# Saints hope for a points 'burst'

**ST. JOHNSTONE come to Ibrox for the second time in the season today desperately needing points if they are to avoid losing the Premier place for which they fought so valiantly last season.**

So far Saints have picked up only six points from their 20 matches, and their prospects look bleak.

But last season the Perth side produced a series of splendid results in the second half of the season to lift themselves up into ninth place and qualify for the Premier Division.

## IT'S A FACT

TODAY'S game is the 57th League meeting between Rangers and St. Johnstone.

In the previous 56, Rangers have won 43, drawn four and lost nine.

In the process, the Light Blues have scored 153 goals and conceded 58.

Saints have won only three times in 28 visits to Ibrox . . . 1-0 in 1925-26; 3-2 in 1963-64 and 2-0 in 1970-71.

Rangers have run up some big scores against the Perth side—the biggest of all being a 9-1 win in a League Cup tie at Muirton in 1964. That is the Perth side's biggest defeat in history.

There was also an 8-0 in 1928-29, 7-0 in 1935-36 plus a few six and five-goal victories for the Light Blues.

Saints were founded in 1884 and after playing at Perth Recreation ground for a time moved to Muirton.

The ground attendance record at Perth is 29,972 set in a Scottish Cup tie against Dundee in 1952.

The club's biggest victory was 8-1 against Partick Thistle in the First Division in 1969-70.

Saints have never won the top League title, although they have been Division Two champs three times. They also reached the Final of the 1969-70 League Cup only to lose 1-0 to Celtic at Hampden.

In 1970-71 Saints finished third in the table to qualify for the U.E.F.A. Cup the following season.

The clubs have played three Scottish Cup ties and seven League Cup ties—and Rangers have won nine of the meetings and drawn the other.

Manager Jack Stewart is hopeful that his men can again produce this kind of burst.

However, first of all Saints will need a change of luck. They haven't won in their last 14 matches, and have gone through game after game missing out on success by the odd goal.

And the longer the run of ill-luck and poor results goes, the harder it gets for Saints to stop depression settling over the team spirit.

## DEREK'S 'BULLET'

IT took Rangers 67 minutes to wear down a stubborn Saints defence when the clubs met for the first time this season—in the Premier League match at Ibrox on September 13.

Despite a lot of pressure throughout the game, Rangers had only a Derek Johnstone shot which was kicked off the line to show for the hard work.

Then manager Jock Wallace took off the hard-working Derek Parlane and pushed on Colin Stein—and got a quick return on the move. Within a minute Stein got his head to a shot from Alex Miller and diverted it out of the keeper's reach.

Then came the clincher for Rangers in the 76th minute—Derek Johnstone rising to bullet in a John Greig free kick.

Two players were booked in a hard match—Gordon Smith and John Hotson of St. Johnstone.

In the second clash, at Perth on November 15 Rangers really hit the goal trail . . . winning 5-1.

And it was wee Tommy McLean—who missed the first meeting because of injury—who got the goals going for Rangers. The wee fellow, playing in midfield, turned on the style and scored one and made two of the five goals.

However, it was a Perth man who started the rout—big centre half MacDonald heading into his own net in the 20th minute as he and keeper Robertson were challenging for a McLean free kick with Derek Parlane.

Derek then got one on his own account—finishing off a Bobby McKean move just before the interval.

Then in 12 devastating minutes, wee Mac the Magician slammed Saints.

First of all he set up a fine chance which Bobby McKean slammed home then four minutes later raced on to a Sandy Jardine free kick to slam home No. 4. The fifth came from Jardine, who worked a 1-2 with Derek Johnstone before netting.

Saints consolation goal came in the 74th minute when John Muir netted.

Manager Stewart believes, and has the backing of many of the teams he has played against, that St. Johnstone are worthy of much better placing and results. They have some fine footballers in the side and recently added to the staff by signing Under-23 prospect Ian Anderson from Dundee a big, strong defender who should be of considerable aid to the Perth bid to climb clear of trouble.

