Finally, let me thank all the spectators who have come to Ibrox Stadium this week-end to help to make the Tournament the great success I am sure it will be.

**WEST BROM** are one of England's most famous teams and next year will be celebrating the club's centenary.

The Midlands club, known as the Throstles because of the Thrush on the club badge, became a professional outfit in 1885 and were originally the West Bromwich Strollers.

They played at six other grounds before settling at their present stadium The Hawthorns in 1900.

West Brom have won the English First Division title once—in 1919-20, when they finished nine points ahead of the field. They have been runners-up twice—losing out to Huddersfield by two points in 1924-25 and coming in four points behind Wolverhampton in 1953-54.

They also have two Second Division championships on the honours roll (1902 and 1911). But it is in Cup competition that West Brom have proved to be strongest.

They have won the English Cup five times... beating Preston 2-1 in 1888; Aston Villa 1-0 in 1892; Birmingham 2-1 in 1931; Preston 3-2 in 1954 and Everton 1-0 after extra time in 1968.

West Brom have also been beaten Finalists five times and last season reached the semi-final before going out to Nottingham Forest.

They won the English League Cup in 1965-66 and have twice been defeated in the Final.

Plus, of course, they come to Ibrox today as holders of the Tennent Caledonian Cup following last year's win over Rangers.

This season West Brom will go into battle in Europe in the U.E.F.A. Cup and everyone at Ibrox wishes them well in that venture.

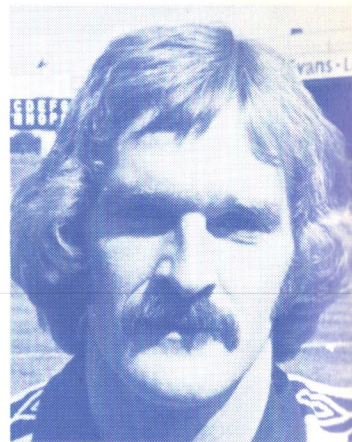

## THROSTLES BID FOR EUROPEAN GLORY

**Goalkeepers:**

**TONY GODDEN.** Signed from Kent amateur club Ashford Town in August 1975 for £2,000 after a spell with Gillingham without ever making a League appearance. Was released by Albion on loan to Preston and on his return to The Hawthorns, emerged as a first-class goal-keeper. League debut against Spurs in March 1977 and has now taken over from John Osborne. Born at Gillingham.

**MARK GREW.** 19-year-old local boy who joined the club firstly as an amateur. With the transfer of Bob Ward to Blackpool, Mark became regular 2nd eleven goal-keeper.

**Defenders:**

**BRYAN ROBSON.** Played for Durham County and the England Youth team before signing for Albion on apprentice forms. League debut four seasons ago and in three games that season scored twice. Prefers midfield but has played for the club both in defence and attack. Born Chester-le-Street.

**DEREK STATHAM.** Highly rated young full-back and England Youth and Under-21 international. Claimed a regular first team place last season

after making his League debut at Stoke. Born at Wolverhampton.

**JOHN WILE.** Until the appointment of Ron Atkinson as Albion manager, John acted as player-manager following the resignation of Ronnie Allen. The Club captain, signed from Peterborough in December 1970 for £30,000. A solid centre-half who was with Sunderland before joining Peterborough, he has clocked up over 400 senior appearances in his career so far... all as centre-half. Born Sherburn.

**ALISTAIR ROBERTSON.** Made his League debut in the Albion defence when 17 in October 1969 and has since made more than 300 senior games for Albion. A former Scottish Boys and Youth team centre-half, he developed through the club's youth team. Born at Philipstoun, Scotland.

**BRENDAN BATSON.** A 25-year-old defender who comes from Grenada in the West Indies. He cost Albion £30,000 when signed from Cambridge United. He started his career with Arsenal and moved to the "University town" club in the early 1970's. Has played over 150 competitive games during his career so far.

**PADDY MULLIGAN.** Ire international who has served in turn Shamrock Rovers, Chelsea, Boston Beacons (American League), Crystal Palace and Albion whom he joined in September 1975.

**Midfield:**

**TONY BROWN.** Albion's longest serving player, has played in a club record 500 League games since his first team debut in 1963. Played in four Cup Finals for Albion, three League Cup and one F.A. Cup. Appeared for the England Youth team and has one full international cap from the game against Wales in 1971. Born Oldham.

