League Cup.

That's the opinion of manager Jock Wallace, speaking before the meeting with Motherwell at Ibrox on Saturday.

"The way the draw worked was favourable to us," says the Ibrox boss.

"Two home games in a row in the middle of the section ties has given us a chance to settle the section quickly. Having won our first two games, what could be better than two Ibrox matches in which to consolidate and confirm our position?"

The Ibrox chief was not quite so happy with the team's performance in the close-fought 1-0 victory over Clyde at Shawfield, but pleased nonetheless with the result and some individual showings.

"Clyde on that form will give

anyone a hard game at Shawfield," says Jock. "They fought hard all the way, contesting the game from start to finish.

"We didn't produce our best form as a team, but some of the players produced just what was needed at the right time.

"I'm thinking of Peter McCloy in goal, John Greig in defence, Alex MacDonald in midfield and big Derek Johnstone up front. They all turned in great individual games.

"Greigy is playing as well right now as he has done at any time in the past few years. His drive and enthusiasm are a lesson to the others and I particularly like the way he is lifting the others to follow his example.

"And big Derek began to show some of his old sharpness. He's such a big lad that it takes him a bit more time to work up to his peak, but against Clyde the signs were there that he is right on the button now.

"The win left us in the best possible position, we have no-one but ourselves to blame if we don't take advantage of that."

TODAY'S OPPONENTS

Back in the Top Ten—in time for their birthday!

CLYDE are just three years short of their Centenary celebrations, having been founded in 1878. And by the time that party starts the "Bully Wee" are hoping to be back in the Premier League.

Last season they finished in third bottom place in the table, good enough normally to avoid relegation (an experience the club has suffered no fewer than six times in the past half century) but unfortunately for the Shawfielders not good enough to earn a place in the top ten for this term.

However, under the determined Stan Anderson Clyde are building a young side which they hope will be in Premier shape in the next couple of years.

Five times Clyde have come back out of the Second Division as champions, but have never won the top League championship. Neither have they lifted the League Cup.

But they have had three Scottish Cup Final triumphs—in 1939, 1955 and 1958. They have also been beaten Finalists in 1910, 1912 and 1949.

Their first Final appearance in 1910 saw them play three games against Dundee, drawing 2-2, 0-0 then going down 2-1. Two years later they lost 2-0 to Celtic.

However, in 1939 in the last Cup Final before World War Two the Bully Wee overwhelmed Motherwell 4-0.

The only time they have met Rangers in a Scottish Cup Final was in 1949, and the Light Blues ran up a convincing 4-1 victory against a Shawfield side which finished in third bottom place in the table that season.

—that's Clyde's aim

Big George Young netted two penalties for Rangers in the victory.

But within the next few years Clyde were twice back at Hampden—and came out as winners.

In 1955 they beat Celtic 1-0 after a 1-1 draw and three years later defeated Hibs by the same score.

Nowadays, Clyde are a part-time outfit, with schoolteachers, electricians, joiners and chemists in the ranks.

But they still play hard, and to win. The club's record win was against Cowdenbeath in the Second Division in 1951 and their heaviest defeat was when Rangers beat them 11-0 in the Scottish Cup in the fourth round in 1880-81. The club's record individual goals total for one season was 32 by Willie Boyd in 1932-33.

Although Shawfield only holds 25,000 now, in the days before the dog-racing a record attendance of 52,000 watched a Clyde-Rangers League game on November 21, 1908.

THE MANAGER

Stan Anderson knows all about Rangers—and most of the players. For not only is he a former Ibrox player, he served two years as Rangers second team coach before moving on to manage Clyde. A strong, stocky character, Stan has learned the Ibrox habit of taking defeat hard. He doesn't like to lose, and it is a spirit he has instilled into his side, who demonstrated in the tie at Shawfield last Wednesday that they are prepared to run and fight for the full 90 minutes.

THE PLAYERS

★ Goalkeeper **PHIL CAIRNEY**. 5ft 9in, 11st 10lbs. Not tall, but very agile and tremendous at quick-reaction saves to close-in shots... as he showed in the match against Rangers at Shawfield last week. He's a teacher of P.E. Signed from juvenile football in 1970, but only played in 15 of Clyde's 43 matches last season.

★ Full back **EDDIE ANDERSON**. 5ft 9in, 11st 6lbs. Signed from Kirkintilloch in 1969, he's a stylish player who likes to set attack moves going when he can. Played in 28 games last season. Works as a Post Office electrician.

★ Full back **ALAN SWAN**. 5ft 9in, 10st 10lbs. Former Shettleston Juniors striker (signed in 1970) he has developed into a very skilful defender. But he can turn out in many positions—last season in 38 matches played he wore the numbers 6, 3, 5 and 10 jerseys. A Post Office engineer.

★ Full back **JOHN BURNS**. 5ft 9in, 11st. Another ex-Shettleston player. He's a chunky defender, strong-tackling and with a solid left foot. Played 28 times and made 8 substitute appearances last season.