The Muirton club are full-time—an expensive operation for a provincial side and already it has been made clear that they will probably have to follow the traditional route and sell a player to keep on functioning as full-timers.

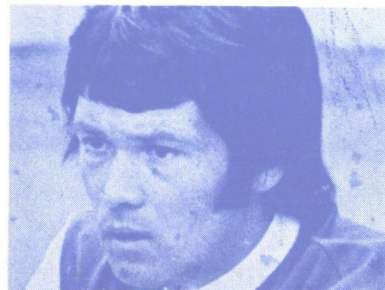
That won't be hard—not while they have players of the calibre of giant centre-half Ian MacDonald and Under-23 full back Gordon Smith in the ranks.

Both these players have been watched by big English clubs, and young Smith in particular is attracting a lot of attention with his fine displays for his club every week and his performance for Scotland's very successful European title-chasing Under-23 team.

The Perth line-up will come from the following pool of players:

\* Goalkeeper **DEREK ROBERTSON**, 6ft 1in, 11st. From Glasgow, he makes the trip north daily. Joined Saints from junior side Petershill in 1967 and was in and out of the first team

for a while but is now the No. 1 choice. Played in 40 of the club's 42 matches last season and has only been absent twice in 28 games this term.

★ Full back **GORDON SMITH**. 5ft 7in, 10st 10lbs. Another Glasgow man who travels every day to Perth. Strong, stocky player with a lot of class. Likes to go forward if he can. Played 33 times last season and hasn't missed one so far this term. Under-23 cap.

★ Full back **BILLY RITCHIE**. 5ft 9in, 10st 10lbs. Former Largs Thistle player who was signed three years ago. Plays in a variety of positions. Has played in 13 games so far this season.

★ Defender **PHIL ROBERTS**. Big, rugged player who is nearly 6ft and is built to match. Joined Saints last season from English club Grimsby and has proved to be a strong man in defence this term. Played more than 20 games.

★ Centre half **IAN MacDONALD**. 6ft 2in, 12st. Big strong Highlander who has been a key man for Saints for the past few seasons. Signed from Elgin City in 1972 and has been in the Under-23 international pool. Has only missed four matches this season.

## TODAY'S OPPONENTS

★ Defender **IAN ANDERSON**. 5ft 11in, 12st 7lbs. Only joined Saints from up-the-Tay neighbours Dundee a few weeks ago—and already looks a great buy. Was in the running for Under-23 honours while at Dens, but this season couldn't find a first team place and was happy to move to Perth. Originally from Edinburgh juvenile side Salvesen Boys Club.

★ Forward **JOHN MUIR**. 5ft 10in, 10st 3lbs. Signed from Alloa in 1969 and has been a regular scorer for Saints ever since despite some bad luck with injuries. Scored 16 goals last season and has netted five so far this term.

★ Forward **GORDON McGREGOR**. 5ft 11in, 11st. From Glasgow, he joined Saints from schools football in 1973. Big strong-running player who has still to develop fully as a player but looks a fine prospect.

★ Striker **JIM O'ROURKE**. 5ft 8in, 10st 10lbs. Joined Saints from Hibs last season and proved to be a great asset—scoring 15 goals in 38 games. Former Youth cap, he is a great professional. Can play deep, but is sharp enough to take chances as a striker. Potted nine so far this season in 26 games.

★ Forward **GORDON CRAMMOND**. 5ft 4in, 9st. Hard, aggressive little player who normally operates in midfield but can play in defence as well. Goes flat-out for the full 90 minutes. Ex-Aberdeen junior, he was signed from Montrose in 1973.

★ Forward **DUNCAN LAMBIE**. 5ft 10in, 10st 11lbs. Fast, tricky winger who is particularly effective on the left. Ex-Dundee, he was signed last season. Only missed two matches this term. Brother John is the Perth coach.