**MICK MARTIN.** Former Bohemians and Manchester United midfielder player, Albion signed him from Old Trafford two seasons ago for £35,000 after a two-month loan period. The son of former Ire international Con Martin. Mick is also a full international for the Republic of Ire. Born Dublin.

**JOHN TREWICK.** Recent fine performances for the club have helped striker John stake his claim for a regular first team place. Signed for the club as an apprentice and is a former England Schoolboy and Youth international, he turned professional for Albion in July 1974. Born Bedlington.

**WAYNE HUGHES.** An up and coming Welshman who made his League debut for Albion in a local derby with Aston Villa in May 1977. A member of the current Welsh under-21 squad, Wayne comes from Port Talbot. He can play at the back as well as in midfield and looks set for a bright future.

**JOHN LOVERIDGE.** A midfielder player from Wolverhampton who joined Albion from school in July 1975, turning professional two years later. A regular in the reserve team, he made his first eleven debut in a testimonial game at Swindon last May. Stands only 5ft 3in tall.

**LEN CANTELLO.** Len from Newton Heath, joined Albion as a youngster back in 1967 and to date, has amassed over 300 League and Cup appearances for WBA. He played in the 1970 League Cup Final and has filled eight different positions in Albion's ranks.

## THE BOSS

**RON ATKINSON** became manager of West Brom last season when Ronnie Allen departed The Hawthorns for a lucrative job in Arab football.

And the new man has made a very successful job of his new role.

Ron, from Liverpool, joined Wolves as an Amateur in 1956 and later became a part-time professional with Aston Villa.

Then he joined Headington United (later to become Oxford United) and between 1961 and 1971 appeared in 385 League matches for Oxford, captaining them when they stepped up from Non-League football into the Fourth Division and within six seasons the Second Division.

He was manager of Kettering Town and Cambridge United before joining Albion. He's an amiable, but ambitious young manager with every belief that he can take his team to the very top... starting at Ibrox today.



Ron Atkinson

**Forwards:**

**ALISTAIR BROWN.** He can play either in midfield or attack and has worn every forward shirt for Albion. Made 101 League appearances for Leicester before transferring to Albion in March 1972 for a £60,000 transfer fee. Born Musselburgh, Scotland.

**LAURIE CUNNINGHAM.** Started his career with Orient as an apprentice and made his League debut in October 1974. Rapidly built up his reputation as a skilful winger and was signed by Albion in March 1977 for £110,000. England Under-21 international. Born Archway, London.

**CYRILLE REGIS** Signed in the close season of 1977 from Isthmian League club Hayes for £5,000 and scored twice against Rotherham in the League Cup of his debut for Albion. Gave up the chance to play for France in The World Cup when he agreed to play for the England under-21 team last season, although he was forced to pull out through injury. Born in French Guayana.

**KEVIN SUMMERFIELD.** Former England Youth international forward who starred for Albion when they won the 1976 F.A. Youth Cup. A tall lad who has loads of skill. He became a professional in July 1975. Born at Walsall.

**DEREK MONAGHAN.** A wing-forward who made a big impact as a youngster when playing in the 1976 Youth Cup Final against Wolves. A local lad from Redditch, Derek has been a permanent fixture in Albion's Central League side for two years now and made his first team debut in a friendly against Swindon last season.

**WILLIE JOHNSTON.** The dashing fiery Scottish international winger was born in Glasgow in 1946. This wing-wizard played in over 250 games for Rangers (scored 100 goals) before coming to WBA in December 1972. He is one of only a handful of players to have scored a hat-trick of penalties in one match—and this he did for Rangers when he came on as a substitute versus St. Johnstone.

## BACK AT THE TOP!

**SOUTHAMPTON will be back where most people feel they belong this season—in the English First Division.**

It has taken the Saints four seasons of rebuilding and hard work to get back the place they lost in 1973-74, and not even a great English Cup victory in 1975-76 compensated for that failure to regain status.

Now, however, Saints are back... and aim to stay.

They were founded in 1885 and turned professional in 1894. They played at two other grounds before moving to the present stadium The Dell in 1898.