★ Wing half **SAM MILLER**. 5ft 11in, 11st 3lbs. Big, hard-hitting player who can also turn out in midfield or attack. A University graduate he is now a teacher. Only missed two matches last term.

★ Centre half **JIM BOYD**. 5ft 10in, 10st 7lbs. Only joined Clyde last season after a spell in English football with Crystal Palace.

TODAY'S OPPONENTS

Former Youth cap, he is a very skilful player and looks one for the future at just 18. Works with a furniture firm. Made only four appearances last season but has now taken over from the transferred Willie McVie as first choice centre half.

★ Wing half **JIM BURNS**. 5ft 8in, 11st. The club's longest-serving player, having joined them from Cowdenbeath in 1968. Plays anywhere in the team and last season turned out in six different positions in his 30 appearances. Quiet kind of player who does his work without any fuss, but does it well. Lives and works as a joiner in Stirling.

★ Winger **DOMINIC SULLIVAN**. 5ft 11in, 10st 12lbs. Skilful, entertaining winger who has won Under-23 honours. Signed from junior club St. Roch's in 1969 and has attracted a lot of attention from bigger clubs in the past couple of seasons. Didn't miss a match last season but scored only four goals. He's a local government officer.

★ Forward **BOBBY FERRIS**. 5ft 9in, 10st 7lbs. Signed from a local Rutherglen side in 1973, this youngster was the club's joint top scorer last season with nine goals in 26 games (plus 11 substitute appearances).

★ Forward **STEVE ARCHIBALD**. 5ft 10in, 10st 9lbs. Another local boy from Rutherglen who has made the breakthrough this

season after a couple of first team matches last term. He's a mechanic.

★ Forward **PETER BOYLE**. 5ft 9in, 10st 7lbs. Worrying, unorthodox type of forward who likes to get in about the action. Signed from Larkhall Thistle a few years ago. Last season scored 9 goals, and the term before that 15. Works as an industrial chemist.

★ Forward **GERRY MARSHALL**. 5ft 9in, 10st 4lbs. Joined up from Dalry Thistle two years ago, he's a clever two-footed player who made 21 full and seven substitute appearances last season, scoring four goals. Works as a stock-taker.

★ Forward **JOE WARD**. 5ft 11in, 11st 2lbs. Signed from St. Roch's a couple of seasons ago he is a big aggressive attack leader. Made 31 appearances last season and scored five goals.

★ Midfield man **BRIAN AHERN**. 5ft 9in, 10st 10lbs. Signed from juvenile football five years ago and has been a solid player for Clyde in the past couple of seasons. Skilful, thoughtful type he missed only four matches. He's from Rutherglen, and works as a civil servant.

★ Forward **BOBBY HARVEY**. 5ft 9in, 10st 7lbs. Another Rutherglen man who has made it with his local side. Signed from juvenile football in 1973 and has made steady progress. He's a clerk by occupation. Last season played in 17 full first-team games as well as four substitute appearances and scored eight goals.

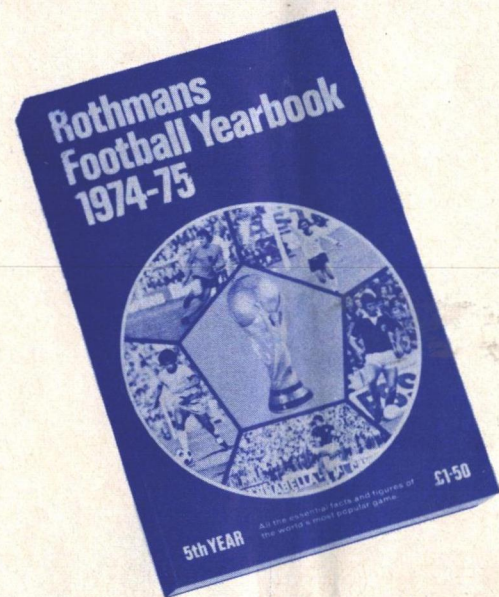

"But I feel we played well enough to deserve a few more goals. That we didn't score more is our own fault

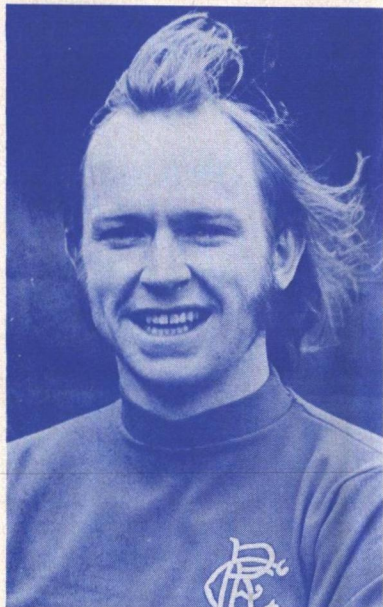
—and something we will be trying to put right starting tonight."