★ Forward **BOBBY THOMSON**. 5ft 9in, 10st 8lbs. Joined Saints from Glasgow juvenile football in 1973 and has made good progress since. Has played 19 games and made three substitute appearances this season.

★ Forward **CHARLIE SMITH**. 5ft 10in, 11st 6lbs. Ex-Falkirk and Partick Thistle player who also had a spell in South Africa. Generally operates as midfielder man. Played nine times this season.

★ Forward **JOHN HOTSON**. 5ft 9in, 10st 6lbs. Joined Saints from juvenile football in 1971 and can operate in defence or attack.

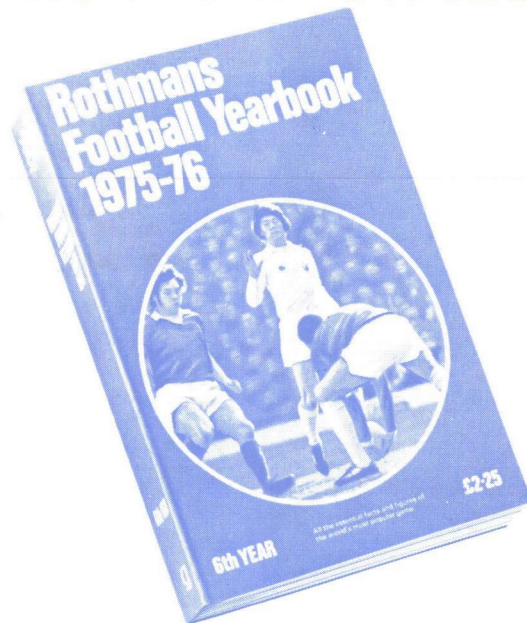

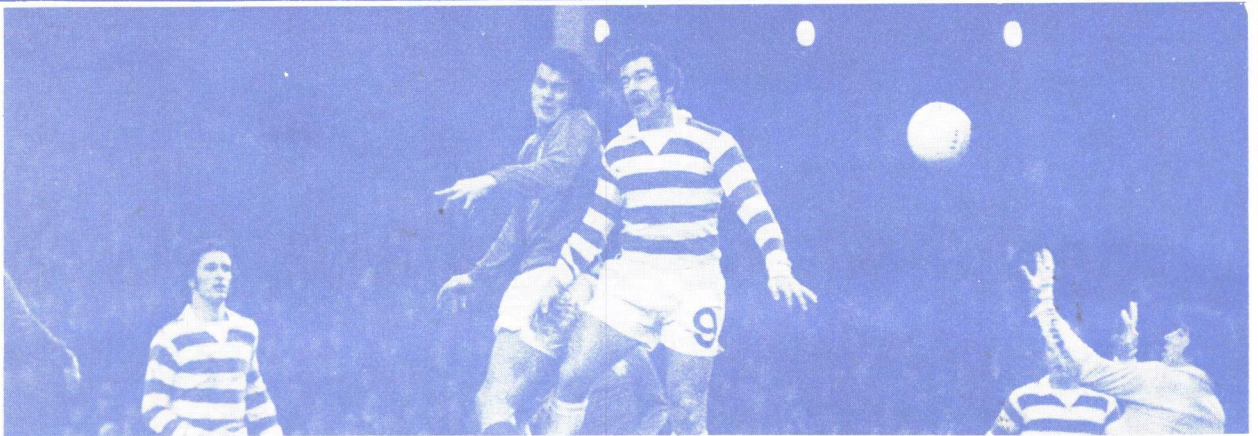

● *Derek Johnstone outjumps Dixie Deans to score Rangers' winning goal in the New Year clash with Celtic at Ibrox.*



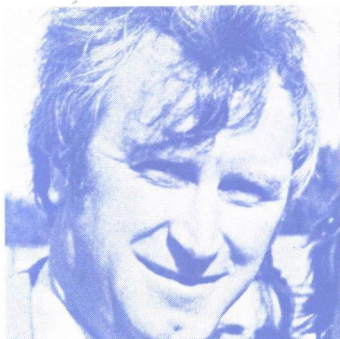

# Home Sweet Home!

THE draw for the third round of the Scottish Cup—the first round in which the top teams feature—has been good to Rangers . . . giving them a home tie against First Division side East Fife a fortnight today.