Originally they were Southampton St. Marys, which is where the "Saints" nickname came from.

They have never won the First Division title, but have twice been Division Three champions.

Their 1976 Wembley Cup victory over the highly-fancied Manchester United—thanks to a goal from winger Bobby Stokes—has been their only English Cup success. But they did make two other Finals—losing to Bury

4-0 in 1900 and going down 2-1 to Sheffield United in a replay in 1902 after a 1-1 draw. These Finals were played at Crystal Palace... and the amazing thing was that Saints were a non-league club at the time!

Southampton were, of course, the first winners of the Tennent Caledonian Cup... beating Rangers in the Final two years ago. That result was reversed when the teams met at Ibrox in the first game last season.

### Other Saints statistics:

Record victory: 11-0 v. Northampton, Southern League, 1901.

Record defeat: 8-0 by Spurs (Division Two, 1936) and Everton (Division One, 1971).

Most League points: 61 (Division Three, South, 1921-22 when Saints lost only four league games and conceded only 21 goals).

Most League goals in a season: Derek Reeves, 39, 1959-60.

Most League appearances—Terry Paine, 713, 1956-74.

## THE BOSS

**LAWRIE McMENEMY is a big man in every way—a 6ft 4in ex-centre half with an imposing air of authority allied to a friendly nature and a fine sense of humour.**

The big Geordie was undoubtedly the star turn among the TV panellists in the last World Cup—his honest comments always tinged with common sense and fairness.

He's a man liked by Scots supporters, and everyone at Ibrox wishes Lawrie and his team well in their return to the First Division in this new season.

Lawrie started out as a pivot in his home town of Newcastle, but injury ended his career (which had also included a National Service stint in the Coldstream Guards).

He managed non-League side Bishop Auckland, went on to be coach at Sheffield Wednesday and later boss of both Doncaster Rovers and Grimsby.

Lawrie moved to Southampton as assistant to Ted Bates in June, 1973 but five months later was appointed team boss.

Took Saints to victory in the 1976 English Cup Final against Manchester United.

### Goalkeepers:

**PETER WELLS.** Joined the Club from Nottingham Forest midway through 1976-77 season when Manager Lawrie McMenemy had to sign a goalkeeper following an injury to Ian Turner. Quickly established himself as a keeper of real promise and became a firm favourite with The Dell crowd. Has 57 senior appearances.

**TERRY GENNOE.** A recent signing from Halifax Town where he was reckoned on being one of the best goalkeepers in the lower divisions. Formerly with Bury.

### Defenders:

**MANNY ANDRUSZEWSKI.** Came to prominence during 1976-77 season when he established a first team place with 21 outings to his

credit, only to have his progress temporarily halted by a knee operation. Born locally at Eastleigh of Polish parents. Manny can play at either centre back or full back and his aggressive non stop action is a feature of his play. Has made 61 senior appearances.

**CHRIS NICHOLL.** Signed from Aston Villa where he captained them to a League Cup Final victory. An Eire International by parental qualification, Chris has had a remarkable run of success in helping teams to promotion. A dominating figure in the

heart of the back four and with a happy knack of scoring the odd goal. Made 40 League appearances last season.

**MICHAEL PICKERING.** It took £35,000 to see this young defender come South from Barnsley where he had been under the eye of several first division scouts for a considerable time. Strong and quick in tackle. Made 41 League appearances last season.

**MALCOLM WALDRON.** A local lad who has come up through the Club's youth policy. Comes from nearby Bedhampton and has made 60 senior appearances. A very perceptive player, Malcolm is recognised as a particularly hard man to

beat and his distribution adds a great deal to his always improving game.

**DAVID PEACH.** Moved to The Dell from Gillingham in 1974. Has played 205 games for the Saints and has found the net on 34 occasions, including a penalty in the 1976 F.A. Cup Semi Final, which ensured him of a Cup Final appearance. A full back who keeps improving, so much so, that he had the distinction last season of captaining the England Under-21 team as one of two allowable over age players.

#### Midfield:

**ALAN BALL.** Made the move to The Dell from Arsenal and has made 77 appearances. Alan has played 72 times for England including the memorable World Cup success in 1966. A dedicated professional, Alan has the ability to lift players around him and was an automatic choice as skipper when he joined the club. Has scored well over 150 League goals in his career and will be looking for a few more this season.