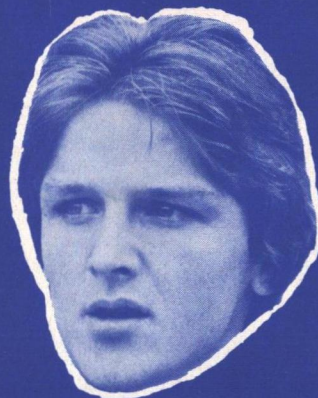

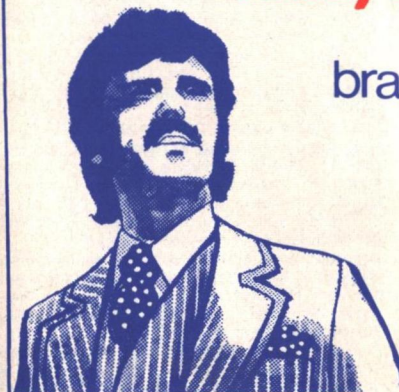

11 goals but coach Joe's not satisfied

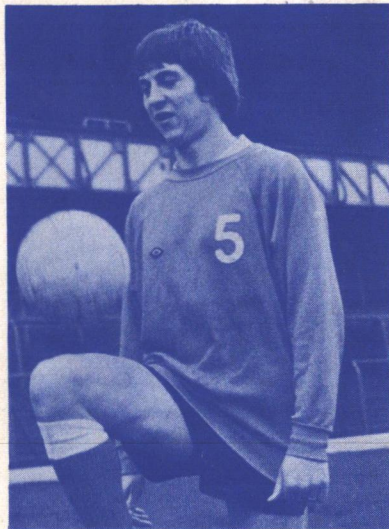
ELEVEN goals scored, only one conceded . . . but still not satisfied! That was Rangers Reserve team coach Joe Mason after only two games played in the Reserve League Cup.

The Ibrox Colts followed up their opening 7-1 victory against Airdrie with a 4-0 home win over Clyde at Ibrox, which left them in a strong position (although there was still last Saturday's away encounter with Motherwell Reserves to tackle).

But coach Mason is always looking for more. "We missed too many chances against Clyde," he says seriously. "In fact, I thought we had more opportunities than we had against Airdrie at Broomfield.

"Everyone was missing goals—the midfield men as well as the strikers. It's something I'd like to put right as soon as possible."

The Colts, having played at Fir Park on Saturday have an away meeting with Clyde at Shawfield tonight and this leaves them with two home matches to come to close the section.

But coach Mason is hoping that by that time the whole thing will be settled and the section tied up securely enough to let his boys relax and go for even more goals.

"Don't get me wrong, I'm pleased with them as it is," says Joe. "But that doesn't mean we should stand still. There are more targets to aim at now."

The team against Clyde was: Kennedy; Armour, Dawson; McDougall, Forsyth, Denny; G. Boyd, Scott, Henderson, Hamilton, Young. Substitutes—Morris for Boyd, Robertson for Henderson.

Big Ally Scott and Johnny Hamilton shared the score tally for the Light Blues.

It was Hammy who got the goals rolling with a first-half penalty after Scott had been downed. Then just a few minutes before half-time Ally dived to meet a cross from Cutty Young to head number two.

Two more goals from the same marksmen rounded off a good win for the Colts, but it could easily have been more.

"I was happy with the first half in particular," says coach Mason. "They played well and took the chances. But after the break they squandered quite a few.

"Stewart Kennedy had a very good comeback in goal, Tom Forsyth was very solid at centre half and Quinton Young, was good going down the left from a deep position."

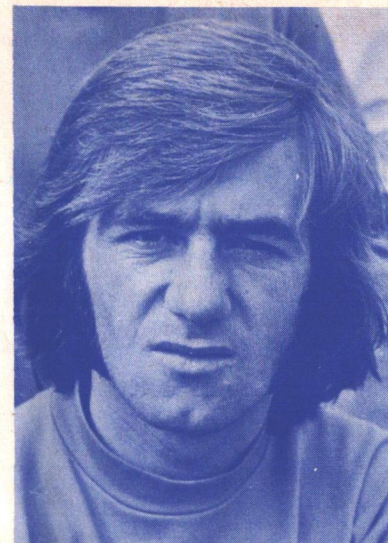

Ibrox is a trouble-free ground, and the club thanks the supporters for their splendid encouragement and behaviour. Rangers would like to see this standard of conduct carried forward to away matches as well. And by following the Ibrox code of conduct printed below, the supporters can help tremendously towards a trouble-free day.

1. Ban the carrying of alcohol on buses.
2. Ban members from taking alcohol into the stadium.
3. Ban the singing of provocative songs in buses and on the terracings.
4. Ban the use of obscene language.
5. Have the greatest respect for residents in the vicinity of football grounds. Do not be a public nuisance.
6. Put an end to members urinating at the roadside when travelling.
7. Set a good example to the youngsters who are travelling.
8. Impress on youth the importance of good behaviour.
9. Have respect for women who attend matches.
10. Notify Ibrox Stadium of any sign of hooliganism both home and away, giving report and details.

The Club, Police, Local Authorities and S.F.A. will back the supporters association in these measures.
