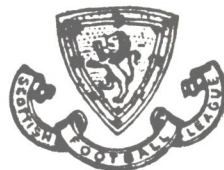

New Shape League Cup is a Hit with Fans

THE 32nd Scottish League Cup final at Hampden Park this afternoon between the Old Firm of Celtic and Rangers, completes an experimental season as far as this lucrative competition is concerned.

It was decided to scrap the normal sections of four teams, and play out the League Cup on knock-out lines right from the opening rounds, giving each club the chance to play at home and away.

Would it be a success? We wondered. Would it prove to be more attractive to the public and provide more entertainment for the fans who have shown in the past that the cut-and-thrust of knock-out football holds a lot of appeal for them? We felt it was time to try.

INCREASE

As I welcome you all to Hampden today I am delighted to report that the changes we made in playing off the Scottish League Cup ties have proved successful.

Attendances have increased to an average of 7,130 per tie as against the average last season of 5,570 per tie. I think the rise is most significant.

While the final has been delayed by three months because of bad weather conditions I don't think it has affected the continuity of the competition. We had two outstanding semi-finals between Forfar Athletic and Rangers and Hearts and Celtic. The final will look after itself!

A feature of the game today is the appearance of Celtic in their 14th successive final—a record unique in the annals of national competition in the world of football. Congratulations to Celtic for their consistency and contribution to the entertainment value of this Cup over the years.

SPORTSMEN

This also marks Rangers' 13th appearance in the final. Both clubs have won the trophy eight times.

Despite the league performances of both clubs this season a meeting between Celtic and Rangers is always worthy of this final.

The football fan has a right to witness a match which contains good attacking and entertaining football played in a sportsman-like manner. The attitude of the players is important to the fans, and the attitude of the fans is very important to the players.

All can play their part today in providing us with yet another outstanding Scottish League Cup final. I wish you all a good day's football.

REFEREE MAKES CUP HISTORY

David Follows in Dad's Footsteps

DAVID SYME, a 33-year-old representative with a well-known time-piece company, gets his first national Cup final today in his first year as a F.I.F.A. referee.

A Grade One official for some eight years, David will also make a bit of Scottish League Cup history as his late father, W. M. Syme, also refereed a League Cup final.

This was the unforgettable Hampden final in April 1969 when Celtic beat Hibernian by six goals to two. The Celtic scorers that day were Bobby Lennox (3), Willie Wallace, Bertie Auld and right-back Jim Craig. But the man who captivated the 72,420 crowd was Celtic outside-right Jimmy Johnstone.

So today we have a son following in his father's footsteps in the most challenging of games—Rangers versus Celtic at Hampden

Park. One of the new young breed of officials, following hard on the talents of Wharton, Davidson and Paterson, David Syme has earned his place today with his high ratings gained during the season.

THE 33rd TIE—AND CELTIC HAVE THE EDGE

RANGERS and Celtic are meeting in the Scottish League Cup tournament for the 33rd occasion this afternoon—and the surprise must be that they've drawn only on two occasions.

Their first draw was 0-0 at Ibrox in 1956, and the second draw was in 1967 when the score was 1-1, again at Ibrox.

Though Rangers won the last time they met—in the 1975 final when Alex MacDonald got the only goal of the match—Celtic have the edge on results.

Celtic have won 17 of the ties and Rangers have won 13. In six meetings in the final each club has had three victories, so today could be considered a decider.

A HIT IN FIRST FINAL

NEXT to scoring that goal in the 1970 final, the Ibrox boot room has provided Derek Johnstone with his most nostalgic League Cup memory.

It was in these inauspicious surroundings deep in the bowels of Ibrox Stadium that the very young Johnstone learned from then manager Willie Waddell and coach Jock Wallace that he would be leading Rangers' attack against Celtic the following afternoon.

"You could have floored me. When I was called in after training and told they wanted to see me I wondered what all the secrecy was about when I was led into the boot room," Derek recalls.

"It was there the big news was broken and I was warned not to tell a soul about it.

"It wasn't until I was handed a couple of match tickets to take home to my mother in Dundee that I realised they weren't kidding!"

The rest, as everyone knows, is history... straight from the pages of a boys' comic.

POSTSCRIPT

At the age of 16 years and 8 months Derek went on to head the solitary goal that brought Rangers their first major trophy in five very lean seasons... and set him off on the road to fame.

There is one postscript.