**STEVE WILLIAMS.** Another product of the club's youth policy. Came to The Dell via the club's London network and worked his way up to a first team place when at only 19 years of age, he had a season to remember when he was selected for the England Under-21 team and was voted "Player of the Year" by the supporters who like many good judges see Steve as a player of immense potential. Has made 7 appearances for England Under-21 side and 72 senior games for Saints.

**NICK HOLMES.** Born and bred in Southampton. Quiet man Nick has worn the red and white shirt 166 times and has scored 29 goals. One of only four players left with the club that produced a memorable Cup Final win over Manchester United in 1976. A great professional and a one club man who was selected for England Under-23 honours but had to withdraw due to injury.

#### Forwards:

**TED MacDOUGALL.** This prolific goalscorer joined the club in 1976

when he was delighted to move back to the South Coast, following Manager, Lawrie McMenemy, moving in to acquire his services from Norwich. Has scored 235 League goals in his career. Has been capped seven times for Scotland.

**TREVOR HEBBERD.** Hailing from nearby Alresford, "Smiler" as he is affectionately known is on the verge of breaking through into regular first team reckoning. Has made 10 full League appearances. A strong, forceful striker, who can if required, do a more than useful job in midfield or at the back.

**AUSTIN HAYES.** Born in London, Austin came to the club through the same channels as Steve Williams. Made his senior debut in the

European Cup Winners Cup when he scored twice in a second round game. Has made 6 senior appearances.

**PHIL BOYER.** Joined Saints from Norwich just prior to the 1977-78 season starting. Renewed a partnership with Ted MacDougall which produced a fine understanding and many goals during their careers at York, Bournemouth and Norwich. An aggressive front player who has captured the eye enough to have an England cap to show for his efforts.

**TONY FUNNELL.** Joined Saints from Eastbourne United. Made 11 full first team appearances during his first season plus 4 as substitute and scored 8 goals.

## TYNECASTLE MEN FIND

OUTSIDE the "Old Firm" of Rangers and Celtic, Hearts have undoubtedly the most impressive record of success in Scottish football in modern times.

The 1950s were golden years for Hearts, who reaped a harvest of two League Championships (1957-58 and 1959-60); one Scottish Cup triumph (1955-56) and three League Cup victories (1954-55, 1958-59 and 1959-60).

There was another League Cup win in 1962-63 to add to the Edinburgh side's other triumphs of League titles in 1894-95 and 1896-97 as well as four other Scottish Cup successes (1891, 1896, 1901, 1906).

So it is good to see a team of such standing back in the Premier Division again after a one-season visit to the lower divisions, a slump that cost them their proud record of having been in the top league since competition began.

Hearts are back now, and aim to stay so the Tennent Caledonian Cup will provide the Tynecastle club with vital match experience for the Premier test to come.

Hearts were founded in 1874, and of course are really Heart of Midlothian Football Club. They played at three other grounds before moving to the present Tynecastle Park in 1886.

**RAY DUNLOP.** Signed from Stenhousemuir for £10,000 a year ago and has proved to be a good signing. A former Yoker player, he's on the six-foot mark.

**JOHN BROUGH.** A teenager who made his debut last season when Dunlop was injured and shaped up well. He was signed from Cavalry

## THE BLEND

Apart from their four League successes, Hearts have been runners-up 11 times and been beaten Scottish Cup Finalists four times.

Their last Scottish Cup defeat was 3-1 by Rangers two seasons ago and last term Hearts lost to the Light Blues in the semi-final at Hampden.

Manager Willie Ormond has been trying to bring in new blood to the line-up and has succeeded in finding a blend of youth and experience which helped Hearts back to the top league in a tight battle in the First Division last season.

## THE BOSS

**WILLIE ORMOND'S** decision two seasons ago to give up his job as Scottish international team manager to take on the role as club boss of Hearts was something of a surprise.

Particularly since Ormond's reputation as a player in Edinburgh was made with the cross-city rivals Hibs.

But it was a job Willie Ormond wanted to take on. And although he couldn't keep Hearts in the Premier Division in his first year, he has brought the "Jam Tarts" back in to the big league in one season.