But although manager Jock Wallace is happy with the Ibrox venue, he is also aware that the Cup has presented many upsets in the past and will continue to do so. Also he recalls that another First Division side, Queen of the South, gave Rangers a hard time of it before going down in the League Cup quarter-finals.

"I'm pleased to be at home," says manager Wallace. "But that only helps make it a little easier for us. East Fife have a cup-fighting tradition and they'll make us go all the way."

However, the omens are good for Rangers. They have been drawn against the Fifers FIVE times in the past . . . and on four of those occasions finished up winning the Cup!

The Cup encounters with the Bay-view boys include a 3-0 semi-final victory at Hampden in 1948-49 and a return visit to the same ground the next year—THIS TIME FOR THE FINAL.

Again Rangers won 3-0, with Willie Thornton grabbing two of the goals and Willie Findlay the other.

The full third round draw is: Hibs v. Dunfermline; Stirling Albion or Civil Service Strollers v. Forfar or Meadowbank; Dundee United v. Hamilton; Cowdenbeath or Selkirk v. St. Mirren; Rangers v. East Fife; Morton v. Montrose; Dumbarton v. Stranraer or Keith; Albion Rovers or Glasgow University v. Partick Thistle; Raith Rovers or Clydebank v. Arbroath; Ayr United v. Airdrie; Forres or Alloa v. Aberdeen; Hearts v. Clyde; Stenhousemuir or Brechin v. Kilmarnock; Motherwell v. Celtic; Dundee v. Falkirk; Q.O.S. v. St. Johnstone.

The ties are to be played on January 24. Today there are eight second round ties being played to decide which clubs go forward to the third round.

There's no denying that it's tough and exciting at the top—

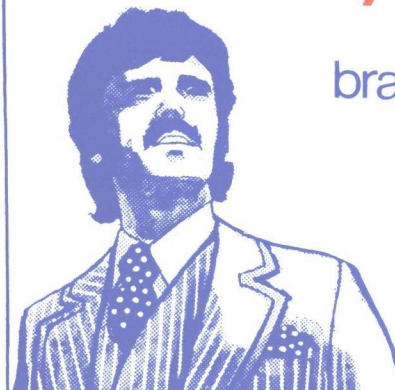
and just as tense at the bottom in the fight to avoid relegation.

# McDougall's thunderbolt!

**RANGERS Reserves kept up their title challenge with a 2-1 win against Hearts last week—but if the result was what he wanted, the performance certainly didn't suit coach Joe Mason.**

"We only played well for a time in the first half—the rest was poor" says Joe.

"The experienced men in particular were a disappointment. The younger boys are putting a lot more into the game."

The Colts got away to a good start, too, and were soon a couple of goals up.

Ian McDougall, the best Rangers player, got the first with a spectacular volley from 12 yards.

"But it was more than that" says coach Mason. "He started the move with a fine pass to Colin Stein and followed up to meet the cross on the drop. Good play all round by him."

The second goal came after a good run by young Gordon Boyd. The ball broke between him and the goalkeeper and Quinton Young pounced to net.

But after that, Rangers didn't push home the advantage. Indeed, they became very slack and could have finished up losing the match.

"We'll have to put a lot more into the game than that" is Joe Mason's honest comment.

However, Joe was happy with the form shown by youngsters Ralph Brand and Alan Boyd, both back in the team for their first full match after injury.

"They looked very good" he says. "I'll be hoping for more of that from them in the next few weeks."

## PLAY IT SAFE