"The following morning I flew to Iceland with the Scottish professional youth team," says Derek. "Naturally I had my medal with me and I treasured it so much that I stuck it away in the back of a drawer in the hotel room for safety.

"You can guess the rest. When we were leaving I forgot all about it and was I relieved when it arrived by post a couple of weeks later."

Eight years on Johnstone will take the field today as a VIP... the only DJ who's at the top of the charts!

His goal-scoring exploits this season have put him firmly in front of the field in the Premier

Division and won him a place in the World Cup 40.

I rather suspect that Rangers, as a whole, have a soft spot for the League Cup.

They were the first team to have their names inscribed on the trophy in 1946-47 with a 4-0 win over Aberdeen—who only a fortnight later were to beat the great Hibs side of that era in the Scottish Cup final.

Rangers' line-up read Brown; Young and Shaw; McColl, Woodburn and Rae; Rutherford, Gillick, Williamson, Thornton and Duncanson.

What... no John Greig!

It was the 1970 success that marked a big turning-point in their fortunes.

KAJ'S GOAL

Before then their last big win had been the Scottish Cup final replay in 1966 when they beat Celtic with a Kaj Johansen goal.

Derek Johnstone's header five seasons later put them back in business again and the Ibrox trophy room has rarely been bare since.

For the superstitious today's match will be Rangers' 13th League Cup final.

Break the statistics down a little more and it is the seventh League Cup final between Rangers and Celtic with the honours even at three wins apiece.

By anyone's reckoning that makes this season's League Cup final an "Old Firm" decider!

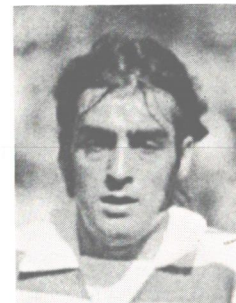

U.E.F.A. CUP SHOWDOWN

TODAY'S final is in the very best tradition of "Old Firm" clashes... a showdown in which the League Cup trophy is only one of the prizes at stake.

For Celtic, the game not only offers them what could be their last chance to play in one of Europe's top competitions next season—the U.E.F.A. Cup—but the opportunity to recover some of the pride they have lost in a season of disaster.

Right out of the hunt for glory in the Premier Division championship race and Scottish Cup, Celtic have not yet managed to defeat Rangers this term. Two wins and a draw have given the Ibrox men five points from the three "Old Firm" league matches played so far.

But if you do not believe that EVERY match between these two clubs is different and a game apart, just ask the respective managers. Messrs. Jock Stein and Jock Wallace will assure you that no two meetings between their teams are alike... and that the current form of either side is of no value as a yardstick for picking the winners of the next meeting.

MONOPOLIES

The fact that Celtic are appearing in their 14th successive League Cup final—a world record for a major competition—may well have attracted the attention of the Monopolies Commission.

It will certainly have confirmed the jaundiced view of some English observers that few of Scottish football's prizes stray far from the sideboards of Parkhead and Ibrox.

But the vital statistics of this particular competition tell a different story. Despite their amazing attendance record, Celtic have won only one of the last seven League Cup finals... and are now trying to avoid an unhappy hat-trick of defeats!

IT LOOKS LIKE LAST CHANCE DAY FOR CELTIC

Celtic's last League Cup final triumph was against Hibs in season 1974-75. Jock Stein's men won 6-3 that day and the astonishing thing is that only two members of that successful side—Danny McGrain and Paul Wilson—are still at Parkhead today.

This shows that the wind of change blowing through Celtic's camp has been operating at gale force... as well as underlining that there are now many players at Parkhead who are very anxious indeed to collect a League Cup winners' medal.

Among them are two stars who can truly be described as "imports"—a former England Under-23 goalkeeper Peter Latchford and Icelandic internationalist Johannes Edvaldsson.

PURCHASES

Two more purchases—full back Joe Filippi from Ayr United and forward Tom McAdam from Dundee United—miss out on today's action because they are cup-tied. And you may remember that sweeper Pat Stanton missed last year's final, when Celtic were beaten 2-1 by Aberdeen, for the same reason.

Stanton also misses today's game because he has not yet returned to first-team duty following a cartilage operation and might well be convinced that a hoodoo is at work, but for the fact that he earned himself a League Cup winners' medal with Hibs when they beat Celtic 2-1 in 1972-73.

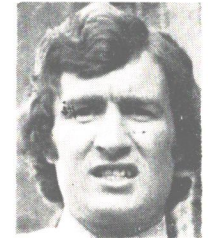