Ormond still lives in Musselburgh where he runs a successful pub. But he is more interested in a successful Hearts team and has been going through a careful programme of rebuilding.

As a winger with a great turn of pace and a deadly left foot, Willie won many honours in his days as part of the famous Hibs forward line of the early 50s... coming back after a couple of broken legs to show he had courage as well as skill.

He was manager of St. Johnstone before taking on the Scotland job and was our international manager when the team played well, but with no luck, in the 1974 World Cup Finals in West Germany.



● WILLIE ORMOND

**CAMMY FRASER.** Has been five years at Tynecastle and is a sound performer every week.

**DAVE McNICOLL.** Formerly with Dunfermline and Montrose, cost £20,000 last October and has done a tremendous job in the middle of the defence for the club. His career has been interrupted several times by bad injuries, but he is hopeful he has come through all that now.

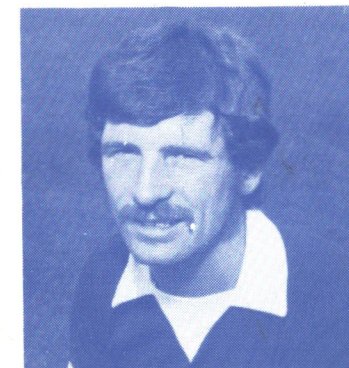
**JIM JEFFERIES.** This strapping big fellow is in his 10th season at Tynecastle and has been a solid servant to the club.

**FRANK LIDDELL.** Hearts paid out £10,000 to land this big man at the end of last season from Alloa. He's a former Dunipace junior and was two seasons with Alloa. He's looking forward to the challenge of Premier football.

### Midfield:

**EAMONN BANNON.** Skill and industry has made this talented youngster a target for bigger clubs, but so far Hearts have held them off. A student teacher, he will gain vital experience in the Premier League this season.

Lanky **GRAHAM SHAW** was signed for a considerable fee from Dunfermline in 1976. Can also turn out as a striker, and the six-foot Shaw netted against Rangers in the 1976 Scottish Cup Final. Not pacy, but has a lot of skill for such a big fellow.

Skipper **JIM BROWN** hopes for better luck this season following a leg break last term. He has been 14 seasons at Tynecastle, signing from local minor football.

*Forwards:*  
Wee **DONALD PARK** is a utility man at Tynecastle, and this ex-Highland League player uses his speed and match-reading skill to great effect either on the wing or in the middle.

**WILLIE GIBSON.** A striker with great goal-snatching ability inside the box with his head or feet. Scored nearly 30 goals last season. Has been eight years at Tynecastle.

**DREW BUSBY.** Teams up with Gibson to provide the scoring thrust, although he can also operate in midfield. A former Dumbarton and Airdrie player, he is in the veteran stage now but still a menace. Very strong and aggressive.

**MALCOLM ROBERTSON.** Joined Hearts from Ayr United and has also served a spell with Raith Rovers. Pacy and aggressive, he can be a match-winner in the right mood. The same goes for the mercurial

**BOBBY PRENTICE,** a former Celtic player who packs one of the best left foots in the game and crosses with tremendous accuracy.

Also standing by for Hearts will be youngsters like **GORDON SMITH** a young defender who has turned full time after serving his time as a painter, plus **LAWRIE TIERNEY** and **PAUL RODGER.**

## THE AMAZING LIGHT BLUE TROPHY RECORD

**RANGERS** last season completed the clean sweep in Scottish football for the fourth time in 30 years... adding yet another great chapter to a story full of glittering prizes.

The Ibrox record is remarkable. They have been League champions 37 times, including two out of the three Premier titles played for. They have won the Scottish Cup 22 times and the League Cup nine times... as well as numerous other local trophies.

And, of course, in 1971-72 they beat Moscow Dynamo in Barcelona to win the European Cup Winners' Cup.

The Rangers story began more than a century ago on the banks of the Clyde at Glasgow Green. The club played at two other grounds before settling at Ibrox in 1887 and then the current stadium in 1899.

Over the years Rangers have won all that is to be won in Scotland, and provided more players for international duty than any other club.

Last season, for instance, Derek Johnstone, Tom Forsyth and Sandy Jardine all won full Scotland honours while Davie

Cooper, Bobby Russell, Gordon Smith and Kenny Watson all played for the Under-21 side.

Cooper, Smith and Russell were all newcomers to the Ibrox scene, so their selection for Scotland proves once again that when Rangers sign a player they regard him as a potential internationalist.

So far Rangers have not been able to add the handsome Tennent Caledonian Cup to all the other trophies... Southampton and then last season West Brom denied the Light Blues of that privilege.

Maybe this season that matter can be put right.

## THE BOSS

**THERE** are not many players big enough in physique, stature and character to be handed the job of taking over a club like Rangers, particularly after a season in which the team has swept the boards.

But John Greig is the exception. When Jock Wallace quit unexpectedly to go south to Leicester City at the end of last season, Rangers had only to look inside their own dressing room to find his replacement.

Greig was the board's choice—and the people's choice. He has been an Ibrox man through and through since he joined them as a raw youngster back in 1960.

John was still going strong as a player and inspirational captain at the end of last season's triple triumph, so the move upstairs came for him quicker than he expected.

But the 35-year-old from Edinburgh made his decision with typical decisiveness. His playing days were over—it was on to a new challenge.

In more than 700 games for Rangers John Greig won every honour time and again. He earned 44 full caps and last year an M.B.E. for his services to the sport.

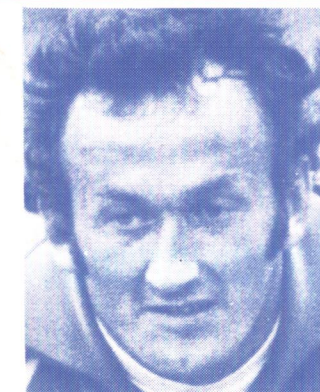
Now all that drive and enthusiasm will be used to direct Rangers and keep them at the top.

**PETER McCLOY.** Born Girvan 16.11.46. 6ft 4in, 14st 5lbs. Has 9 international caps. Joined club from Motherwell in March 1970 and has won all honours with Rangers. Played in 25 games last season, including Scottish Cup Final v. Aberdeen.

**STEWART KENNEDY.** Born 31.4.49. 6ft 11½in, 12st 7lbs. Joined Rangers from Stenhousemuir in April 1973 and quickly established himself as a top-class keeper. Won 5 international caps, but last season lost first team place to Peter McCloy. Played in the League Cup Final against Celtic and in 34 first team games in all.

### Defenders:

**SANDY JARDINE.** Born Edinburgh

31.12.48. Joined Rangers in December 1965 from Edinburgh Athletic. 5ft 9½in, 11st 2lbs. One of the fastest players in the country, and a versatile performer since he is equally at home in midfield as well as full back. Has won every honour with Rangers and is a Scotland regular. Scored 6 goals in 54 games last season.

**TOM FORSYTH.** Born 23.1.49. 6ft, 12st 7lbs. Joined Rangers from Motherwell in October 1972 and has become recognised as one of the strongest middle defenders in the country—a player of great enthusiasm and strong tackling ability. Won 'treble' honours with Rangers

**COLIN JACKSON.** Born 8.10.46. 6ft ½ in, 12st 6lbs. Solid stopper type centre half who is now the club's longest serving player, having joined them from Sunnybank of Aberdeen in 1963. Has won all honours with Rangers as well as several international caps. Scored six goals in 46 appearances last season. Runs his own print and design business.

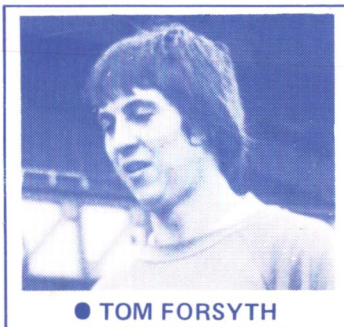
**ALISTAIR DAWSON.** Born 25.5.58. 5ft 10½, 11st 2lbs. Joined Rangers in January, 1975 while still a schoolboy and four days after leaving school toured Canada, New Zealand and Australia with the club, playing in four games. Has great potential. A former Youth cap, he is still actively involved in Boys Brigade work in his home town of Johnstone. Scored 10 goals in 44 reserve games last season.

**ALEX MILLER.** Born 7.4.49. 5ft 10½ in, 12st. Joined club in April 1965 from Clydebank Strollers. Versatile type who can fill any position with skill and confidence. Penalty expert, he netted five times from the spot in 27 full games and 13 substitute appearances last season.

#### Midfield:

**BOBBY RUSSELL.** A 20-year-old who hit the Scottish football scene with a bang last season in his first term as a senior with Rangers following his call-up from Shettleston Juniors. Just 5ft 8in and 9st 6lb, but makes up for his lack of physique by great match-reading ability and skill allied to hard work. Netted six goals in 53 games and was given Under-21 recognition. Expected to become even better as he gains experience.

**ALEX MacDONALD.** Born Glasgow 17.3.48. Joined Rangers in November, 1968 from St. Johnstone for a £50,000 fee and has been a tremendous servant. Non-stop worker with a neat touch and scoring ability—hit 10 goals in 50 games last season. Just 5ft 5½ in and 10st 6lbs but is a hard man to knock off the ball.

**GORDON SMITH.** Born 29.12.54. 5ft 11in, 11st 8lbs. Joined Rangers last season from Kilmarnock for £65,000 and settled in to the Ibrox scene immediately. Can operate in midfield, but last season worked as double striker with Derek Johnstone and banged in 27 goals in 51 games. An Under-23 cap.

**KENNY WATSON.** Age 23. 6ft, 12st 8lbs. Signed from Montrose in August 1975 and brought along quietly in the Ibrox traditions. Has had a number of first team games, but not able yet to command a regular first team place. Has a great left foot and a lot of drive. Played 40 Reserve games last season and scored 10 goals. Was capped at Under-21 level.

#### Forwards:

**TOMMY McLEAN.** Born Larkhall 2.6.47. 5ft 4½ in, 10st. Skilful little winger who comes back deep to pick up the ball from defence and use the long pass with great accuracy. One of the best passers in the game who has won every honour with Rangers since joining them from Kilmarnock in 1971, including a Cup Winners Cup medal. Scored five goals in 48 games last season, but can be credited with dozens of "assists".

**DEREK PARLANE.** Born Helensburgh 5.5.53. 6ft, 12st 2lbs. International striker who lost his first team place last season but is determined to win it back this term. Joined Rangers from Queen's Park in April, 1970. Scored on his debut against Bayern Munich in Cup Winners Cup semi-final at Ibrox in season 1971-72. Netted 10 goals in 12

full and 19 substitute appearances last season.

**DEREK JOHNSTONE.** Born Dundee 4.11.53. 5ft 11½ in, 13st 2lbs. Joined Rangers as a schools internationalist in July 1970 and quickly won first team fame. Scored the winning goal at the age of 16 in League Cup Final against Celtic at Hampden and has gone on to every honour in the game. Netted 39 goals last season to become Premier League's top scorer. Also headed two fine goals for Scotland v. Wales and Ireland and was in the World Cup pool in Argentina. Named as Player of the Year by Scottish Football writers last season.

**DAVE COOPER.** Born 25.2.56. 5ft 9in, 11st 4lbs. Cost Rangers £100,000 from Clydebank in June last year when he was wanted by many English clubs but preferred to stay in Scotland. Packs a lethal left foot, and a quick brain. Has played at Under-21 level and a lot more is expected of him this season. Scored 9 goals in 57 appearances last season, including v. Celtic in the League Cup Final at Hampden. Also standing by will be ex-Schools internationalists:

**BILLY MacKAY, CHRIS ROBERTSON and DEREK STRICKLAND**—a trio of youngsters who shaped up really well in the Reserve team last season and scored 55 goals between them.

WEE Tommy McLean played his part in last year's triple triumph—at least as far as the Rangers fans are concerned.

But personally the ex-Kilmarnock winger was left feeling a bit dis-satisfied with his contribution to the League and twin Cup successes.

"I never felt I put together the string of consistent performances that I like" says Tommy.

"I seemed to run into one niggling injury after another, and although I played in a lot of games, I felt my form wasn't consistent.

"I'm the kind of player who gains confidence every week from good matches. But I only seemed to go a couple of games, then I would come up against an injury which meant I couldn't achieve 100 per cent of what I aimed for.

"I had a troublesome shoulder injury . . . I damaged my ankle in the Scottish Cup tie at Berwick and received a bad leg gash at one stage as well. It seemed to be one

"So although the team won everything, I didn't feel fully satisfied with my contribution.

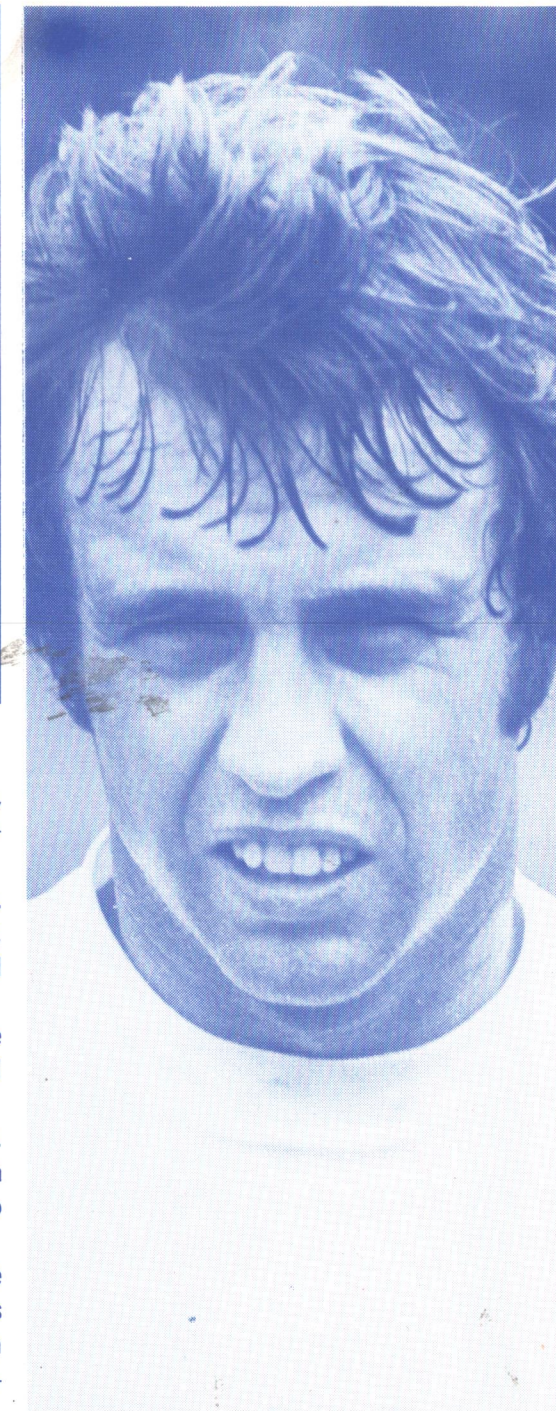
"However, I'm feeling a lot better now. I had a two month break over the summer, the longest holiday for some time, and seem to have shaken off everything.

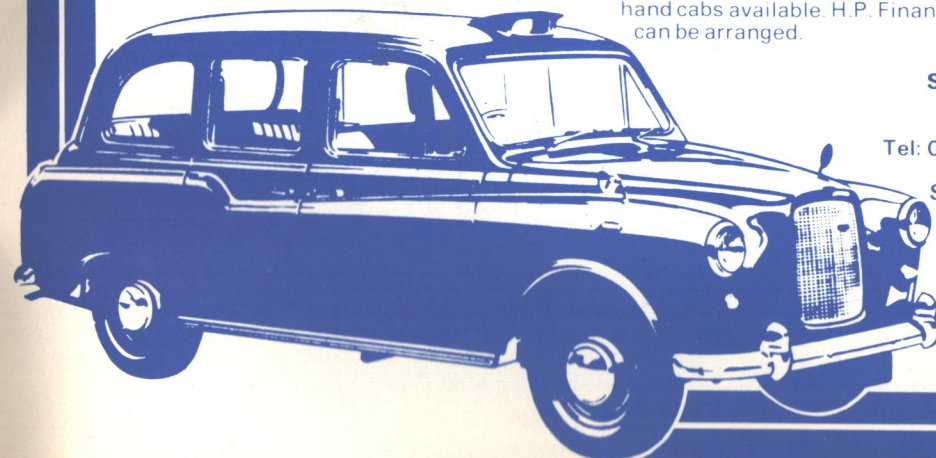
